Congress-JDS Alliance Had Slight Edge

The political parties had caste, not the issues in mind. while selecting candidates and electioneering.

The elections to the 28 Lok Sabha constituencies in Karnataka concluded in two phases. On April 18 polling was held in 14 seats in southern Karnataka comprising the region of the old princely Mysore State while in the second phase on April 23, another 14 seats in northern Karnataka went to polls. Northern Karnataka has most areas which were carved out of the Kannada-speaking regions of Bombay Principality and districts from Nizam's State of Hyderabad.

Though the Congress and the Janata Dal Secular (JDS), partners in the State Government, were able to firm up the alliance for the Lok Sabha polls, bonhomie was missing during the electioneering. The spirit of alliance visible at the top refused to seep down to the

ground level among the cadres of the two parties. Yet the alliance hopes to have a better harvest of the seats than the BJP which won 17 out 28 seats from the State in

Straight Contests

Incidentally, Congress as the major partner displayed much magnanimity in conceding eight seats to the JDS, of which one, i.e., Bangalore North, came back to it after JDS failed to find a suitable candidate for itself. The alliance between the two parties has made it a straight contest in 27 constituencies between the BJP and the alliance candidates. However, the BJP is supporting film actress Sumalatha in Mandya constituency after the alliance decided that JDS will field Devegowda's grandson Nikhil Kumaraswami as its candidate. The seat had been won by Sumalatha's husband and film actor Ambareesh in 2014 for Congress. He died in December 2018. Sumalatha waited upon the Congress for quite sometime to be nominated, only to be disappointed.

The alliance has come as a Godsend for the Devegowda family to promote its dynastic hold over the JDS. Devegowda himself is fighting from Tumkur

and another grandson Prajwal Revanna is fighting from Hassan. All three constituencies are considered to be Vokkaliga bastion with considerable following for the Gowda family. They are quite likely to be won by the party.

Sons of former CMs

Shimoga has had an interesting contest with sons of two former chief ministers facing each other. Here the JDS has fielded Madhu Bangarappa against sitting MP, B. Y. Raghavendra, son of former BJP chief minister Yeddyurappa. In the neighbouring Chikamagalur-Udupi constituency, Shobha Karndalaje, close confidante of Yeddyurappa is pitted against Pramode Madhawaraj of Congress. Shobha seems to have

Metropolitant Bangalore has three seats. All three were won by the BJP last time. Bangalore South was won six times in a row by late Union Minister Ananthkumar who died in December last year. His widow Tejaswini was aspiring for the BJP ticket but the choice fell upon Tejasvi, a young advocate. It has annoyed the Brahmins in the elite constituency. But he is all likely to retain it for the BJP. Only Muslim nominee of the Congress Rizwan Arshad has been fielded from Bangalore Central against sitting BJP MP P. C. Mohan. Last time Rizwan lost narrowly against Mohan. Bangalore North has predominance of Vokkaliga voters. Two Gowdas, Union

Minister Sadananda Gowda and State Minister Byregowda are facing each other. It will be hazardous to make a guess about the outcome although the latter has an upperhand.

Arithmetic and Chemistry

The BJP has a solid grip on the Mangalore seat too where it should have no difficulty in retaining it, given the polarizing campaign it has been running for decades. In several South Karnataka seats such as Chamrajnagar, Mysore, Kolar, Chitradurga etc, though arithmetic may favour the alliance, chemistry between the two parties does not. Only last year the Congress and the JDS fought a tough battle on the turf

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he Supreme Court has been approached by a Muslim couple from Pune seeking women's entry into mosques for worshipping. The couple has pleaded that Islam and the Quran do not place any bar on women entering and worshiping inside a mosque and it was normal for women to pray inside mosques during the time of the Prophet and in the early Islamic era. They have contended that several mosque managements have turned down their plea for allowing women to pray inside mosques while a few sects such as Mujahideen in Kerala allow

and facilitate their prayers.

It is a widely-known fact that women used to stand in rows behind the men even as the Prophet led the prayers in the Masjid-e Nabawi. This allowed them to make a quick exit and avoid intermingling of men and women. Hadiths also relate instances when the Prophet would shorten prayers if he heard the cries of kids who would accompany mothers to the mosques. It is also quite well known that a woman congregant at a Friday sermon questioned the second caliph Hazrath Umar about the dress he wore for the occasion as it was made out of clothes procured from the war

Not a Prohibitory Diktat

Praying inside a mosque is not a serious enough issue to approach the apex court. It is more in the nature absence of logistics required for segregation of sexes.

Over the centuries, Islam entered several societies and geographies and the practice of women praying in the mosques took various forms as per the local conditions, architectural layout of the mosques and the prevalent security conditions. As a whole, mosques in South Asia did not

make any special provision for women to pray inside, though not expressly prohibiting

them. Yet, some sects such as Ahl-e Hadith all across the region and Mujahideen in Kerala generally allowed them entry and even arranged segregation of the two sexes within the premises. In more enlightened societies such as Egypt, women continued to worship inside mosques. In orthodox societies such as Saudi Arabia and other states in the Arabian peninsula, women were kept off mosques. But women

from all these societies migrating to nations in Europe and America found the environment freer and

share the sacred spaces just as their male counterparts do. The South Asian clerical establishment takes the position that though the holy Prophet directed his followers not to restrain women from entering mosques, they should not be encouraged to pray there either as mingling of sexes is fraught with moral hazards. This is more in the nature of a cautionary approach rather than a

prohibitory diktat. That some mosques do not have adequate space to allow women's use of the

space is partly the reason to avoid making a provision for them. Others may be apprehensive about their security during prayers at dawn and afterdusk.


> The issue is not serious enough to secure a judicial ruling or directive in the matter. However, with changes

in times and the in the role of

women, it seems imperative that women be allowed inside the mosques located inside or near colleges, universities, workplaces, vacationing sites and shopping areas. It is a common sight for burga-clad women to stand outside the mosques even as men worship inside mosques in such places.

With a bit of management of logistics more mosques can make provision for women to pray within their premises. Modern architecture allows cellars, basements, side halls, upper floors and acoustics to take care of such segregation of sexes within mosques. One hopes the issue does not snowball into a contentious controversy with the community and leaders taking irreconcilable stands with media in the middle to inflame passions and pitting up 'hardliners' against 'reformists'

Palestinian Researcher receives two Patents for a drug that promises to cure Alzheimer's

Thabat Khatib, a Palestinian Neuroscience Researcher, has had an idea of developing a drug with a new formulation that would combat dementia in the elderly. Her dream of finding acure to one of the most common, incurable diseases in the world, Alzheimer's, had just begun. The Palestinian scientist has led an academically-promising life; Khatib graduated from the Arab American high school in Jenin in 2009 with a success rate of 98%. She then joined the Biology and Biotechnology program at the Faculty of Science and Arts in the Arab American University, graduating with a grade-pointaverage of 3.95. Most people would stop at this point, but the aspiring neurologist has chosen to continue and applied for the Masters Programs at the Life Sciences Department at Al-Najah University, graduating with a rate of 4. Her pursuit of a Ph.D. saw her submitting applications to a number of European universities; the University of Aberdeen, the fifth oldest university in Britain, approved her application and provided her with a scholarship to followher passion at the Faculty of Medicine. In 2018, in just three years, she earned her Ph.D. and went on to work as a post-doctoral researcher at Aberdeen University's Neuroscience department. She has found passion in the neuroscience field and looked to find clinical cures and drugs to the diseases of the nervous system, especially Alzheimer's, a type of dementia that affects 50 million people worldwide.

During one of her experiments, Khatib noticed that many older



people who are diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease lack a chemical substance called retinoic acid, which causes a malfunction in the efficiency of the nervous system's neurons. The body cannot produce this chemical on its own and must acquire it from Vitamin A.; Khatib's idea was to synthetically-manufacture a more effective, more powerful form of retinoic acid in the form of a drug. Her work has secured more than EUR 400,000 in funding to the university, and she received the green light to begin drug preparations at the laboratory, as well as two patents for the idea.

Khatib stated that she hopes that clinical human trials would commence soon. "If everything goes smoothly, it will be the first drug of its kind in the world in terms of formulation and function and will benefit patients on a larger scale," she stated.

The scientist hopes that one day she can return to her homeland to teach and inspire younger girls in Palestine and the Arab world to pursue their dreams no matter the obstacles they face.

She had this to say when asked about her advice to students, "You should believe in yourselves and in your abilities and not give up regardless of the challenges you may face. With hard work and faith, you can achieve your dreams and do what is impossible."



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

Kamala Haasan's party Makkal Needhi Maiyam has put up Kameela Nasser, Maran lost in 2014 but had won from here in 2004 and 2009.

Coimbatore: P. R. Natarajan of CPI(M) is pitted against C. P. Radhakrishna of BJP. Two communist parties are in alliance with DMK and Congress. Radhakrishnan was elected from here in 1998 and 1999. In 2014, P. Nagarajan of AIADMK.

Chennai South: Jayavardan of AIADMK vs. Kalanidhi Veeraswamy, son of former Minister Arcot Veeraswamy of DMK.

Karur: Lok Sabha Deputy Speaker M. Thambidurai of AIADMK is pitted against youth leader of the Congress Jothi Mani.

UTTARAKHAND

Nainital: Former CM Harish Rawat of Congress vs. BJP's Ajay Bhatt vs. Navneet Agrawal of BSP. Sitting MP is Bhagat

Rampur: SP leader Azam Khan vs. film actress Jaya Prada of the BJP vs. Sanjay Kapoor of the Congress. Jaya Prada recently joined the BJP. She was earlier with SP and TDP of Chandrababu Naidu. In 2014, the seat was won by Dr. Nepal Singh of BJP who



trounced Naseer Ahmed Khan of SP. In 2004 and 2009, Jaya

Prada was elected from here. Both times she was with SP.

Mathura: Film actress Hema Malini of the BJP who is sitting MP is pitted against Mahesh Pathak of the Congress and SP-BSP-RLD combine's Kunwar Narendra Singh. In

Gorakhpur: Ravi Kishan, Bhojpuri film starhas been fielded by the BJP vs. Ram Bhual Nishad of SP which has alliance with BSP and RLD. This seat was won by current UP Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath four times. But since was appointed CM after Assembly election, he resigned. In the ensuing byelection, SPnominee Praveen Nishad was elected.

WEST BENGAL

Basirhat: Tollywood actress Nusrat Jahan, is the Trinamool Congress Party (TMC) candidate from this Muslim dominated constituency. She is pitted against Pallab Sengupta of CPI and BJP's Sayantan Basu. Idris Ali of TMC won this seat in 2014 against CPI's Nurul Huda.

Baharampur: Sitting MP Adhir Ranjan chowdhury of Congress is facing Apurba Sarkar of TMC, Eid Mohammed of RSP and Krishna Juardar Arya of the BJP. Adhir has won the seat four times.

Malda North: Mausam Benazir Noor of TMC vs. Khagen Murmu of BJP vs. Isha Khan of Congress. Both are party deserters. Noor won the seat in 2014 on Congress ticket while Murmu was with CPI(M). Noor and Isha Khan are cousins. Noor and Khan come from veteran Congress leader A. B. A. Ghanikhan Chowdhury's family who represented this constituency several times and passé away in 2006.

Malda South: Abu Hasem of Congress vs. Dr. Moazzem Hossain of TMC vs. Sreerupa Mitra Choudhary of the BJP. The Left Front has not fielded any candidate and it seems like they are supporting the Congress. Mitra quit the TMC in 2015. Abu Hassem is Ghanikha Choudhury's brother and had his early years in Toronto, Canada.

as bitter foes.

Never Defeated

The BJP had a free run of several constituencies in North Karnataka in 2014. With Little influence of the JDS in those areas, the contest is almost straight between Congress and the BJP. In Kalburgi (previously Gulbarga), veteran Congressman Mallikarjuna Kharge sits pretty and has remained undefeated for a record eleven times, of which twice for the Lok Sabha. Even Bidar is considered a safe seat for the Congress where Karnataka Congress President Eshwar Khandre is pitted against sitting

BJP MP Bhagwanth Khuba. Ballary was won by the BJP in 2014 but lost to Congress in byelection in 2017. Veena Kashappanavar is the only woman candidate of the Congress who has been fielded from Bagalkote. She belongs to one sect among the Lingayaths.

In seats like Vijayapura, Dharward, Davangere, Koppala, and Belgaum, Lingayaths form sizeable chunk of voters. The BJP has worked assiduously to woo them. But the former Siddramaiah Government passed a legislation favouring a section of them. It recommended a religious minority status for the community which follows the 12th century saint Basavanna. It is to be seen how this factor works in the Lok Sabha constituencies. During Assembly elections it did not have much effect and majority of the Lingayaths still voted for the BJP.

Caste Dominates

Caste preferences have dominated the selection of candidates and campaigning. The electioneering was sans any issues although the northern districts are under the grip of severe drought and water scarcity. Though Karnataka was

the pioneering state in sanctioning private engineering, medical and other professional educational colleges, nearly all employment opportunities exist only in and around Bangalore. Life in districts and their headquarters is lackluster. The successive governments have failed to diversify development and employment opportunities. Industries and former industrial hubs such as Bhadravathi and Davangere have shut down one after another. The alliance did not do enough to raise Rafale deal issue and denial of opportunities to the Bangalore based HAL in a manner it deserved

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Bihar Electoral Scene

Caste Dominates, Attrition Afflicts both Alliances

By April 23, the State of Bihar had witnessed three phases of the seven-phase polls. But common masses seem to be a little indifferent, except looking enthusiastically towards outcome of elections in a couple of seats such as Begusarai where Kanhaiya Kumar of JNU is pitted against BJP's firebrand leader Giriraj Kishore.

There is a cliche repeatedly coined that caste plays a central role in the electoral behaviour of a voter, but no caste exceeds 12% of population, hence only a combination of caste can rule in a state like Bihar. Keeping this reality in mind every leading party is trying to accommodate maximum number of castes. Both the electoral alliances, National Democratic Alliance (NDA) led by Nitish Kumar and the Mahagathbandhan led by Tejaswi Yadav, Lalu Prasad's younger son, have tried their best to stitch a suitable combination. Janata Dal-United (JDU) led by Nitish Kumar, LokJantantrik Party (LJP) led by RamvilasPaswan and BJP comprise NDA while Mahagathbandhan consists of RJD, Congress, RLSP led by former union ministerUpendraKushwaha inthe NarendraModi government. HAM by former Chief Minister Jitan Ram Manjhi and VIP led by film set designer cum politician MukeshSahni.

BJP had been very flexible in ticket distribution after sensing the general anti- incumbency mood against them. It is fighting only on 17 out of 40 LokSabha seats from the State. It had won 22 seats alone in 2014 parliamentary elections. JDU also got 17 seats and LJP bagged six seats.

Contradictions Galore

In Mahagathbandhan, a lot of internal contradictions emerged during ticket distribution. Biggest alliance partner RJD is contesting on 20 seats, RLSP five, HAM and VIP 3 each. The Congress Party had to remain content with just nine seats. One seat has been given to CPI (ML-liberation) from RJD quota. Smaller parties were able to garner to get a bigger slice in proportion to their strength in theAssembly. According to political analyst Amit Kumar. "Parties with hardly one or two seats in the Bihar assembly got three to five seats while Congress with 30 seats in Assembly got around nine seats. The CPI(ML) has three seats in the Assembly but got just one seat in exchange of supporting Lalu Prasad's daughter Misa Bharti in Patliputra parliamentary seat." Left parties

have badly dented Nitish Government's image. Most thriving construction sector came to standstill due to unavailability of sand. Despite repeatedly claiming 'rule of law' in Bihar during the ongoing campaign, the ground reality tells a different tale.

Banking on Modi

Ever since Nitish Kumar switched sides by hopping over to the NDA, his political credibility has nosedived. Sensing this changed scenario Nitish Kumar is now banking more on Modi's developmental programmes than his own achievements. Janata Dal-United (JD(U) leader has been repeatedly taking the name of Modi, praising him and lauding his works, including different schemes.

The NDA alliance is also facing anti-incumbency, both at the Centre and in the State. Being an agriculture dominated state, Bihar farmers underwent a severe agrarian crisis like lack of minimum support price, increasing cost of production etc.

According to senior journalist Imran Khan, "The truth is that even the Modi card does not seem to be clicking with the voters this time. Take, for example, the missing Modi euphoria in election campaign that has concluded for three phases out of the seven-phase poll.Now the NDA leaders have thrown out the development mask

and openly evoking nationalism

with communal connotation."

Lalu-RabriMorcha

It is the first time in three decades that Lalu is missing from electioneering in Bihar. Absence of Lalu Prasad have created a rift in his family and party. Lalu Prasad's elder son Tejpratap has raised a banner of revolt against his own party and fielded candidates from three constituencies Jehanabad. Sheohar and Saran from his newly floated forum 'Lalu-Rabri Morcha'. Adding insult to injury is desertion of some senior RJD leaders like M.A.Fatmi andRambadanRai after being denied ticket. In the ensuing confusion, the RJD is finding it very difficult to keep it's flock together.

The RJD is highlighting 'misrule of Nitish Kumar as well as that of NarendraModiGovernment. TejaswiYadav was very vocal against MuzaffarpurShelter Home rape case but by fielding the rape accused RajballabhYadav 's wife from Nawada, he has lost the moral ground.

There is a lot of dissatisfaction among every section of society with the NarendraModi's rule but alternative to it also does not create any enthusiasm among voters. Same old and worn-out faces are in the fray in both the alliances. There is not much difference in their style of politics, slogans and behavior. Although NDA is facing problems on various fronts but whether Mahagathbandhan will be able to tap the anger and resentment is the moot question.

In some areas, likeSeemanchal with a sizeable Muslim population, Mahagathbandhan is in comfortable position. Unlike the rest of Bihar, Seemanchal and regions (Kishanganj, Purnea, Katihar, Bhagalpur and Banka.) had voted against the BJP-led NDA in the 2014 polls despite the 'NarendraModiwave'.

If we look at the caste combination

of both alliances it seems both h a v e formidable caste alliance behind them. The NDA is relying on support of uppercastes, extremely backward castes (EBC) and and Dalit-

Nitish's alliance with the BJP has not gone down well with people. His mask of development has slipped off from the face of opportunism.

Mahadalitexcept Musasahar's who owe their allegiance to Jitan Ram Manjhi. In the case of Mahagathbandhan, in addition to old and reliable social base MY (Muslim-Yadav), the RJD is also eveing on caste base of its alliance partners like Kushwahas, Mallahs and Musars represented by RLSP, HAM and VIP.

RJD's Caste Bias

Mahagathbandhan will also get benefit by anti-Modi atmosphere created by various struggles launched by the Left-influenced organisations like farmer's unrest. worker's strike, intellectuals protest, students and youth's agitation etc. But the person who symbolised this protest and almost became a symbol of anti-Modi, is out of this Mahagthbandhan. Secular and democratic minded people were disappointed with the way RJD dealt with Kahaiya Kumar.The explanation given by RJD for the denial of ticket to Kanhaiya Kumar is that he belongs to the


The BhartiyaJanata Party (BJP) is in for trouble in Uttar Pradesh as the grand alliance of Samajwadi Party (SP), BahujanSamaj Party (BSP) and the RashtriyaLok Dal (RLD) is giving it a tough time in most constituencies across all regions of the vast state. In 2014, these parties had fought against the BJP separately giving it a huge advantage. The BJP won 73 of the 80 seats, leaving only two (Amethi and Rae Bareli) and five for the SP. Most of these seats had candidates from the families that dominate those political parties.

30 Seats at Stake

Thirty seats of western region which include Baghpat, Bijnore, Fatehpur, Meerut, Saharanpur, Agra, Ghaziabad, Bulandshahr, Fatehpur Sikri, Nagina, Hathras, Aligarh, Mathura, Muradabad, Sambhal, Mathura, Bareli, Rampur, Badayun, Aonla, Pilibhit, Etah and Firozabad may see a swing of fortunes for the contestants. These constituencies are predominantly inhabited by Jats, Gujjar, Muslims, Yadavs and Maurya communities. The three parties realized their joint potential when they came together to fight the byelections in Gorakhpur, Bulandshahar and Phulpur early last year. This initiated a dialogue between Mr.Akhilesh Yadav of SP, Mavawati of BSP and Ajit Singh of the RLD. A reckoning of the 2014 results shows that the BJP had won 30 seats by a margin ranging from five to ten thousand votes. By merely fielding a single candidate by the opposition parties, the anger against misrule of the BJP at the Centre and the State could be tapped for dislodging the BJP. Additionally, the farmers have totally turned against the BJP due to unremunerative prices for their produce. The party governments both at Delhi and Lucknow could not address the issue of arrears of sugarcane growers. This has only added the weight of incumbency.

Internal Understanding

The refusal to take the Congress into alliance and the entry of Priyanka Gandhi has, of course, rendered the fight triangular. But there seems to be an internal understanding between the Congress and the alliance partners. Consequently, the Congress has not fielded Muslim candidates in Muslim-dominated constituencies, lest the Muslim votes remain intact. Similarly, it has fielded Brahmin or uppercaste candidates wherever the RIP has nominated candidates from these

communities. This strategy seeks to erode the BJP's advantage. h Nyuntam Aay Yoj ana(NYAY) with a promise of Rs. 6,000 for each farmer every month, is also luring away farmers from the BJP. Congress has not fielded candidates against Mulayam Singh

Yadav in Mainpuri and AkhileshYadav in Azamgarh. It has been reciprocated by the alliance leaving Amethi and Rae

In 30 seats, the BJP won by a margin ranging from five to ten thousand votes. These seats are up for grab by candidates fielded by the three-party alliance.

Bareli for Rahul Gandhi and Sonia Gandhi.

BJP's Handicap

However, for the BJP the greatest handicap is that it has virtually no face to put up before the electorate. Ruling the Centre as well as the State, it is virtually answerless for its follies like demonetization, GST and failure to clean up river Ganga. Killing of hundreds of people, mob-lynching by cow vigilantes and high corruption in Government has left them with no excuse.

Faking Caste Certificate

The diffidence within the BJP could be gauged from the fact that BJP's sitting MP and candidate from Machchlishahar Ram CharitraNishad returned the BJP ticket and decided to join the SP. The SP has fielded him from Mirzapur. The furnishing of the fake caste certificate by Yogi Government Minister S. P. Baghel has also assumed importance. Baghel has produced the SC certificate to contest for the LS seat from Agra which is reserved for Scheduled Castes though he belongs to the OBC.

Mr. Om Prakash Rajbhar, a minister under Yogi Government too has deserted the BJP. He had



merged his Bharat Samaj Party on the eve of 2014LS elections. He wields considerable influence in eastern UP with seats like Varanasi, Bhadohi, Ballia, Chandauli, Ghazipur, Mau, and Azamgarh. The Nishad Party which controls the


votes of Nishads, the rowers of boat in rivers in eastern UP too has distanced itself from the BJP. It can take away BJP votes in constituencies of Gorakhpur, Ballia, SantKabir Nagar, Kushinagar, Maharajganj and Deoria.

Given these circumstances, poll pundits are not willing to give more than 35 seats from the State to the BJP at this juncture.

With BJP ruling the Centre and the State, the party is burdened with enormous weight of incumbency. The party has no answers on arrears of canegrowers, GST and demonetization

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POLITICAL ANALYSIS

Polling for the 20 LokSabha seats in Kerala took place on April 23. Battlelines were drawn between the two main fronts i.e., the United Democratic Front (UDF) consisting of the Indian National Congress, the Indian Union Muslim League, Kerala Congress (M) and the RSP on one side, and the Left Democratic Front (LDF) headed by the Communist Party of India Marxist (CPM) and the Communist Party of India (CPI). The BJP led a third front with two small parties allying with it and hopes to improve its vote-share. It is doubtful if it will be able to garner a single seat. However, the biggest piece of the news is that Congress President Rahul Gandhi has entered the fray from Wayanad in the State for a second seat contest (he is seeking election from the traditional Nehru-Gandhi seat in Amethi in Uttar

The Congress has fielded its candidate on 16 seats, leaving two for its long time ally Indian Union Muslim League (IUML). One seat had gone to Revolutionary Socialist Party (RSP), while the

lone remaining seat went to Kerala Congress (Mani group) nominee. On the rival side, CPM is contesting on 14 seats while two would be fielded as LDFsupported independents in Muslim-dominated Ponnani and Malappuram seats. The remaining four seats have gone to the CPI. Rest of the allies have not been given any seats.

In 2014 General Elections, the CPM won five seats, CPI one, Congress eight, Muslim League two, Kerala Congress one, RSP one and two seats (Chalakudy and Idukki) were won by independents supported by LDF.

No More than Two

The Congress has not conceded the IUML's demand for one more seat even this time. The IUML would thus be contesting on the old Ponnani and Malappuram (earlier it was Manjeri) seats. For some time the name of Mr. SirajEbrahim, son of late Ibrahim SulaimanSait, was bandied about for nomination on one additional

seat. But it seems the IUML local leadership did not press the claim and is keen to keep the party contented with two seats although the IUML has a streamlined organization in the state with nearly 23 lakh registered members. The IUML has pitted the old faces E. T. Mohammed Basheer from Ponnani and former Kerala minister KunhaliKutty from Malappuram, Sources pointed out that Congress may lose several seats if the IUML is not part of the UDF, yet has been successful in keeping the IUML's share confined to two seats. Even the lone RajyaSabha seat for the IUML has been used to nominate twice a Gulf based businessman P. V. Abdul Wahab who barely ever speaks in the Parliament.

Muslim Woman

The Congress has fielded a Muslim woman Ms. ShaniMol Usman from Alappuzha seat this time. A long time Congress member, she is one among the general secretaries of the All India Congress Committee (AICC).

Currently, LDF led by Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan is ruling the State. During the 2015 elections, the LDF trounced the UDF with a huge margin winning 91 of the 140 seats. Of these, the CPM bagged 58, CPI 19, Janata Dal Secular three, Nationalist Congress Party two and LDFsupported independents five.

Of the UDF's 47, the Congress's score was merely 22 while Muslim League could win 18. Kerala Congress had won six seats while another faction of Kerala Congress was successful on one seat. Even this impressive score by the IUML has not yielded any more seats from the UDF in 2019 Lok Sabha elections.

Godsend for the BJP

2015 was the first Assembly election when the BJP could open its account in the Legislative Assembly with success on one seat. The BJP is now trying it utmost to secure at least one seat from the State in LokSabha. Anywhere it can come closer to success is Trivandrum. It is using Sabarimala verdict allowing women aged between 10 and 50 years to visit the Sabarimala temple to garner sympathy from women voters. The party which first welcomed the verdict, took a

The IUML has failed to press its claim for one more seat from the UDF of the 20 seats in the State. It seems to be content. with two.

U-turn and went against it feeling pockets of opposition against the verdict in tradition-loving sections. It is doubtful if this sympathy can translate into a seat. U-turns

The Congress too has reversed its

stand on Sabarimala, Congress President Rahul Gandhi however made it clear that his party in the State had a different stand against what he thought was right. The party fearing that the BJP would cut into the Congress votebank, thought it prudent to take a stand against the verdict. However the LDF did not budge from its stand of implementing the Sabarimala verdict and provided protection to the few women activists who attempted to enter the sanctum sanctorum. The Left even organized a Women's Wall in support of the verdict on January 1, 2019 when 3.5 lakh women formed a hand-linked chain along the 620-km National Highway running the State.

Besides Sabarimala entry, the issues that dominate the public discourse during the run-up to the election are flood and disaster management and drought and water scarcity.



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Civil Services Exam Results

Najeeb, the missing student of the JNU was his hostel mate and ShahidRaza has been an eyewitness to ABVP's assault against Najeeb after which he went missing in 2016. He has appeared before the CBI in this case. Raza says he would continue to help Najeeb's mother Fathima Nafees in this case.

Mirza Khader Baig, a BE in Electronics & Communication who was ranked 336th in the Civil Services exam this year, hails from Davangere in Karnataka. Son of Mirza Ismail and Habeeba, he was encouraged by his parents to appear for the UPSC competition. Following his BE, Baig studied in France leading to an MS Degree and later worked with the German multinational company ABB. This was his second attempt at the civil services exam.

Mohammed Abdul Jaleel from Kerala received his coaching at the Zakat Foundation of India's coaching centre in Delhi and secured 434th rank among the 759 candidates declared successful this year. He is a graduate from NIIT, Calicut. His father worked in Dbu Dhabi for several years. He chose Political Science and International Relations as optional subject for the

He selected Urdu as one of the subjects for the exam as Computer Science was not among the options. He said there is no discrimination in selection of candidates for the UPSC.

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Jamaat Elects a New President

Sved SadathullahHussaini is the new President (Ameer) of the Jamaat e Islami Hind. He was elected on April 3 for a four-year term by the 157-member Representative Council (Majlis e Numaindagan).

An electronic engineer, he hails from Aurangabad, but had spent considerable part of hislife in Hyderabad. He has also authored a few books. At 48, he is the voungest person ever to be elected the Ameer of the Jamaat which has been meticulously democratic in its organizational structure all through its 70 years of history. Mr. T. Arifali is the new General Secretary (Oavvim) of the Jamaat while Mr. Ameenul Hassan from Tamil Nadu and Mohammed Jaafer from Patna are new vice presidents.

The Jamaat would need to overhaul its ideological position to align itself with the trends of time.

The change at the apex has come about after nearly 12 years when the top post was held by Maulana Jalaluddin Umari forthree terms. The new set of office-bearers ismuch younger and is expected to bring about new changes in the policy and performance of the JIH which is the only cadre-based organization with pan-Indian presence. However archaic the Jamaat may appear to an external observer, given its insistence on orthodox Islam, the Jamaat apparatus is modern in its structure inasmuch as democracy prevails at all levels and most of the office-bearers mainly come from modern educational institutions, rather than madrassas.

Tenacity

That the Jamaat has survived in its present shape for 70 years is a tribute to its tenacity. Nearly all Muslim organizations have suffered splits latest being the TablighiJamaat during their course of life. Credit for the same must go tothe Jamaat's structure and organization which absorbs shocks and accommodates differences. Ideology rather than personalities have reigned supreme. No dynasties can take roots within its organization which bases itself on altruism rather than projection of individuals.

In a Groove

Yet there is a general perception that the Jamaat has entered a groove and finds it difficult to come out of it. Its main ideologue and founder, Maulana Abul Ala Maudoodi, who hailed from Aurangabad but migrated to Lahore after Partition, was a great

organizer but had less than adequate exposure of the new sciences, particularly humanities and modern languages in which the new scholarship germinated. He wrote nearly seventy books, all in Urdu, and raised a well-knit organization and left training modules which tailored articulate and devout workers. The Jamaat has largely followed the same ideology despite passage of around 40 years after his death. The changes in the ambience since his death have been breathtaking due to arrival of new technology which essentially goes into the organization of the society. Except for a book titled Magasid e Shariat by Dr. Nejatullah Siddiqui, no new literature has been added to the corpus of books that crystallize the Jamaat ideology. An average worker of the Jamaat still takes the aims and objectives laid down by Maulana Maudoodi to be the be-all and-end all of all ideas

Constricted Space

Though the Jamaat at one time considered secularism, nationalism and democracy to be the bane of modern civilizations, it has come to realize the futility of opposing them, especially now that the rise of Hindutva is constricting space for diversity. It is more out of compulsion rather than conviction. Similar is the case of 'composite culture'. It was berated by the Jamaat journals till the late 1980s. But no longer so.

Clerical Stranglehold

Jamaat has failed to break free from the stranglehold of clerics from UP and Bihar who are unfortunately thought to represent mainstream Islam in India. It has towed their line on major issues in which most of the clericdominated bodies be it the Muslim Personal law Board, Majlis e Mushawarat, JamiatulUlema or the Milli Council have pursued the reactionary path. This acts as an albatross around the Jamaat's neck. Predominance of rhetoric on ittehad (unity) restrains them from

taking a progressive stand on issues that are touted as central to the Shariat. This Shariat fixation has led the Jamaat to be part of the crowd on issues like Shah Bano case, Babri Masjid and Triple Talag. While many within the Jamaat would privately concede that Shariat is not a fixed code, the Jamaat as a whole refrains from breaking ranks. This dilemma however, dogs the Muslims as a whole and few have the guts and gumption to stand upto the clerics who are out to serve their vested interests and protect their

It is after 12 years that the Jamaat has brought in a new and younger face at the top

livelihoods in a much narrower sense. One would watch with keen interest how the Jamaat approaches the issue of entry of women into the mosques. Except recycling the old literature and postulations on Shariat, the Jamaat has failed to offer any new insight in the light of the 20th-21th century context. It is smug with satisfaction that all that could be said for the peace, progress and prosperity of human society has already been laid down in the holy text and nothing other than its rewording can be attempted. This attitude of comfort zone-living has led to romanticisation of the past and over-glorification of history. It smothers innovation and creativity.

Dichotomy

Jamaat's stand on human rights, gender rights, freedom of expression etc too has been extremely selective. It failed to condemn the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's bombing of Yemen, nor did it voice its opinion on murder of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi inside the Saudi consulate in Istanbul last October. While on the issue of Hadiya's conversion to Islam, it rightfully supported freedom of religion, one failed to hear anything on murder of Hindu boy Ankit (in the Nangloi village of Delhi) who was in love of Muslim girl Shehzadi Begum leading to boy's murder by parents and other kin of the girl. However, such dichotomy is commonplace among all Muslim bodies which makes their championing of modern values such as human rights, gender rights, freedom of expression and commitment to the Constitution

Haj House Centre Wins Big in UPSC

Mumbai: The civil services coaching centre at the city's Haj House, which until now has had limited success in pushing Muslim youth towards civil services, got a boost, after three of its alumni were recently selected by the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC).

Junaid Ahmad, who hails from Bijnaur in Uttar Pradesh and was trained at the IAS and Allied Coaching and Guidance Cell, run by the Centre's Haj Committee of India (HCI), for two years between 2013 and 2015, ranked third nationally in the UPSC examination. The other two successful aspirants – Zaib Shaikh, from Ahmednagar, and Mohammed Mustafa Aejaz, from Mehboob Nagar in Telangana – were placed at the 225th and 613th positions, respectively.

An HCI official said the news of these achievements has generated a renewed interest and awareness about the coaching facility among the community. "Ever since the UPSC results were declared on April 5, we have been receiving enquiry calls from all across the country. I still get around 50 calls every day," he said. Last year, as many as 6,732 graduates from across the country had applied for the centre's entrance test, up from around 1,500 registrations in 2017. This year, the HCI officials expect the number of applications to increase even further - the last day to apply is May 7. The Cell was established in August 2009, in the backdrop of the Sachar Committee report, which found that Muslims lagged behind most of the other communities in the country in educationally, economically and politically. Since then, the Muslim representation in civil services has improved to some extent. Of 1,099 candidates who

cleared the civil services examination last year 50 (4.5%) were Muslims, the highest since Independence. So far, the coaching centre has produced seven UPSC achievers, including the three who were selected this year. Several other alumni have joined other government agencies, including Reserve Bank of India, Central Excise Department and various state services. According to S.A.M Hashmi, the founder director, who headed the cell between 2010 and 2013, lack of proper leadership at HCI and the cell is to be blamed for its slow progress. "The leaders lacked either academic experience or administrative experience or both," said Hashmi, who was principal at Akbar Peerbhoy College, Grant Road, and now heads a coaching academy at Mumbra.

He mentioned the document preserved in Sinai's St. Catherine Church in which Prophet Muhammad has ordered Muslims to treat Christians well Prof. Akhtarul Wasey, Vice Chancellor of Maulana Azad University of Jodhpur, said the joint statement of the Vatican and Al-Azhar is an important landmark for better Muslim-Christian relations which nobody can disagree with. Doing them at home was risky, as the electricity was too unreliable to trust it with a matter of life and death. Then in June last year, Majd Mashharawi. a Palestinian energy entrepreneur, installed a prototype of the solar power system she has pioneered into Samar's home. "Now, I don't have to worry every day whether I can go to the hospital," Samar said. "I do not have to run anymore to be

"It's saving lives," said Mashharawi, 25, proudly from her office in Gaza City. The civil engineer is the CEO of Sunbox, a three-component system that is made up of a solar panel, a generator, and a battery, and is marketed as a sustainable and affordable solution to Gaza's energy crisis. With Sunbox installed, it allowed the hospital to set up an oxygen tank in Samar's home, giving her the freedom of no longer having to walk her son to the hospital for treatment.

According to Majd, the system is about using the resources that Gaza has in abundance, such as sunlight.

An important part of what the business does is to educate the families "about solar energy and how to use it within each package we provide".

And the Palestinian businesswoman has just had some good news. SunBox was awarded a tender from the aid organisation Action Against Hunger to install photovoltaic (PV) solar systems for 10 desalination plants over Gaza

Green Cake's Market

It's a reward for hard work and determination for the young businesswoman, who first made a name with a project using the adversity faced by Gaza, under an Israeli-imposed siege for 12 years, to find energy solutions for its struggling population. Her first project, "Green Cake", sought to turn wood and coal ash into construction bricks. The plan was to rebuild the structures destroyed in the last three devastating Israeli assaults on Gaza. Though they created almost 30 jobs, built just under 40 buildings and sold over 50,000 blocks, the project struggled to maintain its market in Gaza. She has now expanded

Green Cake's market by looking towards buyers in Dubai and the US, but Majd is convinced that Sunbox will be more successful. In the last quarter of 2018, they had installed over 80 systems across Gaza, giving electricity to 800 people, and the number is rising. Now it is almost one thousand people. We provided for houses,

small business and big companies." Since winning the tender of an international Spanish NGO, she expects to hit revenues of \$400,000 in 2019. For 2020-2021, she expects \$1m by penetrating markets in the West Bank and South Africa. To date, they have built systems for a commercial mall in Gaza called Alulu and the transportation company Abu-Olba. The 20 percent earned from these tenders feeds healthy discounts to families in the Strip, sometimes even up to 100 percent of all costs. "Many families, I've seen them change just from having a solar system installed. You are giving light, you are giving hope for these people," Majd said.

Majd's solar package not only scales down the benefits of a larger solar farm, it is also comparatively inexpensive. The cheapest model runs at \$350 and allows a family to charge laptops and phones, run small electricals, and have light for up to 12 hours per day. The second starts at \$600 and does the same but can supply up to 20 hours and power large appliances such as refrigerators. Majd said that the company can provide as many

combinations of batteries and generators as needed with an increasing price structure.

Independent from the Grid

One of the main attractions is the payment system, where households can spread the cost of the device over a number of years. The driving force behind the flexible approach is a solution to an electric grid which is dependent on politics, "We wanted to keep it totally independent from the grid," Majd says. "It's ridiculous, it's getting worse: Israel targeted the main power plant in Gaza to put pressure on the government. We want people to be independent of these political issues. Traditionally seen as a maledominated industry in Gaza, many were surprised at Majd's choice to become an engineer. Success has not been an easy road. "It's very hard to be the first. If you were a man, everyone would clap for you," she said. Yet she remains hopeful of how small businesses can transform lives.

In 2006, Israel destroyed Gaza's only power plant, worsening the humanitarian crisis. In the 2014 war on Gaza, Israel shelled the power plant again, on a heavy day of bombardment and fighting that killed at least 100 people. The wars and siege have left Gaza dependent on the limited energy supplied by the West Bank's Palestinian Authority (PA).

Salah told Time that while his attitudes toward gender equality had evolved over the years, he wanted to see more change."I think we need to change the way we treat women in our culture,"



Salah was quoted as saying. "It's not optional." He said the treatment of women "in my culture and in the Middle East" had changed his opinions on gender issues. "I support the woman more than I did before, because I feel like she deserves more than what they give her now,

at the moment," Salah told the magazine.

Salah is an icon in Egypt after helping the country qualify for the 2018 World Cup, the first time they had reached the finals of the event since 1990.

He was named African Footballer of the Year in 2017 and 2018 and was also English football's Player of the Year in 2017-2018 following a dazzling season with Liverpool.

He told Time he has learned to cope with the "little bit of pressure" that comes with his elevated profile, while expressing pride at being regarded as a role model.

"To be the first Egyptian in this situation and no one has done this before... it's something different," he said, insisting that superstardom had not changed his lifestyle. "I just live my life normal," he said. "Most of the time I stay at home, I don't like to goout."

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Ramadan: Best Time to Ban Smoking

Ramadan, the holy month is the best time, especially for Muslims, to abandon the distasteful habit of puffing as well as to put a comprehensive ban on it.

I vividly remember once, I saw an Imam inhaling the last few tokes of a cigarette while making his way into the masjid to lead the Zuhrprayer.

In another masjid, a smoker joined the congregation and stood right next to me. I presume, like the Imam, this neighbour had just taken puffs of a cigar before entering the masjid. The strong smell was terribly irritating. It was difficult for me to concentrate on salah. After a while, I could not take it anymore. I moved back to join the row behind. I have had such unpleasant experiences in masjids on several occasions.

I have seen fathers smoking in family cars, exposing other family members including infants to second hand smoke (SHS). Such an irresponsible act can also involve the risk of? res within the vehicles.

Health at Risk

I have seen teenagers flaunt cancer sticks between their lips while riding motorbikes. Such juvenile delinquency places their and others' health at risk. They squander their parents' money and contaminate the atmosphere.

Educational institutions are meant to foster talents and nurture future leaders. Unfortunately, many universities (and even secondary schools) have turned into havens for cigarette consumption.

Some contributing factors are peer pressure and the easy access to cigarettes. What is more, some of these addicts to nicotine are disciples of their parents.

I am sure that I am not alone in experiencing these situations. The smoking habit has penetrated into people of all levels and professions.

While smokers can potentially pollute public spaces, the rights of non-smokers to breathe clean air and not to be exposed to SHS are regularly violated.

Children's right to a healthy environment and their health interest are contravened. In many cases, the perpetrators are their own parents.

As regards the teenage smokers, in all likelihood their money to buy ciggies comes from indulgent parents. This also tells us about the poor parenting practices of many in society.

Economic Exploitation

Many adult smokers are not highly educated and belong to the low-income group. A large portion of their earning is spent on cigars and on treatment for diseases caused by tobacco consumption. This is one of the worst forms of economic exploitation of the poor by rich tobacco companies and multinationals operating across geographical boundaries.

To the consumer's detriment, decades of promotion exercises especially through deceptive advertisements have neutralised the harms of smoking.

Most cigarette-producing, rich countries have progressively imposed advertising bans and legal restrictions on tobacco consumption, especially in public places. It would be an interesting topic for research to find out if they have commensurately reduced the amount of cigarette production in their lands. If not, a logical conclusion is that they use other countries to dump their cigarettes and earn foreign currency thereby. This is a new imperial strategy and justifies cigarette's another name, "little white slaver".

Unfortunately, in today's world, Muslim-majority countries are at the receiving end of this profiteering, economic exploitation. A 2006 research – "Influence of Islam on smoking among Muslims" – published in British Medical Journal showed that some of the highest tobacco-consuming countries in the world were Yemen, Indonesia, Tunisia and Guinea.

Awareness is not Enough

Most smokers are aware of the harmful consequences of their addictive habit. So creating awareness through education is not all we need to do. Instead, what is now required is gradual but comprehensive ban on smoking and its strict enforcement.

Islam and Smoking

Importantly, addictive behaviours such as cigarette smoking and alcoholism – as either a lifestyle choice or stress-alleviating factor – cannot be justified in Islam.

Islam does not permit smoking or alcohol drinking in any such circumstances. It is not Islamically acceptable to resort to such practices to alleviate one's

In Islam, "health is a trust from God that should be protected and enhanced so as to be able to fulfill the purpose of creation" (Jamal Badawi). Therefore, Islam prohibits unhealthy practices – including smoking – that are injurious to one's own health or that of others.

Seizing the Ramadan Opportunity

Ramadan, the holy month is the best time, especially for Muslims, to abandon the distasteful habit of puffing as well as to put a comprehensive ban on it. I hope governments of Muslim-majority countries will use the month to start the process of totally banning cigarettes.

If some countries can set such an example, many others will hopefully follow their bold and courageous lead.

My First Experience of Fasting in Ramadan

When I reached my seventh year, I heard people speak a lot about Ramadan. They were very excited. One day, when I was playing with a toy my father had given me, my elder sister said to me in a firm voice: "Shaban! You have to get up at night and observe fasting". I was paralyzed at that instant! A deep nervousness occupied me. I left my toy on the ground and started thinking how fasting would feel to me. I questioned my three brothers about Ramadan. They explained it as a commandment of Allah ordained on us and which we had to obey. One of them said: "We are committed slaves of Allah. If we keep the fast, Allah will reward us after death, and if a child keeps a fast, Allah, being pleased with his innocence, agility and strength, will be highly impressed with him".

With this thought of being rewarded by Allah, I crouched down on the bed with my father, I stared into the glittering stars in the open sky. I was bewildered at how the people were able to control their hunger and abstain from eating and drinking for such a long period of time.

Around 3 a.m. someone gently touched me and said: "Shaban! Get up, will you not observe the fast? Abbu is having bread mixed with milk and sugar for Sehri".

Hearing this, I got up and ran in the other direction. My sister stopped me, held my arm and took me to the

kitchen. There, I saw my elder brothers and sisters having their Sehri. My elder brother warned me: "Have Sehri provided you observe the fast till Maghrib." My father, tapping my shoulder, said: "My cute child will keep the fast."

In the morning, I got up and searched for my toys to play. I went to my friends. They were sitting in a garden, where there were many mango trees with ripe fruits. We were five in number. The others had never fasted. When I told them about my fasting, they took it as joke and said "You and fasting in this age? It is impossible!"

I brushed aside their comments and we started to play a game. At the end, we felt thirsty. The others went to drink but I refused, saying "I am fasting. I cannot break my fast".

I was feeling extremely thirsty and my throat was parched. I started gulping my saliva. Yet, I never thought of breaking my fast. I was sweating---it was the extreme heart of June. I returned home. Instead of rebuking me, my sister, whom I love the most in my family, made me lie down in a room and waved a fan above me, which she had made with her own hands, so as to circulate air so that I may sleep.

and I found myself on the bed, I came to the kitchen, from where a delicious smell was emerging. I saw my sister's forehead wet with sweat. She said to me mildly: "Go to the mosque, where your brothers are glorifying Allah". I headed towards the mosque. On the way, my friends watched me with surprise. I was glad to think that this was the first time I was keeping the fast. I was going to be included as one of Allah's righteous slaves, as most people think.

Inside the mosque, I gently took a copy of the Quran. I opened the first chapter and a current of joy and excitement ran through me. I spontaneously started reciting. This is a celestial book, and it is guidance for mankind as my sister had explained the day before.

With every passing second during the fasting I felt myself very lucky because I was going to fulfill one command of Allah. I had seen my family members fasting during the entire month of Ramadan. Today I was one of them.

It was now time for Iftar. I sat crossed-legged on a mat with my father, who was very proud of me. Every member gave me different food items from their plate, My father announced: "Today, my cute son will inaugurate. He will eat



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e must always realise that duties of worship aim primarily at the formulation of an attitude of mind which governs the behavior of the believer, which develops his conscience and helps him offer his worship in the proper manner and adopt a good standard of behavior in life. From our point of view, we must always take the religion of Islam as a whole, as Allah willed it to be, with all the duties it imposes on us and look at it in the light of our overall duty of obedience to Allah in every respect. We must take it as a perfect, harmonious whole, which includes situations which require strenuous effort and situations of ease and concession, trusting the wisdom of Allah who knows best. Fasting was first made an obligation in the second year after the Prophet's (Pbuh) settlement in Madinah. As a new duty, fasting was very hard for Muslims. Allah, therefore, gave a concession to those who find fasting too much of a strain and who can do it only with great difficulty. They were allowed not to fast, provided that they feed a needy person. He also made it clear to them that to feed the needy is highly commendable, whether it is done voluntarily, i.e, not in compensation for not fasting, or by doing more than the minimum required. The compensation required for making use of this concession is to feed one person for each day one does not fast, and increase it to feed two or three or more needy people for each day. This is the meaning of the statement-"He who does good of his own account does himself good thereby". Allah follows this by recommending that fasting has great benefits for us. Most immediately apparent to us is the fact that it teaches self control, bearing hardships and making a conscious preference of obeying Allah, even at the expense of one's

own rest and comfort.

These recommendations were made preliminary to the withdrawal of this concession from all people who are healthy and living at home. Fasting was soon to be made obligatory, without any concession. The concession continues only in the case of the elderly who find fasting much too hard to bear and are not fasting in Ramadan, but fasting on some other days. Imam Malik, the Prophet's companion, lived until he was no longer able to fast. He used to compensate for it by feeding the hungry. It applies only to the very old, men or women, who cannot fast. They are allowed to compensate by feeding a needy person for each day of Ramadan. It is the Quran that built the Muslim nation and Muslims must always be thankful to Allah for revealing the Quran to them and they cannot express their thanks better than by fasting in

Fasting - A Duty of Obedience to Allah

Believers, fasting is decreed for you as it was decreed for those before you, so that you may remain God-fearing! Fast a certain number of days. But whoever of you is ill, or on a journey, shall fast instead the same number of days later on. Those who find fasting a strain too hard to bear may compensate for it by the feeding of needy persons. Ramadan, the month in which the Ouran was revealed. "It was in the month of Ramadan that the Quran was revealed, a guidance for mankind and as a self evident proof of that guidance as a standard to distinguish right from wrong." This is the verse which imposes the duty of fasting in Ramadan on all Muslims who are healthy and living at home, abrogating the earlier concession except in the case of the elderly people. "Hence, whoever of you is present in that month shall fast throughout it"- this means, anyone who lives to see the month of Ramadan. It imparts to the Muslim a special quality of kindly forbearance which helps him fulfill all his duties and obligations as well as all his serious activities in life with an air of ease which is akin to the flow of water or to the growth of a tree. He is always reassured, confident and happy as he always feels Allah's mercy, and His desire that His servants should have ease, rather than hardship. The ill and the travellers are allowed to fast on later days so that they have a chance to fast a number of days equivalent to a full month, so that they do not lose any of the reward Allah gives for lasting: "You are required to complete the necessary number of days and to extol the greatness of Allah for having guided you aright.'

Fasting is indeed a blessing from Allah, for which He deserves to be thanked and magnified. "Allah says of Himself: "I am indeed near, I answer the prayer of the supplicant when he calls to Me." How kind, compassionate and friendly. With such friendliness from Allah and closeness to him, the difficulty of fasting, no matter how great, appears very trivial. Every

word in this verse adds to the air of friendliness and compassion. The fact that Allah considers the people His own, and answers them directly also adds to the air of compassion. He has not instructed His messenger to tell his people: "I am near." He Himself gives the answer directly to His servants as soon as the question is made. He has not said "I hear their prayers", but has assured them immediately by answering their prayers.

It is indeed a verse which fills the hearts of the believers with friendly reassurance and complete confidence. It makes their life happy, peaceful and secure. In this atmosphere of friendliness and compassion, Allah directs His servants to respond to Him and to believe Him. Their response and faith should lead them to be wise and to follow the right path. Thus, the final benefit from such response is theirs as well. Indeed, Allah does not need anyone. If people are wise and rightly guided, the benefit is theirs.



Five Psychological Benefits of Fasting

Fasting increases your sincerity to Allah which leads to true happiness.

As I mention in my book, "How to be a Happy Muslim Insha'Allah," the real source of happiness is a sincere relationship with Allah based on worshipping Him alone. Fasting is a very special type of worship. Allah says in a hadith qudsi, "Every deed of the son of Adam is for him except fasting; it is for Me and I shall reward for it..." (Bukhari, Muslim).

Islamic scholars have many ideas as to why Allah says that fasting is for Him alone. Some say that there is no "showing off" in fasting, since only Allah can know for sure if a person is fasting. Some scholars say that the phrase "it is for Me" means that fasting is the dearest act of worship to Allah.

Fasting is difficult and proves your sincere faith in Allah. Psychology research shows that our behavior shape our personalities; therefore fasting shapes us into more sincere Muslims.

2. Fasting increases your Self Esteem.

Self esteem is how we feel about ourselves; our sense of self worth. A high self esteem directly relates to our inner happiness. Fasting each day for a month is quite an accomplishment. Each day that we fast, we feel a sense of triumph. Not only are we obeying the command of Allah, we are gaining mastery over our physical desires. We should also feel good about ourselves because we are living a life pleasing to Allah, rather than the materialistic life that so many people choose. "O you who believe, eat from the good things We provided for you, and be thankful to God, if you do worship Him alone." (Holy Quran 2:172).


"...If you are thankful, He is pleased by it in you..." (Holy Quran 39:7)


Moral Values Attached to Fasting

A Qudsi Hadith states; "All actions a human being does are his, with the exception of fasting which belongs to Me. I reward it accordingly." (Related by Al-Bukhari).

here that another version of the same Qudsi Hadith may be translated as follows; "Fasting belongs to Me and it is Me who rewards it."

Show-Off or Deception

One may ask here why fasting has been singled out as belonging to Allah when all acts of worship are dedicated to Him. Moreover, any good action a believer does is normally done for Allah's sake. All scholars agree that this is because fasting cannot be done in order to gain favour with people, or for boastfulness, show-off or deception. This is due to the nature of fasting which is done by abstention rather than by any positive action. It is not possible for anyone to identify a fasting person by his or her appearance.



All other acts of worship can be seen by people. Hence, they may be done for purposes other than to please Allah and gain His reward. Not so fasting which can be known only if the person who fasts tells other people of his fasting. If a person goes around and tells other people of his voluntary fasting, then he may be seeking to win favours from them. But this is achieved through the act of telling them, not through fasting itself. Hence, when a person fasts for the sake of Allah alone, and does not tell people of the fact, his action is said to be dedicated purely to Allah. It is this fact which earns the person concerned that limitless reward. The Prophet also teaches us that there is another side to the reward

which fasting earns. He tells us that certain actions like prayers and charity (sadaqah) or Zakah ensure the forgiveness of past sins. Fasting is his on the list of these actions. There are numerous Hadiths which confirm this fact. We are told by the Prophet (Pbuh) that proper fasting, done with sincerity and dedication, ensures the forgiveness of all sins committed in the preceding year, with the exception of cardinal sins. Indeed, some Hadiths do not make that last exception. The Prophet says: "He who fasts in Ramadan motivated by his faith and with dedication will have all his past sins forgiven." (Related by Al-Bukhari).

It is for this reason that Muslims prepare themselves for the advent of Ramadan with the resolve to make all their worship, fasting and prayers included, free of any trace of hypocrisy. They are keen to

In determining how the Qur'an establishes criteria for human development, we can begin by exploring verse 1 of Surah Al-Mulk (67:1).

The literal meaning of this verse is: "Blessed be He in whose hands is Dominion: And He over all things hath Power" [Yusuf Ali]. The Arabic word ¿ò-»'Barakah' in this verse has been translated as 'Blessed.' But the word 'Blessed' does not reveal the full meaning of 'Barakah.' The root of 'Barakah' is » (ba)-(ra)-ò (kaf). The meaning of this root is: something which is firm and stable in its place, which acquires proper nourishment and, grows and develops as a result, for example, like a tree does. Starting as a tender sapling, it must continue to receive nourishment so that it grows and becomes strong to stand firm and remain stable in its place. Should it be uprooted from itsplace it would not be able to survive, let alone develop? The tree must continue to stand firm, not for a certain period of time but, for its entire life. The Holy Qur'an also uses the word 'Barakah' for Earth (41:10). The Earth, fittingly, remains stable in its place and is a source of nourishment, growth, and development for everything and evervone.

Provide Provisions for Nourishment

Allah asserts that all authority and sovereignty belong to Him (Qur'an 67:1). The purpose of His authority is: so that He may continue to provide provisions for nourishment and development to all. In this single assertion, significant Islamic principles are established: An Islamic system should be firmly rooted. It must be sound, strong, and stable; and its purpose should be to provide nourishment and provisions for the development of all living beings. The very first verse of the Qur'an (1:1) establishes an essential principle of the Qur'an, stating that a system is only worthy of praise and appreciation when it upholds and fulfils the responsibility of universal development for all. That is why the Our'an states that the Supreme Being, in whose hands lies all sovereignty and authority of the entire universe, is responsible for providing nourishment and provisions for the development of all beings, and it is He who maintains the control and stability so worthy of our praise. Allah has established measures and standards - - of (Qadr) in the words of the Qur'an - in order to accomplish this aim while He maintains full control over all aspects of Oadr. He has Power over all things (67:1).

This is but one kind of development, i.e., physical development. However, human beings are more than just the physical body. There is, in addition, an essential aspect of our humanity

The Quran and Human Development

Qur'an has mentioned that a Momin will try to survive with less,and lead a life of hardship himself and give priority to others' needs above his own.

which the Quran refers to as our "> mafs'. We can call it 'human soul,' 'human self,' 'human personality' or 'human individuality' but, none of these descriptions fully explains the meaning of 'nafs'. Human beings become a part of humanity solely due to their 'nafs'.

With respect to the physical body alone, humans belong to the animal kingdom. But there is something else within each human for whose development, God's attributes are necessary. One can call these attributes Permanent Values. The 'nafs' acquires its capability for development through these core values.

The Mind's Eye

One self-evident principle which the Quran establishes for humans and which is common with animals, is that the human body develops from what it takes, from what it consumes. But the "human self" develops from another principle: self develops by that which humans give for the welfare of others; what humans do in order to improve the life of others.

However, this internal self or 'nafs' cannot be seen, cannot be felt; and others are not able to feel or touch it. If one has the 'eye' - not just the physical eye but also the mind's eye - then one can feel one's own self as to how much it has developed. For this, the Ouran mentions the characteristics and the attributes of the Momineen. In reality, these Momineen are manifestations of these attributes. For example, the Our'an has mentioned that a Momin will try to survive with less, and lead a life of hardship himself and give priority to others' needs above his own. This is not a decision that can be comprehended at the level of the physical body, but only at the level of what the Our'an has called the 'nafs' meaning the 'higher self.'

The Qur'an explains further that a Momin is one who does this act of giving priority to others above himself and does this of his own freewill. By doing this, a Momin feels happy that he has been able to fulfil the needs of someone else who is more deserving than himself, even though his own life itself might be very hard. What is that entity within a human being that makes the decision to do this sacrifice? The human body cannot do this. The human body's development is based upon instinct as it is the case with animals. No animal will give preference to



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some other animal over the needs of its own body. Man behaves similarly when he lives at the material level, i.e., at the animal level. In fact, those living at this level may even indulge in looting and exploiting others. In contrast, an animal, when his stomach is full, never

cares what happens to the leftover food, whether another animal eats it or someone takes it away. An animal sits contented and continues on carefree, It is only this human animal that despite his needs being little beyond bread, continues throughout life seeking to fill an ever unfulfilled greed. The animal does not exhibit greed once its basic requirements have been met. In other words, when man falls, he falls very deep to the lowest level—below even the animals!

Little Beyond Bread

Our human level is considerably different in that it is this level that the Qur'an addresses. And this is intended for our own selfdevelopment. The Quran's Qadr is a standard or measure so that we may acquire the attributes established in the Qur'an for the Momineen. For example, take human respect. This respect should be established in society as universal standard irrespective of color, race, language, age, religion, wealth, or status. This respect should be based solely on the basis of being human. This is the characteristic of the higher human self, not of the human body. As for the human body, the strong and powerful body will easily subdue the weak and poor one.

Does the Qur'an say that those with a strong body in this life will also be strong in the Hereafter? No. it does not. But, it does say that those whose 'nafs' has developed and has become strong to the extent that it is able to reach the level required to cross a threshold, then it will enter the next stage after death. They are the ones who will move forward. The Qur'an refers to this as the life of Heaven (Jannah). On the other hand, it says that those whose 'nafs' has not sufficiently developed will get stuck and not be able to move forward into the next life. This is referred to as Hell (Jaheem) by the Ouran. Jaheem means a barrier which does not allow one to move forward. The choices we make in this life will decide where we end up in the next life. Thus, we pray:O, our Sustainer! Accept our humble efforts because you are fully aware of what we speak and what is hidden in our hearts. (2:127) (Source: islamicity.org)

achieve the degree of dedication which ensures the maximum reward from Allah. After all, we always commit mistakes, and we always face the temptation to fall in sin. It is only natural that we should be keen to have our sins and mistakes forgiven. When we have such clear statements from the Prophet that fasting ensures such forgiveness, then we find the difficulty of fasting very easy indeed. Hunger and thirst are no longer hard to bear.

Reward is Secondary

All this stress on the idea of reward may suggest to some people, especially to non-Muslims, that Muslims fulfil their worship duties purely for the sake of the reward they have been promised. This is not so. The motive of faith is much stronger. The ultimate goal is to please Allah. The reward is secondary. Hence, the stress in the Prophet's statements on the need for fasting and all acts of worship to be motivated by faith and offered with dedication. The reward is a mark of Allah's generosity.

The Prophet (Pbuh) was keen to point out the moral value of fasting. He states, for example; "The smell of the mouth of a When we consider such limitless reward and such moral values which are attached to fasting, who of us would want to fail to fast unless he lacks faith?

fasting person is preferable, in Allah's measure, to the smell of musk." People like good smell. The perfume trade is a highly lucrative one. No one likes to be known to have a bad smell. Roses and flowers which have good fragrance are the favourite with all people. In this statement, the Prophet (Pbuh) touches on a very important point. Normally, if one does not eat for several hours, his mouth smell changes. He tries to wash his mouth or to brush his teeth, in order not to have a bad mouth smell. When we consider such limitless reward and such moral values which are attached to fasting, who of us would want to fail to fast unless he lacks faith? The Prophet however, was keen to drive the point home to us.

"There is a door to heaven called Al-Rayyan through which only fasting people are admitted. It will be asked; where are the fasting people? They stand up. No one is admitted through that door except them. When they have entered, the door will be closed and no one else can get through it." (Related by Al-Bukhari) While this Hadith indicates that fasting people have a special status on the day of judgment which merits the provision of a special door for them to be admitted into heaven. the name of that door is very significant. "Al-Rayyan" is an adjective which describes in normal usage something which is ripe, full of juice. It is normally used to describe fruit and vegetables which have fully ripened. Needless to say that a person who fasts throughout the day, especially in the long days of summer, suffers from thirst, Nothing is dearer to him than a cool drink. When his gate to heaven is called Al-Rayyan, with all its associations and connotations of juice and ripened fruits, it is left for our imagination to have a picture of what awaits him inside heaven.

Neglected and Lying in Ruins, 'World's Smallest Mosque' cries for attention.

Hyderabad: Located a stone's throw away from the Dargah Hazrath Syed Shah Imaad Uddin Mahmood Al Hussaini, a nondescript structure stands out in front of the scenic hilltop on the banks of Mir Alam tank. This Outub Shahi structure, popularly known as the Jino-ki-Masjid, may well be the 'smallest mosque' in the world. Less than 10 sq m in area, this structure has the traditional elements of Qutub Shahi architecture including turrets and a big arch, under which there is a small space for devotees to pray. However, although it is located within the complex of

the Dargah, the small structure stands dilapidated. The lime plaster has given away at various places, revealing the skeletal brickwork underneath.

The turrets are also broken at places. The way to the mosque is also rocky, with no clear path. The mosque's state could very well pose as a risk for visitors. The mosque gains importance as the



Dargah complex was home to Syed Shah Imamuddin Husaini alias Mir Mahmood Nimatullahi, one of the oldest sufis of Hyderabad. In 'Landmarks of the Deccan', its author Syed Ali Asgar Bilgrami wrote, "He first came to Hyderabad from Najaf (Mesopotamia) during the reign of Sultan Abdullah Qutub Shah and staved on this hillock."

Mahmood had laid several buildings erected on this hill. "The mason who worked here were paid over and above the wages and the pregnant womenlabourers were paid double the wages," Landmarks of the Deccan said, adding that since no one knew his source of income, "it was a general belief that the Saint had some supernatural means of

Once the land on which the Jino-ki-Masjid and the Dargah was built was to the tune of 600 acres. However, now, with time, most of it is occupied with houses built on one side of the

hillock. The place comes alive during Urs, usually held on the 13th Shaban of the Islamic Calender, which was on April 19. During that time, many visit the Dargah, and hence it becomes important to conserve and repair the 'smallest mosque'.

Women in Muslim societies are thought to be subjugated, degraded and oppressed by their religion. Islam is stigmatised as an oppressive religion. On numerous occasions authors wrongly attacked the religion of Islam for the cultural practices of Muslims in certain places of the world. Polls have showed that about 70 percent of the American public acknowledged being unfamiliar with Islam. Thus, it is not a surprise that most Americans cannot distinguish Islamic religion practices from cultural practices by Muslim majority countries. Culturalists in some Muslim societies cite the Islamic faith in defending "honour killings" of women and marriage for child brides and right to choose her spouse by her parents. Muslim women are marginalized not by the true tenets of their faith but by patriarchal cultural practices.

Exterior of Islam

The mistreatment of women in some Middle-Fastern societies or in Muslim families is due to the culture that some Muslims absorb and follow exterior of Islam. About fourteen hundred years ago, Islam gave women rights that women in the West have only recently began to enjoy. It is only in the last twentyyears that western society has recognized the rights of women, while Islam has allowed their rights from all times. The question which naturally arises here, what constitute Islamic practices?

Islamic practices and beliefs are those that have roots in the Ouran (which Muslims believe to be the last and unchanged revelation from

God) and the Sunnah of Prophet Muhammad (Pbuh). Any belief or practice even if it is common among some Muslims majority countries, which is not backed by the Ouran or the Sunnah cannot be regarded as Islamic belief or practice. Many of the countries that are commonly called Islamic countries' which in reality are merely 'Muslim-majority countries' practising an amalgam of Islamic as well as non-Islamic elements.

I think it is not wrong to say that Muslim culture is, on the one hand, damaged by the non-Muslim culture of different societies and, on the other hand, distorted through innovations and misinterpretations by Muslims themselves. The culture which we have presently is not Islamic but a bag of borrowings which we have borrowed from different societies like the practices of dowry system, restrictions on acquisition of wealth by women, right to choose her spouse by parents, practices of divorce and right to obtain inheritance, right to education and so on.

Bridal Gift of Value

Islam allows the practices of dowry system but in this form! Husbands must give women their dowry (Ouran 4:4). Unlike the traditional system of dowry where a woman must give her husband a bridal gift of value upon marriage, Islam reverses the concept, where it is the husband who must pay his wife whatever amount she requests. Not only he is obliged by law to give his bride this dowry, but also the Quran states he must do so graciously,

without expressing any dissent:

"And give the women [upon marriage] their [bridal] gifts graciously." Quran 4:4

Islam did not restrict women for acquiring wealth. Upon receiving dowry, the husband is prohibited from touching this wealth entirely. In fact, the Ouran mentions that even if she received an immense sum of money; the prohibition still applies:

"Do not take [bridal] from it anything. Would you take it is injustices and sin" Quran 4:20

Another cultural practise which is practised mostly by parents in our societies is to choose spouse of daughter without her permission. Islam came to annul this ignorant practice and give a woman the right to be her agent. In fact Islam gives women the right to choose their own husband as clearly shown by the great statement.

The Prophet Muhammad (Pbuh) said:

"The virgin women should not be given in marriage until she gives permission"

The most common cultural practise which men follow after marriage in our societies is to avoid kindness with her spouse in order to make them sub-ordinate. This cultural "And live with them in kindness Ouran 4:1

In Islam women are not subjugated to spend on their families. But husbands are ordained to spend on their wives. A man is obliged to financially provide for his wife. He is responsible to provide food, clothing, shelter and medicine all necessities to the best of his ability. This includes providing his wife with the same standard of living which he expects for himself:

"Let him spend (on his family) from what Allah has given him" Ouran 65:7

Last but not the least, the cultural practice of divorce which is prevalent in different Muslim societies especially in Indian society has distorted the real image of Islam and among the adherents of Muslims who are unable to read the Quran and Hadith. Then what Islam preaches regarding divorce? Islam preaches to avoid bitterness following divorce (Quran 2:231). In many instances in the Ouran, God advises Muslims towards patience and avoid divorce. He in fact states that if the two spouses truly wanted to resolve their issues, Allah would reconcile the two of them together. Nevertheless if divorce does happen, Allah advises both spouses to do so in a manner that is both righteous and honourable, void of all hardships and conflict, So yes, for some Muslim women, like all other women, may face oppression in their homes. Clearly, it has nothing to do with Islam rather consequence of cultural practices. If it is not culture then why many women around the world, mostly in developed nations, willingly embrace Islam?

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43rd Anniversary of the Land Day

Israel has so far occupied over 85% of Palestinian land, says a new Report.

A new report says Israel has so far occupied more than 85 percent or some 27,000 square kmsof historical territories of Palestine in an expropriation process which still continues unabated. Ola Awad, the president of the Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics (PCBS). announced the grim news in

a report carried by the Palestinian Ma'an news agency recently, the eve of the 43rd anniversary of the Land Day. In late March of 1976. Israeli troops killed six Palestinians, wounded 100 others and detained hundreds more who had held peaceful demonstrations against Israel's confiscation of 21,000 dunams (5,189 acres) of their land. Palestinians, both at home and overseas, have been marking the event known as the Land Day with rallies and remembrance ever since.

According to the report,



Palestinians now live on and own only 15 percent of their ancestral land. Awad said since the Oslo Agreement of 1993, Israel has used the deal's land classification of A, B and C to further tighten control, particularly in areas classified as C with an area of 3,375,000 dunams. Some 2.642,000 dunams. constituting 76.3 percent of the total Area C, was exploited by the Israeli occupation directly.

The Palestinians utilize only 931,000 dunams, which constitute about 17 percent of the West Bank area, the report added. Elsewhere in

the report, Awad said that by the end of 2017, there were 435 Israeli settlements and military bases in the West Bank, including 150 settlements and 116 outposts.

The report further showed that the total number of Israeli settlers in the West Bank was 653,621 by the

end of 2017, 47 percent of whom were living in Jerusalem al-Quds province with a total number of about 306,529. This is while 225,335 of these settlers were living in the parts of Jerusalem al-Quds which were annexed by the Israeli occupation in 1967.

The report concluded that the proportion of settlers to the Palestinian population in the occupied West Bank is around 22.6 settlers per 100 Palestinians compared to 70 settlers per 100 Palestinians in Jerusalem al-Quds

Pope Francis Visits Morocco

Head of the Catholic Church, Pope Francis, recently visited Morocco on his latest trip to a predominantly Muslim state. He was welcomed to Morocco by King Mohammed VI. He met migrants and Muslim leaders, and held a Mass for the country's small Roman Catholic

community.Pope Francis called for tolerance and peace at a mass for thousands of Catholics, after warning the faithful there against trying to convert others.

"Often we are tempted to believe that hatred and revenge are legitimate ways of ensuring quick and effective justice," the 82-yearold pontiff told those gathered. "Yet experience tells us that hatred, division and revenge succeed only in killing our peoples' soul, poisoning our children's hopes, and destroying and sweeping away everything we cherish."Ahead of



the mass the pope insisted to an audience of around 400 at Rabat's cathedral that trying to convert people to one's own belief "always leads to an impasse". "Please, no proselytism!" he said.Christians are a tiny minority in Morocco where 99 percent of the population is Muslim, with sub-Saharan Africans making up a large part of the country's 30,000-strong Catholic community. Islam is the state religion and authorities are keen to stress the country's religious tolerance, which allows Christians and Jews to worship

UK Troops accused of Training Child Soldiers in Yemen

UK Foreign Office minister Mark Field has promised to get to the bottom of "very serious and well sourced" allegations that British special forces have been training child soldiers in the Saudi-led war against Yemen. He was answering an urgent question asked in the Commons recently by the shadow foreign secretary,

Emily Thornberry, who suggested the British troops may have been witnesses to war crimes. She claimed as many as 40 percent of the soldiers in the Saudi coalition were children, a breach of international humanitarian law.Field also said he would be



making inquiries with the UK Ministry of Defence in light of a report that British Special Air Service (SAS) soldiers were injured in a firefight with the HouthiAnsarullah movement in Yemen.Conservative Party MP Andrew Mitchell said the allegations were so serious

because they flew in the face of successive assurances given by ministers that the UK was not a participant in the Saudi war against Yemen, and was only providing general logistical support to Rivadh


The Saudi-led warhas taken a heavy toll on the country's infrastructure, destroying

hospitals, schools, and factories. The UN has already said that over 22 million Yemenis are in dire need of food, while 8.4 million are threatened by severe hunger. According to the world body, Yemen is suffering from the most severe famine in more than 100 years.

Germany Selling Arms to Countries Bombing Yemen

Germany's coalition government approved nearly €400 million in arms exports to Saudi Arabia and its allies involved in the Yemen war, local media reported. Despite a coalition government agreement last March restricting arms exports to countries involved in the Yemeni conflict. Berlin has so far approved 208 arms deals with Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates (UAE), Bahrain, Egypt Jordan and Kuwait, according to German news agency DPA. Arms deals with Saudi Arabia has topped the list with the government issuing 10 permits worth €255 million, followed by dozens of defence contracts with the UAE which amounted to €57 million.Opposition parties heavily criticized Chancellor Angela Merkel and her coalition

partner Social Democrats for the arms deals. "The federal government must stop aiding Saudi Arabia's war crimes in Yemen. There should be no more arms deals with the dictators. neither with Saudi Arabia, nor with the UAE, which is its close ally in the Yemen war," the Left Party wrote on Twitter.

Muslim Council Calls for Muslim Women in Leadership Roles

The Muslim Council of Britain (MCB) has urged for more Muslim women in leadership roles in Muslim-led organisations across the UK, at its inaugural Women's Conference in London recently under the theme #BalanceForBetter. Keynote speaker, Yassmin Abdel-Magied, Sudanese-Australian writer and broadcaster, said, "Our identity as Muslim women has been politicised but it is a religious identity first and foremostly." Samayya Afzal, Community Engagement Manager, said, "Muslim women have long been talked about, and talked over. This event was an opportunity to hear from a diversity of women from different backgrounds, to empower the voices of women in



our communities and organisations, and allow a platform for Muslim women to be unapologetically themselves."

The conference also saw the launch of the 2019 Women in Mosques Development Programme (WIMDP), a scheme designed to accelerate the development of talented upcoming female leaders to be the mosque trustees, committee members and centre manager of the future.

'True Muslims seek harmony with everyone': Muslim World League chief

Kazan: Extremist groups are active only in stagnant cultural and social environments, the head of the Muslim World League (MWL), Mohammed bin Abdulkarim Al-Issa, said.In a Friday sermon, delivered at the Grand Mosque in Kazan, Tatarstan, Al-Issa said vigilant Muslims can defeat extremist propaganda.Peace and harmony are the most important guarantors of stability and prosperity, he said.Al-Issa said that true Muslims respect unity and the laws of the countries in which they live, seeking harmony with everyone, regardless of their religion or nationality. The MWL chief, who has been on a visit to Russia, warned against recalling historical events and drawing

analogies to a current situation. The responsibility of each historical era rests only with the people who lived in it, he said. Al-Issa stressed the need to improve understanding for the benefit of all, saying that

"extremism can only win with a lack of awareness." He cautioned worshippers against conflict and division, pointing out that Islamic law called for learning from others and from the lessons of history.

Pope blames US, Europe for Deaths in War Zones

Pope Francis says arms sales by the United States and Europe are to blame for the deaths of people, including children, in such places as Yemen, Syria, and Afghanistan."The rich Europe and America sell weapons... used to kill children and kill people," said the pontiff, in unprecedented remarks made while addressing students and teachers at Milan's San Carlo Institute recently, the Associated Press reported. He said violence-scarred countries like Yemen, Syria, and Afghanistan would not be witnessing wars if it was not for the arms. "A country that produces and sells weapons has on its conscience the death of every child and the destruction of each family," the Pope said. The Pope also spoke about the need for countries to welcome migrants, rejecting any association between migrant integration and increase in crime rates. Foreigners are not the source of most crimes, the Pope said, adding "we also have lots of them (asylum seekers)" in Italy.

Foundation Stone Laid for Abu Dhabi's first Hindu Temple

The historic foundation stonelaying ceremony of the first Hindu temple in Abu Dhabi was performed recently in the presence of officials from India and the United Arab Emirates as well as thousands of members of the community. The ceremony was presided over by Mahant Swami Maharaj, the spiritual leader of BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha - the organisation building the temple, along with other priests. Indian Ambassador Navdeep Suri attended the event in the presence of over 2,500 Indians from the UAE and across the world, according to



Gulf News. Suri and BAPS Hindu Mandir committee head and community leader, B.R. Shetty were among those who laid the foundation stones. Some 50 priests from India were part of the ceremony, the Khaleej Times reported. The temple will be built in phases with all the pink stones and marble being transported from Rajasthan to the UAE capital. The stones of the temple will be hand-carved by artisans in India and then transported to Abu Dhabi. Once completed, this will be the first traditional Hindu stone temple in the Middle East. Muslim Charity Gives \$5000 to Repair Defaced Jewish Cemetery

A Jewish cemetery in Massachusetts (USA), that was defaced with anti-Semitic graffiti recently received a \$5,000 donation from a Muslim charity to help repair the damage. The charity, Celebrate Mercy, has donated over the past two years, \$115,000 to rehabilitate desecrated Jewish cemeteries and memorials in Missouri, Illinois, New York, Massachusetts and Colorado, and facilitated the donation of around \$238,000 to the Jewish Tree of Life Congregation in Pittsburgh after the massacre there last year. More than 60 gravestones at Hebrew Cemetery in Fall River, Massachusetts were vandalized. Cemetery groundskeeper Jeffrey Weiss man told the Forward that he had received an outpouring of support from around the world. In particular, he recounted receiving a check for \$5,000 via mail from "Muslim Americans



nationwide to our Jewish cousins of the Hebrew Cemetery of Fall River."

"In the spirit of responding to evil with good (as taught by Prophet Muhammad), that inspired the previous campaign, Celebrate Mercy is proud to have supported this community in their time of distress," the organization wrote on its Facebook page.

Women in UAE Knit Clothes for Underprivileged Children

Abu Dhabi: In the true spirit of community activism, a group of women living in the UAE have devoted their free time and talents towards helping children living in orphanages and refugee camps through the simple act of knitting and sewing, with all of the clothes they make, donated to the children. Founded five years ago, the community group Rags to Riches UAE, has 140 active female members with 5.000 followers on social media. Meeting every week, the women sew, knit and quilt fabrics into clothes such as shirts, shorts, hoodies, tracksuit bottoms and dresses.

"We're just a group of women who have a hobby for sewing, knitting



and quilting, and so we've all come together and decided to put those efforts towards a good cause," said one of the group's organisers Ceri Rocca, from the UK. "All of this activity is done in our spare time, we don't ask for any money as we're not a charity, we just make the clothes and collect them together and then send them off to orphanages or refugee camps," she added. Rocca

explained that the group receives monthly requests for clothes from international humanitarian organisations such as Bring Hope, keeping them busy with their volunteerism. Latifa Ghezala, an Algerian member of the group also spoke glowingly about the shared unity between women in the group. "It makes me the happiest person on Earth to help these young children. When you make something yourself after hours of knitting and sewing, there is a special feeling behind that as you know a young child is going to be wearing those clothing items to stay warm during the cold winter months," she added, feeling pride in her activism. Complacency does not exist in the dictionary of the Bangalore-based Al-Aman Educational & Welfare Trust! The Trust, which has showcased success stories like the Ashiana Old Age Home in

Welfare Trust, along with Amina, the Trust's General Secretary, have ventured out courageously to set up a centre for the blind and the physically-challenged in Kadgunahalli in the city. The

building is coming up just behind one of Bangalore's largest slums, D. J Halli.

The centre, which will be residential, will offer skill training for the visually- and physically-challenged in various vocations so that they are empowered to handle life independently. Also, the space can also be used for things like personality development workshops in the non-teaching hours, explains Amina.

The spark to start the centre began when Mohammed Farooq, Amina and other Trustees realised that the community had almost no such institution at all. Parents who have children who are visually- or physically- challenged often feel embarrassed and keep them in hiding in their homes and do not want to expose them to the world.

But these people too have a right to live a dignified life, a better life than living in claustrophobic environments. God has blessed these people with some extra intelligence or skills which even the sighted do not possess. So we hope that the centre will open doors of opportunity for the blind and physically-challenged to learn, develop and contribute positively to the society through their talents,' explains Amina.

The building work has begun. Some people might wonder why the Al-Aman Educational & Welfare Trust is putting its finger in so many pies. But honestly there is so much to be done by way of service to humanity and we want to leave behind a legacy of charitable work so that the next generation takes over. The current flock of youngsters have no clue about the miseries of the poor, needy, the blind, the physically challenged, of the hungry and the sick. The Ashiana centre for the Blind, like the rest of our institutions, should be a torch that will light the path ahead for the coming generations, says Amina.

Meanwhile, the Trust also would like to expand its existing Old Age Home, which is perhaps the only Muslim-run home for the elderly destitute in Bangalore and is completely free of charge. It has a 10 year history of caring for the old. Its building needs to be expanded so

that the inmates can get more comfort and so that more people can be taken in. The place has a capacity of only 45 people, but has already taken 55. The Trust gets several calls every now and then for people who need a place in the Ashiana Old Age Home. But the Trustees have to reject these calls due to lack of space In this regard, compassionate philanthropists and organisations can chip in to help the Trust in its plans for a new building with more intake capacity.

Sitting with Amina reflecting on the Trust's mission for the elderly destitute and the visually- and physically-challenged reminds one of how many of us simply take for granted take our happy state of mind or our physical health or our God-given eyes. The commitment of the Trust and its team in serving people in severe need is truly touching.

Grooming Our Children

Parents must realise that they will be answerable to God for how they have groomed their children. When the Prophet Jacob (Yagub) was dying, he didn't ask his children where they will rule or work or whatever. Rather, he asked them whom they will serve.

Proper parenting is today widely recognised as an issue of immense significance. How our children turn out to be depends much on the sort of parenting that we provide them.

Grooming children is something that should begin even before a couple gets married. How our children turn out to be has much to do with what criterion is used to select a marital partner.

Generally speaking, in our community what do we consider when looking for a groom or bride for our child? We look at the social status and wealth of a family, or the political influence it might have. We think that these things will give our children security and will help them lead a comfortable life. Some of us might even imagine that getting our children married into a family that is considered of high status will improve our own fortunes.

But, please think: Does the solution to our problems or that of our children lie in things like money and power, or does it lie with God?

It is a fact that relatively few families consider things like piety. intellect and morality of a family in selecting a partner for their children. Naturally, then, this will crucially effect our children and how they turn out to be.

Another issue that needs to be seriously considered here is that we have neglected the importance of a mother in the family. We have not given women the respect that they deserve. When a girl marries into a family, she is like a plant that has been suddenly uprooted and transplanted elsewhere. When a plant is transplanted, the gardener takes great care of it, providing it with appropriate nutrients and protection, so that it develops strong roots and grows into a healthy tree.

That is exactly how we should be treating our new daughters-inlaw. But the reality is very different. Generally, we are eager to push daughters-in-law into domestic service as soon as possible. Mothers-in-law make the situation even more grim for them by complaining about them to their sons. In such a situation, how can young wives be at peace, leave alone grow intellectually, without which how will they become good mothers of good children?

In our society we don't even recognise children as full personalities. We dismiss them by saying 'They are just kids'. But kids today are very intelligent, They note everything. If at all we give them attention, it takes the form of verbal advice: "Do this! Don't do that!". Our children may hear us out, but our actions speak louder than our words. What they will act on is not our verbal advice but our own actions. So. for instance, if a boy sees his father bossing

over the women in the house and treating them as if they should always be at his beck and call, that is how he will probably behave

when he grows up.

If parents want their children to turn out well, there's no alternative to spending enough quality time with them. But what do we do? In families where both parents are working outside the home, they send their children to a crèche or employ a maid-and in that way deny their children the parental presence that is indispensable for their healthy growth. Some parents get their children addicted to TV and video games so that they can go about with their work without having the 'headache' of minding the kids. In many other families, children are left to roam in the streets. They come back in the afternoon for lunch and then again they are off, into the streets. As a result, when they grow up, they do just that roam in the streets, whiling away time and coming home just to eat. Their parents have no idea what they are doing.



In preparing a dish, various ingredients are used. In a finelyprepared dish, the various ingredients are used in proper proportion. If there's even just a little bit extra salt or chilly, one can easily make out the difference. So, too, when it comes to developing the character of a child. Various influences, including inputs from parents, are ingredients that go into developing their character. If there is even a slight imbalance in these influences, it will show up in how the child turns out to be.

Parents must realise that they will be answerable to God for how they have groomed their children. When the Prophet Jacob (Yaqub) was dying, he didn't ask his children where they will rule or work or whatever. Rather, he asked them whom they will serve. Adving father is so concerned that his children should serve God and God alone. Is this our concern too? We need to spend adequate time with our children and help them connect with the Quran, because without that they will not understand the difference between right and wrong. For this, it is important for them to understand the meaning of the Quran, through reliable translations, and communicate this understanding to their children. It is good that parents are sending their children to school. At the same time, however, they should make adequate arrangements for proper Quranic education of their children at home. In addition to this, they must seek to live out the Quranic teachings the best way to teach someone is to practice what one teaches.

Dowry is Haraam

Dowry (jehez) is a major issue that afflicts many Muslim families today, even though demanding dowry is un-Islamic. The Quran clearly prohibits khamrand maisir. Both are forbidden or haraam. Khamr has been translated as alcohol, while maisir has been translated as gambling. At the time when the Quran was

being revealed, gambling was perhaps the only way of making money without any efforts.



such means, including demanding dowry. Demanding dowry being a form of maisir, this practice is thus haraam or forbidden for Muslims. A second point to consider in this regard is that girls generally love their parents intensely and remain emotionally attached to them even after marriage. The Kind Kids and the Snail


No good deed is too small, even helping a tiny snail is a kind deed in the eyes of God!

"The Muslim Council of Sri-Lanka (MCSL) condemns the attacks on the places of worship of our Christian brothers and sisters on their holy day of Easter, as well as on the hotels in Colombo," the group said in a statement. It described the attackers as "the extremist and violent elements who wish to create divides between religious and ethnic groups to realize their agenda". The attack was deliberate and aimed to create panic and disrupt civil life, the statement added.

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




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
