Research analysts of large Ponzi schemes have listed the following indicators of a typical such scheme: Unrealistic returns being promised (ultra-high returns initially, and then toned down); the moneys to pay the investors profit being raised from new investors; as the number of investors grows, the number of new investors must grow exponentially (This is because their moneys are used to pay the previous investors). Do all the investors lose under the scheme? Not necessarily. Some investors gain together with the promoters. But most investors lose heavily in the end.

of IMA. The business plans and storyline of source of profits were changing periodically (gold bullion trading to gold import from mines to gold showroom to schools to healthcare). Moreover, as no genuine business entity has earned and doled out such high profits for several years, only a Ponzi scheme can do that.

'Religious' Tag

Is there anything important and different in the tale of IMA? Yes indeed, there is, and it is the 'religious' tag of the investment being supposedly 'Halal' and 'Islamic'. Inspired by IMA, many

other financial entities promoted by Muslims have mushroomed especially in South India with the tag of 'Halal', 'Islamic', 'Sharia compliant', etc. The marketing and performance characteristics of all such entities is similar i.e., the lure of incredibly high returns, show of investment in metals, no transparent financials and disclosures, limited liability entities, management controlled by family members and money to pay the investors profit being raised from new investors who are made similar promises. Some of these entities have already met the

fate of IMA and more may be in the pipeline. It takes 'brains' to be a swindler, but for targeting the Indian Muslim community may be no brains but only liberal use of the words 'Halal' and 'Islamic' is good enough to rob millions!

The question arises as to who is providing this so-called 'Islamic' certification? Do they have the adequate knowhow to analyze business models and financials? How are they ensuring that the profits are generated from riskbased investments? Is there a process in place for monitoring the business activities to confirm that they are ethical or not? In the absence of a unitary authority for such certifications the answers for these questions are obviously not available.

Moral Courage Needed

The business, political and religious leaders of the Muslim community should make efforts for establishment of an authority to arrange for the certification of entities seeking public funds for Halal, Islamic or Sharia-Compliant Investment. The authority should have moral courage to highlight and notify the public about unethical business practice of any entity doing business using the words 'Halal' and 'Islamic'.

Muslim history is replete with pioneering inventions and discoveries, many of which are ingrained in modern society, such as:

Public Libraries

During the early decades of Islam, mosques acted as hubs for intellectual discourse across the Muslim lands. They were not only places of worship, but also housed libraries full of books on religion, philosophy and science. These libraries were open to the masses and not just the ruling and intellectual elite, as was the common practice then.

Surgical Tools

The great 10th-century Muslim surgeon Qasim al Zahrawi, described as the father of surgery, invented many surgical tools still used in modern medicine, including the scalpel, the surgical needle and surgical scissors. He also discovered catgut as a reliable material to administer internal stitches as it can be absorbed by the body, preventing the need for a second surgery to remove them.

Algebra

The study of algebra flourished during the Islamic Golden Age under the scholarship of mathematician al-Khwarizmi. The word algebra is derived from 'al-jabr', an operation he used to solve quadratic equations. The introduction of algebra as a unifying theory significantly broadened the concept of

mathematics and its development path.



In the 11th century, the scientist Ibn Haytham overturned ancient ideas of how our eyes see. While some said light rays came out of the eyes, others thought something entered the eyes to represent an object. Through systematic reason and experiment, Ibn Haytham discovered that light is not emitted from the eye itself, but in fact is reflected off an object and enters the eye.

Remembering God True Zikr



The Quran repeatedly tells us to remember God. This is what is known as zikrullah. One should remember God as often as one can. There may be some distractions in which you are engaged or some work in which your mind is focused, but even these may also lead, in an indirect manner, to the remembrance of God. When your own divine feelings, your remembrance of and love and praise for God, take expression in words, that is zikr. These words could be in your own language or in the Arabic language.

these divine blessings of sunshine, of the air, of gravity you would not be able to go out for a stroll. If you recount all these divine bounties associated with your walk, then you are remembering God, you are engaging in zikr while walking. So, in this way, at every moment, no matter what activity you may be engaged in you can be doing zikr, remembering God, praising, glorifying and thanking Him

This is a way in which you can engage in zikr remembrance of God throughout your daily life, not just for a few minutes a day,

Remembering God is not alien to your being. It is interwoven in your being, like energy. You and energy are apparently separate, but in fact both are one and the same. So, at every moment there are bounties of God all around you which you can remember.

It is very simple to remember God to engage in zikr and it is also quite natural. For instance, when you are walking, you can bring to your mind the fact that you are doing so entirely because of the blessings of God. While outdoors, you see the sun up in the sky, and you remember that it is God who is providing you sunlight. You breathe in fresh air while taking a stroll and you remember that it is He who is supplying you with oxygen. When you set your foot down on the ground and lift it up, you remember that it is He who has created gravity, otherwise you would be floating in the air and would not be able to walk on the ground at all. You bring to your mind the realization that without





but rather, all through the day.

Remembering God is not alien to your being. It is interwoven in your being like energy. You and energy are apparently separate, but in fact both are one and the same. So, at every moment there are bounties of God all around you which you can remember. If you awaken in yourself this consciousness at every moment, then you are remembering God at every moment. This is a way in which you can be engaged in the constant zikr of God.

In a report contained in the Sahih al-Bukhari, the Prophet's wife Aisha reports that the Prophet used to remember God on each occasion by making it a point of reference for God's remembrance. So, for the Prophet, remembering God, or zikrullah, and other tasks were not two separate activities, rather both were intermingled.

The human mind has enormous potential. An American writer, Walt Whitman, has said: "I am large enough to contain all these contradictions." He said this in a different context. However, this saying applies here as well. While being engaged in different tasks throughout the day, we can be engaged in zikr as well, reflecting on God's bounties in the context of the tasks we are doing or the things we are seeing. Zikr means living with divine consciousness. When you have attained this state of consciousness, at every moment you will be in a state of zikr, even though you may not be uttering any specific words.

Sometimes, you may find yourself lamenting the past, experiencing negative feelings and thinking

about negative experiences. In this way, your mind is diverted from zikr of God. This is a very common occurrence. But you can convert even this into a means to remember and thank God. If you have had some painful or negative experience in the past, when you recall it today you can convert it into something to be thankful to God. You can think of it as yet



made you reach a better situation today. So, in this way, you can even make the memory of a




another reason for shukr, or thankfulness to God. You can thank God that He did not make you stay on in that negative moment, and that, instead, He negative or painful experience into yet another opportunity to engage in zikr or remembrance of God.

The History of Muslims in New Zealand

The religion of Islam is deeply rooted in the heart of New Zealand. According to the International Muslim Association of New Zealand, there are an estimated 60,000 Muslims living on the windswept shores of the tiny Kiwi-state today who make up just 1% of the population. A diverse mix composed of refugees and immigrants, this ethnicallyrich population of Muslims has intricate threads that have been sewn into the fabric of New Zealand history

The First Muslims to Immigrate to New Zealand

In the spring of 1874, according to a New Zealand government census, a small group of Indian men were the first Muslims to immigrate to the coastal island nation. Hailing from Punjab and Gujarat, the men resided in Dunstan, Otago which was a gold mining settlement. It was not long before their families followed to

begin a new life while embracing a new homeland.

The First Muslim Organization in New Zealand

By the 1950's, there were an estimated 200 Muslims who immigrated to New Zealand from countries such as India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Egypt. Together, these early Muslims became a close-knit community and worked hard to set up the "New Zealand Muslim Association." It was out of their commitment and dedication that this group of Muslims was able to raise the funds needed to purchase a piece of land in Ponsonby in 1959.

On March 30, 1979 construction of the very first mosque in New Zealand began with the laying of the foundation for the Ponsonby Mosque which would be renamed, in subsequent years, to the Al-Masjid Al-Jamie.

The First Imam in New Zealand Having arrived in the late 1960's, New Zealand's first Imam was

Maulana Ahmed Said Musa Patel. An immigrant from Gujarat, India, Imam Patel's duties included leading the daily prayers at the mosque and teaching the Noble Ouran to the students. With only 23 students in his first classroom, Imam Patel strove to provide the best Islamic education possible and over the next several years the class grew in numbers.

Due to financial constraints, Imam Patel did not earn a salary at the mosque. He took a variety of jobs in the fields of rope-making, welding and factory-work during his tenure to provide for his family. All the while, he was working diligently to make a lasting impact in the Muslim community. One of his greatest efforts was to take part in a formal

delegation that approached the city council with the request for a dedicated burial ground for Muslims, which set the very first precedent in the country.

Steady Growth and Development By the end of the 1960's and the 1970's, there was an increase in Muslims from all over the world immigrating to New Zealand as

Abu Dhabi officially recognizes non-Muslim places of worship

"Anyone who has been living here for many years should have the right to practice his religion in a proper way," said Sultan Al Dhaheri.



In a move that echoes the aims of the country's Year of Tolerance, Abu Dhabi has announced its plans to legally recognize 19 non-Muslim places of worship across the emirate. The decision was made in a bid to assist the day-to-day running of the religious institutions which will now be regulated by the Department of Community Development.

Speaking at a news conference recently, the executive director of community participation and sport at the department, Sultan Al Dhaheri, said:

"Previously, such bodies were not officially recognized by the law. Now, these places of worship will have a point of contact in government to address any issues

over their day-to-day operations.

"We have met with their leaders and explained to them the guidelines and we will be holding workshops for them. We have a partnership relationship with them and are working side by side," he added.

Al Daheri also explained that the UAE's welcoming of other faiths is nothing new.

"[Non-Muslim] houses of worship have long existed in the country; the first church existed even before the union [of the UAE in 1971], so for more than 40 years," he said.

"Anyone who has been living here for many years should have the right to practice his religion in a proper way," he stressed.

The UAE has been serious about promoting coexistence and tolerance. In 2015, an antidiscrimination law was passed in the Emirates in an effort to prevent any behavior that could potentially spread discrimination within the community. Under the law, any act that triggers religious hatred "through any form of expression, which covers speech and the written word, books, pamphlets or online media" is prohibited.

The UAE is also considered the first country to have a minister of tolerance, a day (Nov. 16) dubbed "International Day for Tolerance," and a year dedicated to it. In

December 2018, Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed declared 2019 as the Year of Tolerance. Recently, the first Christian site to ever be discovered in the UAE was opened to the public. In February, Pope Francis visited the UAE for a 48hour trip, marking a historic moment for interfaith relations in the Gulf state

The UAE is home to expats from around the world and includes many houses of worship where people can freely practice their religions. There are 40 churches in the country (including those in Abu Dhabi) up from 25 in 2005. There are two Hindu temples in Dubai and a Gurdwara

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Deputy Grand Imam of Al-Azhar Issues Fatwa against Child Marriage

One of the world's most prestigious centres of Islamic learning has issued a fatwa against child marriage, saying marriage should be based on the consent of both parties and "particularly the young woman". The deputy grand imam of al-Azhar, considered by some Muslims to be a very high authority of Islamic jurisprudence, hammered out the document with his team and young activists at the first African summit on child marriage and female genital mutilation (FGM), which took place in Senegal in West Africa recently.

If news of the fatwa's existence can reach imams in countries with

high rates of child marriage, activists hope that the practice can be stopped, as they could not deny al-Azhar's authority.

"Marriage in Islam is based on the consent of both parties, particularly the young woman. Such consent requires the young woman to have reached the age of maturity and reason, so that her consent is validly given," the fatwa read, adding that this age was 18, and quoting parts of the Qur'an and hadiths of the Prophet Muhammad to support it.

The summit was organised by

Jaha Dukureh, a Gambian campaigner and the founder of Safe Hands for Girls, herself a survivor of child marriage and FGM, who drove a successful campaign to end FGM in her country. Dukureh, who went to Egypt to talk to the al-Azhar clerics last year, described how towards the end of the summit she realised that the fatwa had not yet been issued and went to talk to the imam, Salah Abbas, She, the

African Union youth envoy Aya Chebbi and the Syrian journalist Abdalaziz Alhamza worked with the Egyptian imams to turn their rough draft, scrawled on hotel notepaper, into a formal document.

"We sat there on the floor with them, writing the fatwa. They had to call Egypt to ensure that everything was in line. And then there was a back and forth about the languages, because in Arabic things can be translated different ways. To me, it was just amazing watching that process."

Four in 10 young women in sub-Saharan Africa are married before their 18th birthday. Boys are affected too: according to recent UN data, roughly one in 30 worldwide were married as children, with the highest number in Central African Republic, where almost a third of boys and men were child grooms. The problem is

not limited to Africa - across the world, 12 million girls are married in childhood every year.

"When you force a girl to get married, you've given someone the right to rape her over and over again," said Dukureh, who was married at 15 and again at 17. "And every single day, every time she's touched ... you don't forget. I don't think you forget that. I don't think you ever get over that.

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
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King Abdullah of Jordan slams 'hate-filled outlaws of Islam'



Singapore's President Halimah Yacob welcomes Jordan's King Abdullah in Singapore

Attacks on interfaith harmony, mutual respect and trust are the "world's single most important threat," King Abdullah of Jordan warned. Speaking recently at the International Conference on Cohesive Societies (ICCS) in Singapore, he condemned both "outlaws of Islam and extremist Islamophobes." "Perpetuators of hate-filled messages are distorting our religion's great heritage and teachings," he said. He called on the global community to tackle this challenge by "resisting hatred and exclusion," supporting economic growth and protecting the environment

In a keynote speech, the Jordanian ruler urged 700 delegates from 40 countries to apply the golden rule. "Loving one's neighbor is not just an ideal. It is the golden rule that enables all of us to live side by side, to look beyond ourselves, and to achieve what we can only achieve in common."

The conference was organized by the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS) with the support of Singapore's Ministry of Culture, Community

and Youth. Ong Keng Yong, executive deputy chairman of RSIS, described the Singapore conference as a platform for constructive dialogue to strengthen mutual trust and understanding across communities. "Singapore is a multiracial, multi-religious society, and we work hard to keep our country peaceful and secure. At the same time, we are part of the global community, which faces challenges posed by increased connectivity, intensifying identity politics, and infinite technological development," he said.

King Abdullah listed Jordanian efforts including the Amman Message, the Common Word Initiative, and UN World Interfaith Week. When it comes to hate speech on the internet solutions are not exclusively the responsibility of governments and big companies, he said. "In a very real way, the internet belongs to its users. Moderate, positive voices need to reclaim this space and redirect the dialogue away from misinformation, insults and fear,

Iraq officially invites Pope Francis to visit

Iraqi President Barham Saleh has sent an official invitation to Pope Francis, head of the Catholic Churh, to visit Iraq after the Pope said he would like to travel to Iraq despite security conditions "I am honored to officially extend an invitation to Your Holiness to visit Iraq - the cradle of civilization and the birthplace of Abraham, the father of the faithful and messenger of the divine religions," Saleh said in the letter. "Your holiness' visit will be an opportunity to remind and enlighten Iraq and the world that this land gave humanity its first laws, irrigated agriculture and a legacy of cooperation among

people" of different religions, it

Saleh said he hoped the visit would be "a milestone in the healing process and Iraq can once more be a peaceful land where the mosaic of religions and faiths can live together in harmony again as they did for millennia."

Pope Francis has made boosting ties between Christianity and Islam a cornerstone of his papacy. He has this year visited Abu Dhabi in the United Arab Emirates and Morocco. The pope had already visited several Muslim countries in previous years, including Turkey in 2014. Azerbaijan in 2016 and Egypt in 2017.

US Senate passes bill to block Saudi arms sales

The US Senate recently passed a resolution that would block the sale of arms to Saudi Arabia. offering a rebuke to U.S. President Donald Trump. The bipartisan bill passed with a 53-45 vote, and is the first of 22 resolutions that are aimed at blocking the military sales to the Middle East. The vote was the first in a series of three back-to-back votes, and would potentially stop billions of dollars in munitions sales to Riyadh. However, the bill still has to pass through the House and it is likely that Trump will veto the bill, and the Senate does not seem to have enough of a majority to override a potential veto.

Democrats and Republicans have joined forces in their anger at the Trump administration over using its declaration of an emergency over Iran to bypass Congress and approve arms sales to the Kingdom. The nearly two dozen joint resolutions of disapproval are meant to rebuke the Trump administration's declaration. Earlier, Trump had invoked a rarely used provision of U.S. arms control laws to circumvent Congress and authorize weapons sales to Saudi Arabia and Gulf allies. While arms sales usually go through a 30-day congressional review period, the provision allows for this process to be skipped in the case of an emergency.

Congress was notified by the Trump administration of the invocation and was shown a deal comprising 22 separate arms sales to Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Jordan valued at \$8.1 billion. A group of Senators, both Democrat and Republican and led by Sen. Bob Menendez and Sen. Lindsey Graham, had initially filed 22 resolutions of disapproval, one for each of the arms sales the White House approved.

There is also bipartisan anger within Congress over the Trump administration's support for Saudi Arabia despite pressure from lawmakers to punish the country over the murder of Saudi journalist and Washington Post columnist Jamal Khashoggi last October.

UK: Arms sales to Saudi Arabia declared unlawful

U.K. weapons exports to Saudi Arabia have been declared unlawful as they have contributed to high levels of civilian deaths and casualties in the bombing of Yemen by Saudi-led coalition forces, Britain's court of appeal said recently. The ruling was passed down by three senior judges after they accepted the legal challenge from the Campaign Against Arms Trade group, which has accused the government of licensing arms sales when it was clear their sales could breach international law.

According to Campaign Against Arms Trade, around £4.7 billion (\$5.9 million) worth of arms exports to Saudi Arabia have been licensed by the government since the Saudi-led intervention began in 2015 with record sales taking place before 2018.

The U.K. government "made no concluded assessments of whether the Saudi-led coalition had committed violations of international humanitarian law in the past, during the Yemen conflict, and made no attempt to do so," the court said.

The U.K. government has said it would challenge the ruling that its arms sales to the kingdom are unlawful as they contribute to high civilian fatalities in the

Saudi-led war in Yemen. An estimated 8.4 million people are at risk of severe famine and more than 22 million people, 75 percent of Yemen's population, are in need of humanitarian assistance. Impoverished Yemen has been wracked by conflict since 2014, when the Houthi rebels overran much of the country, including capital Sanaa. The conflict escalated in 2015 when Saudi Arabia and its Sunni Arab allies launched a wideranging military campaign aimed at rolling back Houthi gains and shoring up the country's Saudibacked government. The war has resulted in a collapsed economy and a cholera outbreak that has affected over 1.1 million people. 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

Rana Safvi: Of course, we learn from history. If we know our mistakes from the pasts, we can avoid it in the future.


Saleha: We know that you are quite a Twitterati, you have created #Shair which has caught a lot of attention. How did this idea strike you and what is it all about?

Abdul Aziz Nazar, a carpenter by profession and aged 53, hails from Kareri village of Baramulla district. Belonging to a poor family, Abdul had lost both the kidneys due to urolithiasis (kidney stones) and was searching for a donor. Nazar had registered his name on an app that matched donors and receivers. Similarly, Sujit Kumar Singh,46, from Bihar was also

searching for a kidney for his wife Manjula, 42, who was a patient of glomerulonephritis (a kidney disease) and had both her kidneys affected. Sujit Kumar Singh had also registered his wife's name on the app. Interestingly, while Sujit's kidney matched with Abdul Aziz Nazar, his wife Manjula Kumari's blood group matched with Abdul's wife Shazia (50).

Doctors of a Mohali, Punjabbased private hospital suggested the kidney swap after the medical parameters of all four Abdul Aziz Nazar, Shazia, Sujit Kumar

Singh, and Manjula perfectly matched with each other. All the four surgeries were conducted on December 3, 2018. Abdul Aziz Nazar said it was not religion, but the life which matters. "I feel very happy that the kidney belongs to a Hindu," he said. Both Sujit Kumar Singh and his wife Manjula Kumari are also happy after surgery. "We were not getting the right kidney. I had never thought that a Muslim woman's organ will save my wife's life," Singh said.

Hindu Girl saves Muslim Family from Mob Attack

Agra: Days after the killing of a two-and-a-half-year-old girl in Aligarh's Tappal area, a Muslim family was allegedly attacked by a mob in Jattari area while they were travelling from Ballabhgarh in Haryana to Aligarh. The family was saved by a Hindu girl, who is their close friend and was travelling with them in a van to attend a function. According to police, the incident occurred around 3 pm in Jattari, when the van with seven passengers on board, including the Hindu girl, was moving towards Maheshpur after crossing Tappal area. One of the travellers, Shafi Mohammad Abbasi, said the goons on motorcycles attacked the van with iron rods. "They beat me, my daughter who wore a veil and our driver," Abbasi said, adding that the

goons would have killed them if 24-year-old Pooja Chauhan, who was travelling with them, had not bravely intervened. "Pooja stepped out and boldly confronted the attackers," he said. Abbasi said he had known Pooja's family for 32 years and considers her one of his daughters. "One member from the mob softened his stand after seeing Pooja. He quietly handed us our car keys and asked us to drive away immediately," Abbasi said. Pooja said, "The mob attacked us just because they realized that the travellers were from the other community, as some of the women were wearing veils. Such incidents should not happen with anyone.' The family managed to reach Aligarh later.

MBE for Man Who Opened Adoption to Muslims

A British Muslim man has made it to the Queen's Birthday Honors list for his 20-year-work in fostering and helping open adoption to the British Muslim community in Tower Hamlets, London, East London Advertiser reported. "Anywhere I've got an opportunity to get access to the community, I take that opportunity," said Emdad Hossein Talukder, 65, from Kensington who speaks to people about fostering and adoption in hard-toreach places in his work for the council. In the Queen Elizabeth birthday honor list, Talukder received MBE or "Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire" award.

Over the past two decades, Talukder's job took him to churches, mosques, and community and children centers and wherever he thinks he can reach people. As part of his role, the Muslim man has also translated dozens of documents into his native Bengali language to help spread information. Talukder's entry into the world of fostering came when he and his wife, Mahfuza Rahman, brought a foster child into their home for the first time in 1999. They have now

helped a total of four children in the same way.

In 2000, Talukder began work for the council, trying to get more families to take part. The barriers facing those families are ideological as well as practical since the holv Our'an bans children from taking

the name of their adoptive father. As a result, Talukder thought of helping in getting a new legal tool called 'special guardianship' approved by the Shariah Council of Britain in 2005. The new 'Special Guardianship' allows families to look after children until they are 18, but they keep some links to their biological parents. "There are many Muslim children in this country, they also need adoption, because they can't get out [of the system] on a shortterm basis. They need long-term families," Talukder explained. In 2017, the Muslim man was granted a special guardianship order for a child he had been looking after since the boy was two. Now 21, Kabir G married a woman in Bangladesh in 2018.



"I'm happy that, throughout my life, I was able to educate and motivate many people to consider fostering. Despite reaching the age where many people would be thinking about retirement, I'm not leaving. I'm going to stick at it for as long as I can," Talukder hopes. In Islamic Shari'ah, raising a child who isn't one's genetic child is allowed and, in the case of an orphan, even encouraged. But, according to the Islamic view, the child doesn't become a true child of the 'adoptive' parents. For example, the child is named after the biological, not adoptive, father. The distinct Islamic system for adoption is called 'Kafalah' where the adoptive child can become a 'mahram' to his adopted family if he or she is breastfed by the adoptive mother before the age of two.

Palestine honours Indian with 'Star of Jerusalem' award

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas has conferred an Indian national with the Star of Jerusalem medal, one of the highest honours given to foreign nationals by the Palestinian Authority. At an event organised to honour Sheikh Mohammad Munir Ansari recently, Mr. Abbas thanked him for serving Palestine and Jerusalem, the third holiest city for Muslims, with distinction.

The Palestinian President said the Ansari family's presence in the old city of Jerusalem reflects the strong traditional ties between Indian and Palestinian people. He also called upon for strengthening people to people contact between India and Palestine. Mr. Abbas plans to send Palestinian Prime Minister Mohammad Shtayyeh to India soon to boost tourist inflows from there which can contribute to strong bonding between the two people. Representative of India, Sunil Kumar, who was present the event, also appreciated the role played by the Ansari family in strengthening Indo-Palestine ties. Sheikh Munir Ansari is the Director of Indian Hospice, a unique and historic monument in

the heart of the Holy city, which has become a symbol of India's heritage and presence in the old city of Jerusalem going back to over 800 years. The Indian hospice has been under the direct supervision of a representative from India since 1924. Sheikh Munir Ansari's father, Sheikh Nazir Hassan Ansari, was appointed the first Sheikh of the Hospice from whom the mantle passed on to the incumbent who was born in Jerusalem in 1928 and has spent his whole life here. In 2011. India honoured Sheikh

Munir Ansari with the Pravasi Divas Samman, the highest honour conferred on overseas Indians. In the 12th century, Baba Farid, the famous Sufi saint from Punjab, visited Jerusalem on pilgrimage and prayed in seclusion for 40 days at the current site of the Hospice. It later became a pilgrimage site for Indian pilgrims visiting Jerusalem and was dedicated as a charitable waqf property in trust for a pious purpose.

"Without caring for his own safety he rescued all the tourists from the fast-flowing water of the river, but lost his life," said a local. "Mr Dar successfully saved five tourists, including two foreigners, in the true spirit of trademark Kashmiri hospitality," the officials said. The officials said the body of the brave tourist

guide was retrieved from the river and after completion of medico-legal formalities, it was handed over to his relatives. The guide, who had a diploma in rafting, has been hailed as a brave heart. The Jammu and Kashmir Governor Satyapal Malik has hailed the brave heart guide as a real-life hero and announced an ex-gratia of Rs 5 lakh to the kin of the victim. The Kashmir Divisional Commissioner has also announced a compensation of Rs 2 lakh for Rouf's family. The victim got married few years ago and is survived by parents, wife and two siblings. Rouf was pursuing a Master's degree in political science from Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU). He had also done his B.A and B.Ed.

11-Year-Old Iranian Girl gets highest Mensa IQ Score, beating Einstein & Hawking

An 11-year-old Iranian high school student in the United Kingdom is making headlines for getting a remarkable result on her Mensa IQ test that even surpasses those of great thinkers such as Albert Einstein and the late Professor Stephen Hawking.

Tara Sharifi, a student at Aylesbury High School, recently took the Mensa IQ test in Oxford where she scored well above the "genius benchmark" of 140. The 11-year-old student scored 162 points on the test, which is two points ahead of Einstein, a theoretical physicist who is considered as one of the two



pillars of modern physics, and famous cosmologist Professor Stephen Hawking. The Mensa IQ test, which needed to be answered within a set time, focused on the student's ability to understand the

meanings of words."I was shocked when I got the result. I never expected to get such a good score," Sharifi said. With the score she received, Sharifi now qualifies for the Mensa membership, which is also known as the High IQ society. "It was a joint decision between me and my parents to take the test," the girl said. "It will be a wonderful opportunity to meet other people within the Mensa system. I have told some of my friends at school and they were really impressed." She also added that when she becomes older, she would pursue "something related to mathematics."

Anti-Lynching Protest: 5000 People come Together in Jharkhand

In perhaps the largest protest against lynching, over 5,000 people gathered in Dumri in Jharkhand on May 31. The immediate trigger was the lynching on April 10, 2019 of a 50-year-old Adivasi man, Prakash Lakra, a resident of Jurmu village in Dumri block of Gumla who was beaten to death by a group of people from the neighboring village of Jairagi on suspicion of killing a bull. Three others - Peter Kerketta, Belarius Minge and Jenerius Minz - were seriously injured in what can only be described as an instance of lynching. Furthermore, there are questions being raised as to how the local police responded in the aftermath of the case. Deeply disturbed by the inhumanity of the incident over 5,000 people held a demonstration in Dumri on May

31. These included people from Gumla, the state capital of Ranchi and even Latehar where two people suspected of being cow smugglers were lynched and hanged in March 2016. The protest was organised by Kendriya Jan Sangharsh Samiti and many of the state's human rights activists were also present at the demonstration. Addressing the gathering, Saroj Hembram of the Jan Sangharsh Samiti said that this incident was examined by her and several other human rights organizations. It was clear in the investigation that the owner of a dead bull, a resident of Jurmu, had spoken to the victims and other villagers to cut off the flesh and remove the skin. When they were doing this, they were attacked by a group of about 35-40 people in Jairagi village. The merciless

blows, kicks and punches continued for three hours! After this the mob left the victims in front of Dumri Police Station around midnight. Rather than sending the victims to the hospital immediately, the police allegedly made them wait in the open for about four hours. By the time he was taken to the local health center, Prakash had died. Saroj Hembram reminded the people that in the last four years in Jharkhand, 11 persons were beaten to death, 9 of whom were Muslims and the remaining two were tribals. Jirom Kuzur of the Kendriya Jan Sangharsh Samiti also raised questions about the role of police in the light of the death of Prakash Lakra.


Goodword Quran Project

Q&A

You are a leading publisher of high quality Islamic books for adults and children. How and when did you come into publishing?

In 1976, my father, Maulana Wahiduddin Khan, started a magazine, entitled Al-Risala. At that time I was in the tenth class. I used to go to the Chawri Bazar to buy paper and would also visit the printers in the Jama Masjid area quite often. Somehow these visits influenced my choosing to



make publishing a full time career which I did in 1983. In 1996 I founded Goodword Books. From 1983 to 1996, I was engaged in publishing books written mainly by my father in Urdu and English.

Did you start the publishing house primarily for your father's books?

The aim was to print good quality Islamic books. As there was a vacuum in this area at that time, I decided to launch Goodword Books.

Your mission is to educate the new generation about real Islamic values. How are you setting about achieving this goal?

I write stories on Islamic subjects and basically they are from the Quran. Every story that I write has a message and a moral value at the end of it. If we can familiarize the younger generation with these values, they will grow up as peaceful members of society.

How far have you been successful in reaching out to people of other faiths in explaining what Islam is?

We regularly organize lectures on interfaith harmony through CPS International. We attend various conferences in India and abroad which helps us in spreading the spiritual and peaceful message of Islam.

Do you participate in international book fairs?

We have participated in some book fairs in the international market Cape Town, London and Frankfurt and also we take part in major book fairs in India as well. Makkah Charter Calls for Religious Tolerance & Pluralism

The conference of the Muslim World League (MWL) held at Makkah in Saudi Arabia recently has issued a declaration calling for co-existence, pluralism and religious tolerance in the world. Hussein Madavoor, state vice president of the Kerala Nadvathul Mujahideen (KNM), who attended the meeting, said the 'Makkah Charter' issued at the conference is a historical document as it addresses almost all the issues concerning the Muslims world over. "Modelled on the Medina Charter drafted by Prophet Muhammad, the Makkah Charter underlines the need for religious freedom and exhorts to stop the hate campaign in the name of the religion," Madavoor said. "There are 30 articles in the Charter that deal with issues like Islamophobia, protection of places of worship and ending

harassment of women," he said. Most important among the articles is the one on Islam and pluralism. "Plurality of faith is a reality and we need to accept it. There is no point in living a utopian world. There are different schools of jurisprudence in Islam and there are other systems of faiths too. How all these can co-exist with any confrontation is a topic discussed at the meeting," Madayoor said.

Another issue discussed at the meeting is teaching the middle path of moderation of Islam to the young generation who does not have a comprehensive understanding of Islam. "The lack of proper knowledge is the reason for dangerous practices like doing hijra to Syria," he said.

The meeting also decided to come out with a proper interpretation of the verses in Ouran in the backdrop of widespread misreading of the holy text. "In Kerala also, we have seen some discussions along these lines. There are attempts to take the verses from out of the context and spread hatred," Madavoor said. The MWL conference also

The MWL conference also discussed the ways to counter the rising Islamophobia in the world. "The meeting felt that that the wrong notions of the religion s t e m s f r o m g r o s s misunderstanding. MWL decided to spread authentic knowledge of Islam," he said.

Similar meetings will be held in different the countries with the participation of all the Muslim groups to spread the message of the Makkah Charter to ground level. MWL will take the lead in organising such meetings.

New Zealand's Sikh community also rallied together to raise more than NZ\$60,000 for victims and their families. The collection was done within five days of posting an appeal on Facebook, with the help of over 1600 donations. This amount was presented to Lianne Dalziel, the Mayor Christchurch on Wednesday, 12 June at a function held at the Gurudwara Singh Sabha, Christchurch. A cheque of NZ\$60,000 was delivered in the presence of the members of the Muslim and Sikh communities. Mr Abdul Aziz from the Linwood Islamic Centre. Mirwaiz from Al Noor Mosque and other members of the Muslim community marked the occasion to appreciate the fundraising efforts of the Sikh community. This fundraiser was initiated by

Auckland-based Jaspreet Singh Rajpura with the support of Sikh

Supreme Society. "No amount of money can change what has happened, or bring back the lives lost. But we can offer our support to victims and their families, so they don't have to bear this burden alone," he said. "This couldn't have been possible without community support. Thank you everyone. Mr Singh said that a collection of NZ\$60,458 surpassed the initial goal of NZ\$50,000 within just five days of starting this fundraiser.

Number of Female Judges in Turkey at its Highest

The number of female judges and prosecutors in Turkey has reached its highest in the past few years, according to figures from the country's Ministry of Justice. Out of a total of 20,777 judges and prosecutors on duty, 13,284 are male and 7,493 are female. The judicial reform strategy paper, unveiled recently by President Recep Tayyip Erdo an, set the goal to maintain gender equality in personnel recruitment. During the appointment of 1,446 judges and prosecutors at a ceremony on May 22, 758 were men and 688, about 47.5 percent female.

The growth in women judges and

prosecutors is skyrocketing. The number of women judges and prosecutors was 2,664 in 2010, it was 3,549 in 2013 and 3,977 in July 2016. Since 2010, the number of female judges and prosecutors has tripled. While the ratio of women judges and prosecutors was 22.8 percent in 2010, this rate increased to 36 percent with the latest appointments. There are relatively more women judges among the female judicial members entering the profession. Out of the 7, 493 women, 6, 369 of them are judges, while 1,124 are prosecutors. The number of female judges working in judicial

justice is 3,947. Some 460 judges are in the administrative courts, 448 are in the regional courts of justice, and 118 are in the regional administrative courts. In the Supreme Court, the number of female judges is 718, while the number of women prosecutors is 24. There are 236 female judges and 13 prosecutors in the Council of State. In the Constitutional Court, there are four women judges. Fourteen of the 207 prosecutors in the Council of Judges and Prosecutors are women, while there are 82 female judges and prosecutors out of 82 at the headquarters of the Ministry.

Do Justice

If God is already so close to us, what does getting close to God mean? It means to be coloured in God's colour, to adopt, imbibe and reflect God's attributes.

There is no reason why students of Urdu-medium schools should not be enabled to speak excellent English.

I am from Old Delhi. I was born in Ballimaran our house was just a short distance from where the famous Urdu poet Mirza Ghalib had lived. Ours was an Urduspeaking family. I studied in an Urdumedium government school, where the monthly fees was, in those days, 10 paise! After that, I enrolled at the Anglo-Arabic Senior Secondary School, which was also an Urdu-medium school.

In the 9th standard, I chose to study Science: it was a subject that I was deeply interested in. However, people wondered how I, a student of an Urdu-medium school, would manage as Science was taught through the medium of English. I soon realised that there was hardly any material on Science available in Urdu.

In 1992, in order to address this lacuna, I started writing articles on science-related issues in Urdu. I would send them to popular Urdu newspapers that were read by a wide cross-section of the Urdu-speaking public so that they could have a broad reach. Later, I launched the Urdu monthly magazine 'Science', which is still being brought out.

Some people claim that the problem that Urdu faces today is because it now has almost no link with employment. I do not agree with this. Numerous schools and universities advertise for the post of Urdu teachers but these posts remain vacant as there aren't

enough sufficiently qualified applicants. The problem lies in the fact that in many cases, even families that consider themselves 'Urduspeaking' have stopped speaking the language. That is why Urdu has declined. Somehow, some people wrongly believe that Urdu is synonymous with backwardness and English with progress.

English is the language of today, and it is not surprising that many people want their children to excel in that language. That is perfectly understandable. By all means study and excel in English, but that doesn't mean that one should neglect other languages, including one's mother tongue. There is no reason why students of Urdumedium schools should not be enabled to speak excellent English. I know of a Hindimedium school where the students' English is in no way inferior to that of students in English-medium schools. There is the case of a Muslim-run school in Kolkata where students excel in four languages: English, Arabic, Hindi and Urdu.

Progress doesn't mean that one should forget one's roots and culture. Take the case of Japan. Japan has impressive economic and technological progress but its people haven't given up their language. At the same time, we should be open to good influences from different quarters.

No language is superior or inferior. Each has

Practising justice is a cardinal Islamic teaching. One can conceive of the practice of justice in different ways. One way is to consider how far we are doing justice with regard to the various roles that we play and our different responsibilities. For instance, if one is a student who is getting a scholarship, is one doing justice to the scholarship by spending enough time studying? Or, if one is a teacher, is she doing justice to her work by preparing well enough for her classes?

The reality of whether one is indeed doing justice with regard to one's roles and responsibilities is known only to oneself and to God. We will have to give a full account of this to God.

Justice and Goodness are attributes of God. The spiritual path can be summarised as a process of getting dyed in the colour of God, of imbibing and reflecting the attributes of God, including justice and goodness. For

instance, God is merciful, and so we too should be merciful. God is generous, and so we too should be generous. God is just, and so we too should be just.



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Help Mariyam Khatoon, widow of Alimuddin Ansari, the Jharkhand lynching victim

Mariyam Khatoon, the widow of Alimuddin Ansari, has been living a sorrowful life since the time her husband was lynched to death in June, 2017 by a mob on suspicion of carrying beef in Jharkhand. Just while Khatoon and her family were trying to cope up with the unexpected misery, her eldest son, Shehzad, passed away in January 2019, after they couldn't afford medical treatment for him.

On June 29, 2017, Alimuddin Ansari (55), was transporting meat in his van from Chitarpur area of Ramgarh. Suspecting that Ansari was carrying beef, a group of cow vigilantes attacked him and set his van on fire before lynching him in full public view at Bazartand locality in Ramgarh. A video of the incident later went viral on social media. Almost a year later, a special fast track court, set up by the Jharkhand High Court (HC), awarded life imprisonment to 11 of the 12 accused on June 21, 2018. However, within a month of the conviction, 10 of the 11 convicts were granted bail by the HC. Also, Khatoon was given a compensation of rupees seven lakhs by the HC. However, no amount of money can compensate for the irreparable loss of Khatoon at the hands of the Hindutva rightwing fundamentalists.

Just recently, in February 2019, Khatoon said that the government had abandoned them after fulfilling half the promises. She said, "The government abandoned us after fulfilling half the promises it made. We were assured jobs and a ration shop (under the Public Distribution System), but nothing has happened till now. I used to keep doing the rounds of government offices. But I have stopped now," she says. It is not about monetary compensation, she adds, but having a stable source of income.

With no end to her agony, as per the information received by us, now Khatoon's son, Shahbaz (18) is critically ill and admitted to the hospital. On contacting Khatoon, she told us that Shahbaz has

undergone a surgery yesterday after a hole was detected in his intestines. She thus requires money for his further treatment.

On asking about the promise of giving a job, Khatoon said that after the death of her eldest son, who was to get a job, she took her other son, Shahban (19), to the government office pleading that he be given a job. Though all the documents were submitted, Khatoon hasn't received a reply from the authorities yet!

Khatoon says that she will not be able to bear one more grave loss in her life. Thus, on behalf of Khatoon, Sabrang India appeals to everybody to help her in her hard times. Following are

Kolkata: Two Mosques to Make Provisions for Women

Two heritage mosques in Kolkata are making provisions, including separate entries, special halls and washrooms, for Muslim women to offer namaz on the premises through the year. Authorities of the Nakhoda mosque and Tipu Sultan mosque are creating separate halls and washrooms for women after a written request by the Bengal Imam Association. Imam Shafique Qasmi of Nakhoda Masjid popularly known as Badi Masjid confirmed the letter and said plans were afoot. "Yes we have received

the letter. M a n y women still come and offer namaz at one corner of the masjid but now the managing committee is making better arrangement

s for women. There are three entrances to Nakhoda Masjid and none of them is exclusive for women. A separate place for women to perform ablutions, offer namaz and take rest are planned within the masjid," said Oasmi. "We have seen that there is no proper provision for women to offer namaz in these two renowned mosques. According to the Sharia, women can offer namaz where there is a provision for 'purdah'. However, such provisions are not available. Women visit these mosques even from abroad but can't pray here under present circumstances. Therefore, after discussions, we decided to send a letter to the two mosques," said Md Yahiya, chairman of Bengal Imam Association. "We are happy that they agreed to our proposal. Proper arrangements and special halls are being prepared where women can offer namaz," added Yahiya.

The letter, a copy of which was also sent to the Kolkata Municipal Corporation among others, has three requests a separate 'purdah' arrangement for women to offer namaz, a washroom for women and another for people with disabilities. "We have seen that many women, including foreigners, visit the mosques with the intent to offer namaz. But they feel uncomfortable as there are no separate provisions. We are ashamed to see this," the

letter states

Authorities of the two mosques have agreed and started drawing up plans for setting up separate halls and other provisions for women.

While Muslim women are allowed to offer prayers in mosques as per Islamic law, they do not get a chance to pray at many religious spots in Bengal, barring some of the mosques, due to lack of separate provisions for them at many of these spaces. "It would be nice if we have proper provision in mosques to offer namaz. We cannot pray along with men because it is against Islamic law... If proper arrangements are made, women like me would not miss namaz even when outside home," said Amina Khatun, a teacher. with an English medium school in South Kolkata.

Tipu Sultan mosque was built in 1842 by Prince Ghulam Muhammed, youngest son of Tipu Sultan, while the foundation stone of Nakhoda mosque was laid on September 11, 1926

Khalid Al Rumaihi, Chief Executive of the Bahrain Economic Development Board said: "With both female founders and women taking leadership roles throughout the ecosystem, Bahrain is a dynamic and diverse market at the head of new trends that are shaping the way society and business operates."

Dr. Ebrahim Mohammed Janahi, Chief Executive of Tamkeen (Bahrain's Labour Fund) pointed

out one of Bahrain's key competitive advantages in the region, which lies in its firm belief in the importance of women as an active player in shaping Bahrain's economic future

Bahrain has a long history of women in senior leadership positions. Currently, a group of female leaders in FinTech is helping to steer the country's FinTech strategy. Leading female Bahraini startup founders include Hala Sulaiman and Ameera AlOubaiti co-founders of Alrawi, a successful audiobook startup and Pitch@Palace Global 3.0 People's Choice 2018 Winner. Furthermore, Bahrain's Al Waha Fund of Funds, a \$100 million fund set up by the Bahrain Development Bank, has an all-female leadership.

As for FinTech, in 2018 Bahrain launched FinTech Bay, the Middle East's leading FinTech hub. Interestingly, it's estimated that more than 60% of computer science students at the University of Bahrain in 2018 were women.

Egyptian Women Use **Ancient Indonesian Martial** Arts to Fight Abuse

In the heart of Egypt's capital, an ancient Indonesian martial arts sport is helping dozens of women stand up to harassment. With the help of Indonesian students, over 1,200 women and children are learning the sport at a cultural centre in Cairo.

"Of course there are problems in the street," Egyptian teenager Rahma Hatem says. "If someone comes near me, I'm able to defend myself well. I have confidence now and no one can harass me because I can face them."

"Pencak Silat" gained

prominence in Egypt in 2003 but started to increase in popularity in 2011, said trainer Roqaya Samaloosi. The women, mostly teenagers and young adults, gather in the Indonesian Cultural Centre weekly and train to enhance self-defence skills and fitness

Experts surveyed by the Thomson Reuters Foundation in 2017 ranked Cairo as the world's most dangerous megacity for women, based on lack of protection from sexual violence, harmful cultural practices, and poor access to healthcare and finance.

Pencak Silat dates back to the sixth century, where it was practised on Sumatra island and the Malay peninsula. Two kingdoms, the Sriwijaya in Sumatra and the Majapahit on Java island, used the fighting skills and between the 7th and 16th century ruled much of what is now Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore. Pencak is the performance aspect of the discipline, while Silat is the fighting and self-defence version of the sport.

uthor of several dozen books, New Delhi-based Maulana Wahiduddin Khan is one of the most widelyknown present-day Islamic scholars. This delightful book is a collection of more than 100 short essays (mostly of single page length) by the Maulana, each of which highlights one or more moral value and indicates the importance of ethics as the basis of a truly meaningful life.

Maulana Wahiduddin Khan has a deep understanding of the Islamic scriptural tradition, but in this book he draws insights from other sources too, indicating a universal understanding of spirituality based on an ethical core which people of all faiths might easily connect with. Reflecting the Maulana's understanding that spirituality isn't something cut off from daily life, but, rather, is deeply rooted in it, this book is framed around anecdotes from the lives of people (famous as well as 'ordinary'), aspects of Nature, key events in the history of countries, reports in newspapers, and so on, through which the author derives useful moral lessons which we can put into practice in our everyday lives. In this way, he shows us how every experience can be a source of spiritual growth if we care to reflect on and learn from it. From such experiences, no matter how 'negative' some of them might seem, one can draw spiritual nourishment, growing in awareness of such values as Godconsciousness, forgiveness, patience, compassion, determination and positive thinking. The many little stories that this book narrates strikingly highlight these and other such values, embodied mostly in the form of real-life events and phenomena.


A few examples from the book vividly illustrate this powerful technique. In a story titled 'Teacher Tree', the Maulana tells us that the tree-trunk forms only one half of a tree, the roots being the other half. The top half of a tree can only stand erect and verdant

above the ground when the tree is prepared to bury its other half beneath the ground. "A tree stands above the ground, fixing its roots firmly beneath the ground. It grows from beneath, upwards into the air; it does

not start at the top and grow downwards", the Maulana notes. "The tree is our teacher", he writes, "imparting to us the lesson of nature that if we seek to progress outwardly, we must first strengthen ourselves inwardly; we must begin from the base of our own selves before we can hope to build society anew."

In another chapter, showing how individuals can draw useful spiritual lessons for their own lives from the history of entire countries, the Maulana highlights the case of Japan. In 1941, Japan attacked the US naval base at Pearl Harbour, destroying a large number of American vessels. In retaliation, in 1945, America dropped two atom bombs on Japan on the two major Japanese industrial cities of Nagasaki and Hiroshima thus annihilating Japan as a military power. Thereafter, America kept up a tight military and political hold on Japan. However, instead of taking revenge on America for the largescale atomic devastation, Japan responded peacefully and positively to the new situation. Before World War II, Khan explains, Japan relied on the power of military weapons. But after witnessing the destruction that these weapons caused, it relinquished their use and set about progressing entirely on peaceful lines, so much so that in a few years, it became an economic superpower. Simply by accepting the fact that aggression could not serve dividends and then channelizing its potentials towards the field of industry. Japan reached new heights. It was able to turn its military defeat into an economic victory by abstaining from



retaliation, encouraging patience and perseverance, avoiding provocation and focusing on fields of peaceful activity, getting busy with the task of economic rehabilitation without wasting any time on bewailing lost opportunities, blaming others for one's misfortunes or engaging in pointless nostalgia. Instead of seeking revenge, Japan focussed on availing existing opportunities. It accepted, the Maulana tells us, the blame for its destruction, and, once having done so, was able to seriously work for its own economic uplift.

Perceptive readers can draw numerous from this little snippet of Japanese history for their own personal lives. One of these is how to deal with others in this world of competition. The Maulana notes that one can approach this predicament in two ways: one is to collide with that which obstructs one's path. The other is to circumvent the obstacle and then go one's way (the path adopted by post-World War II Japan). The first, Khan explains, is selfdestructive, while the second is much more likely to prove advantageous.

Another story from which the Maulana derives useful spiritual insights relates to the island of Sicily (now part of Italy), which was under Muslim rule for many years until 1090, when it was conquered by the Normans. The founder of the Norman kingdom of Sicily was Roger II (1095-1154). Although he belonged to a nation of conquerors and it was the Muslims whom he had defeated, the Maulana writes that he retained high respect for Arabs and Islam. His coronation mantle was designed by a Muslim artist and had Arabic inscriptions woven into it. After his coronation, Roger II wanted a chart showing the full extent of the Norman empire. He chose a Muslim cartographer, Al-Idrisi, to design it because the latter was a leading expert in this field. Al-Idrisi went on to prepare an atlas for Roger II, consisting of 70 maps and extensive geographical data. Khan suggests that Roger II's selection of Al-Idrisi for the mammoth task of preparing maps of the whole known world shows

that at that time the Muslims' intellectual and academic expertise was widely accepted by others. Although defeated respect for Muslim scholars and their continued intellectual domination even after military defeat shows that the solutions to the problems of the Muslims in the modern world lies in their cultivating technological capability, and establishing dominance in the field of modern scientific knowledge. This can be achieved not by protests and militant "fundamentalism", but by earnest academic endeavour alone; it can be acquired by seeking to give to the world, rather than just take from it.'

militarily in Sicily, Muslims continued their intellectual and academic brilliance, even in the court of the conqueror.

The Maulana contrasts this with what he regards as the present-day Muslims' predicament. He writes: 'Muslims today complain of their political, economic and military subjection to non-Muslim nations. They think they can take back, by protest and militancy, what has been seized from them. But the case of Roger II of Sicily his

ohammed Shuiatullah. a student of Pharm D from Sultan ul-Uloom College of Pharmacy, Hyderabad, began serving free breakfast to the needy three years ago and is continuing to do so till date without a break of a single day. Every morning, he goes to three Government hospitals in Hyderabad Nilofer Hospital, Government Maternity Hospital, Koti and Nizam Institute of medical sciences (NIMS) with hot Upma cooked in pure ghee and chutney to serve breakfast to the patients and their attendants. He finishes serving breakfast by 9.15-9.30 am in all the three hospitals feeding nearly a 1000 people.

How it Began

Shujat spoke to TwoCircles.net about how his philanthropic journey that started in 2014 by serving food packets to just 10 people and by 2016 went on to reach 1000. "When I was in my final year of bachelor's degree I had failed in one subject. And as I was awaiting my results I sent up a prayer that I will feed 10 hungry people if my backlog is cleared. It was the day the results were to be declared." And luckily he passed. And so the same night, he went to the street with 10 packets of food. He woke up an old man to give the food, but the man declined by saying he had his fill and told Shujat to give the food packet to someone else. Shujat did not expect this from a homeless poor person. He says, "The old man could have taken the food and kept it for the morning. But he was so honest. And that touched a chord in me".

The 10 packets were not enough as there were more people who wanted food. Shujat came the next night again with more food packets and this time again the old man who had fallen asleep huddled in a corner due to the chilly winter said the same thing. Shujat asked the man to keep the food for the morning. And the man said, 'God will feed me in the morning. For now, you give my

share to someone else'. Shujat was impressed not just with the honesty of the old man but his belief in Providence. Shujat says, he got to thinking, 'Here is a homeless beggar, who does not even know if he will get the next meal, yet he has such a firm belief in the Almighty who is the provider of one and all.' And after this, he began serving food packets on a daily basis to the persons on the streets.

Serving breakfast at Niloufer Hospital

One day, he had a chance to go to a Government Hospital, where he saw people from different districts and villages come to Hyderabad for treatment and they lived in the hospital for days together with their attendants. They find it difficult to buy food due to monetary problems. So the idea of serving breakfast struck him.

Mobilising Funds

Fortunately for Shujat, his father has 12 siblings and all of them with their children are in a good position. He capitalised on this and made quick calls to all of them and asked them all to donate their one day's salary to him. He explained to them what he would do with the funds. And soon he had enough money to enable him to serve breakfast twice a week in one Government Hospital. And soon friends and other extended family started donating. "As they say, little drops make a mighty ocean, funds started to come steadily and soon I was able to serve breakfast on a daily basis," he told TwoCircles.net.

The daily expense for Upma for approximately 1000 persons with 25 kilos of semolina comes to Rs. 5000/- including the auto charges and the cost of disposable cutlery. On why he chose Upma, Shujat says, "Upma is easy to make and if I attempt any other item there will be a difference in the planned budget." And when his service came to light through media, more people began to donate. And Shujat who was getting immense satisfaction from feeding the poor, decided to start a foundation for charity and service. So in 2016, he registered 'Humanity First Foundation'.

Humanity First Foundation

Through the foundation, Shujat reached out to potential donors through friends, social media platforms and also crowdfunding via the Internet. His activities also expanded gradually and he now distributes blankets to people on



the streets; free supper in the nights to beggars, donates books and other things in orphanages, helps very poor families with their monthly ration.

Once the foundation was registered, his contacts also grew. Other like-minded NGOs

contacted him to work in collaboration. So now Shujat has extended his services to an old age home on the suburbs of Hyderabad where he supplies medicines, adult diapers and groceries, supports a livelihood programme for women by

running a tailoring centre in a neighbouring town and providing them sewing machines and conducting free medical camps. He even identifies homeless old people who have no one to take care of them and admits them in old age homes.

What the future holds for him and the Foundation

Shujatullah shared with TwoCircles.net, that he is able to do all this not just because of the good values instilled by his parents but also because of the support his friends, family and donors have been rendering. And he is one busy person juggling his internship at Aster Prime Hospital after serving breakfast in the hospitals which he finishes by 9.15. After coming home from the hospital, after a quick bite, he goes to overlook the functioning of the small Urdu medium school started by his grandfather. His father is a retired government employee and mother a homemaker. Shujat has no intention of going abroad or even out of Hyderabad even though he got several offers. For him, his foundation comes first. "I hope my life partner will have the same passion as me so I can continue my work with the same zeal", he says laughingly when asked about the future. "I am going to continue to serve the poor as long as I can" he added.

Humane Values Need to Be at the Very Heart of Education

Education is a process of reaching out from what one is to what one ought to be. It begins from the very conception of a child in the womb and carries on until he/she reaches the final destination in this world i.e. death. Experience is the best teacher, and everything a person experiences throughout his/her life can be a valuable source of education or learning. Understood in this way, education is a lifelong process. It isn't something that is learnt only in formal educational institutions such as schools and colleges and that one pays a fee to acquire. Life itself is one vast school!

Education is the search within, to bring out the potential inherent in oneself that is as yet unutilized and undiscovered. Education can be compared with the process of the blooming of a flowering plant. The flower comes from within the plant, not from outside. Likewise,

the potential to acquire knowledge and wisdom is already there in each one of us. Teachers and others can only help us nurture it.

What should be the goal of education? For most people in the 'modern' world, education is only a means for getting a 'good' job and earning as much money as possible. I feel this is a curse. Focusing simply on scoring high marks in exams and a resultoriented learning go completely against what education ought to be. One consequence of this sort of 'education' is that the pressure put on the students from various corners often becomes unbearable for students. Little or no attention is given to the students' character formation. With many years of experience of teaching and managing schools I can say that I am really worried about the present educational system and where it seems to be heading.

Unless the whole system of



education is redefined and rearticulated, the situation can only get more alarming. We need to give much more attention to value-based education. Ethical and moral values should have a much more prominent place in education. Marks in exams must come only after that. Fraternity, righteousness, concern for others, respect for elders and teachers, respect for other faiths and cultures and other such humane values must be given the top priority. Any 'education' without self-discipline and character formation will be a threat to the very human race.

Pope Francis declares 'climate emergency' and urges action

Pope Francis, head of the Catholic Church, has declared a global "climate emergency," warning of the dangers of global heating and that a failure to act urgently to reduce greenhouse gases would be "a brutal act of injustice toward the poor and future generations." The pontiff also endorsed the 1.5C limit on temperature rises that some countries are now aiming for, referring to warnings from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change of "catastrophic" effects if we crossed such a threshold. He said a "radical energy transition" would be needed to stay within that limit, and urged young people and businesses to take a leading role. "Future generations stand to inherit a greatly spoiled world. Our children and grandchildren should not have to pay the cost of our generation's irresponsibility," he said, in his strongest and most direct intervention yet on the climate crisis. "Indeed, as is becoming increasingly clear, young people are calling for a change."

The Pope's plea came as he met the leaders of some of the world's biggest multinational oil companies in the Vatican on June 14 to impress upon them the urgency and scale of the challenge and their central role in tackling the emissions crisis. It followed a similar meeting last year, but this time the Pope's stance was tougher as he warned that time was running out and urged them to hear "the increasingly desperate cries of the earth and its poor".

The chief executives or chairs of BP, ExxonMobil, Shell, Total, Conoco Philips, Chevron and several major investors including Black Rock and Hermes, responded by calling on governments to put in place carbon pricing to encourage low-carbon innovation, and called for greater financial transparency to aid investors. However, they made no pledges to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions, and set

no timetable for action.

In two statements, which came at the end of a two-day meeting in the Vatican that was addressed by the Pope and led by senior Vatican churchmen, the signatories called for a "combination of policies and carbon pricing mechanisms ... designed in a way that simultaneously delivers innovation and investment in low-carbon solutions while assisting those least able to pay".

Emissions are rising at their fastest level in close to a decade, leaving an ever shorter period to prevent dangerous levels of global heating. Every year of high emissions takes the world closer to the brink, because it adds to the stock of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, which can take a century to dissipate. Recently, the concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere showed the second highest annual increase since continuous records began more than 60 years ago.

Trump created 'phony' emergency to bypass Congress to approve arms sales to Saudi Arabia?

US President Donald Trump has been accused of creating a "phony" emergency to bypass Congress to approve an \$8 billion arms sale to Saudi Arabia. The White House said it was making an emergency provision within the country's arms control law to enable the billions of dollars of arms sales to the Saudi kingdom and the United Arab Emirates, the US's strongest allies in the Persian

Gulf. The recourse helps the president spare congressional review for the exports. The Trump administration had cited "alleged threats from Iran" to justify resorting to the provision.R. Clarke Cooper, the State Department's assistant secretary of state for political-military affairs, appeared before the House Foreign Affairs Committee, where he was grilled over the \$8

billion "emergency" arms sale to Saudis. Democratic members of the House committee said the president's action violated the law because there was no actual emergency. They also said Trump's action shows that the United States is tolerating worst human rights abuses by Saudi Arabia in its war on Yemen.

UN to Commemorate Religious Persecution Victims

The United Nations has established an International Day Commemorating the Victims of Acts of Violence Based on Religion or Belief. The U.N.'s General Assembly passed the resolution without objection recently, setting August 22 as the day commemorating victims of anti-religious violence. "The world has been experiencing an unprecedented rise of violence against religious communities and people belonging to religious minorities," said Jacek

Czaputowicz, Poland's foreign minister, speaking before the General Assembly. Poland introduced the resolution creating the day. He cited recent "appalling acts of violence" against mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand and Easter Sunday bombings of churches in Sri Lanka. "Hatred towards religious groups may lead to mass killing of innocent people," Czaputowicz said. He cited surveys showing that a third of the world's population suffers from "some form of religious

persecution." In some countries, he said, some religious adherents are prohibited from practising their rituals even in their own homes. "The right of freedom of thought, conscience and religion, commonly referred to as a right to religious freedom or belief, is a universal right of every human being. This right is a cornerstone of many other rights. Any act of violence against people belonging to religious minorities cannot be accepted," Czaputowicz said.

Muslims & Christians take steps towards reconciliation

Recently, a group of Muslims visited Christian widows and orphans in north western Nigeria and donated food, clothing and school items as part of efforts to enhance peaceful coexistence among different faiths. "I can't believe they came and visited me," said Judy Ugwu, a mother of four who lives in Kaduna state in north western Nigeria. "They have given me enough food and clothes. I want to forgive every Muslim who has wronged me in any way."Ugwu, 38, who is a Christian, lost her husband early this year when gunmen dressed in military uniforms and armed with AK47 rifles, machetes and sticks attacked her village of Kajuru and killed more than 60 people. She accused the majority Hausa-Fulani tribe, who are predominantly Muslim and herders of cattle, for brutally

murdering her husband. "I had vowed never to forgive them," she said. "They wanted to finish us (non-Muslims) during elections so that their people can ascend to power, but God protected his people."

There has been constant conflict in northern Nigeria for decades, pitting the majority Muslim population against the minority Christian population. In Kaduna state, the Hausa-Fulani tribe makes up 60% of the population, and the non-Muslim minorities who are mainly farmers make up the remaining 40%. The minority Christian populations have for decades accused Muslims of using elections to control political and economic power in the state by only electing Muslim

Pope Francis hopes to visit Iraq in 2020



Announcing his desire to visit Iraq in 2020, Pope Francis, head of the Catholic Church, has called for a peaceful resolution to crises in the Middle East. He also warned that God would unleash his wrath on hypocritical leaders who liked to talk about peace while selling weapons to

warring nations. "People escaping, crowded on boats, they cry out, seeking hope, not knowing which ports will be able to welcome them in a Europe which opens its ports to vessels that have to load sophisticated and costly weapons, capable of wreaking havoc that doesn't even spare children," he said. The pope made his comments during a meeting on June 10 with a Vatican coalition of funding agencies, known by its Italian acronym ROACO. Pope Francis said their meetings with experts would help them "hear the cry of the many who have been robbed over these years of hope." They included people from Syria, where the risk of a major humanitarian crisis still looms, he said, underlining the plight of so many people left without food, medicine, schools and loved ones who have died or been killed. While people may be "insensitive" to such tragedy, God is not, because he is moved by the cries of his children, and he seeks to protect and guide them with tenderness, the Pope said. The Pope said his thoughts were also with Iraq, "where I have the desire to go next year."



Muslims Save Hundreds from London Building Fire

Muslims leaving fajr prayer from a mosque in East London recently risked their lives by running into a burning block tower to rescue hundreds of people who were asleep, WTX News reported. A local resident said "They made sure everyone got out. They knocked on each door until someone opened. There were six or seven of them and they were only young. If it wasn't for them we would never have got out."At about 2.40am members of Madina Mosque, near the Lea Bridge roundabout, in Hackney, spotted a fire on the eighth floor of Gooch House on Kenninghall Road. Running towards the building, they began

banging on all doors to wake everyone up. Madina Mosque chair Mohammed Sidat said he was extremely proud and that it showed a side of Islam people didn't always get to hear about. The blaze, caused by a discarded cigarette, was brought under control within an hour.

of 16 May to offer them white roses as a way of providing encouragement and support.

Arrest Warrant issued on Anti-Muslim Monk



Yangon: The Myanmar police have issued an arrest warrant against Wirathu, an ultranationalist Buddhist monk known for his anti-Muslim stance. The warrant was issued under Article 124(a) of the legal code, which forbids incitement of hatred or contempt against the government. The monk is accused of making defamatory remarks against Myanmar's de facto leader Aung San SuuKyi. The monk is known for his tirades against Muslims, including comments that sparked a wave of sectarian violence against the community in central Myanmar in 2013 and for supporting the military operation that led to over 700,000 Rohingya fleeing to neighbouring Bangladesh in 2017. Wirathu was the most visible face of the 969 movement a Buddhist group that opposed expansion of Islam in Myanmar, and the now defunct Patriotic Association of Myanmar, whose anti-Muslim position led the government to pass several laws considered discriminatory against Muslims. His controversial comments, which also include calling for a boycott of Muslim businesses and hailing the assassination of a Muslim lawyer close to SuuKyi, prompted Facebook to close his account and led the Thai authorities to ban his entry into the country, where he was scheduled to deliver a sermon.

HADITH ILLUMNATES THE PATH

Caution

Jabir ibn Abdullah reports that the Prophet (peace be upon him) said: 'Secure your doors, tie up your waterskins, turn over your vessels, cover up your dishes, and put off your lights. Satan does not open a secured door, untie a knot, or uncover a dish. However, a mouse could set a house on fire'.

[Bukhari, Tirmidhi]

This hadith provides very useful instructions which remain valid for most people. The first instruction is to secure our doors before going to sleep. Today, in most places, this goes without saying because burglary is very common. But it need not be so. There are places in many parts of the world where people are safe from burglars, either because they live in a small community where everyone knows everyone else, or where social conditions provide enough security. Yet, one may not be safe from other creatures finding their way into homes causing people some harm when they are asleep. Hence, securing our doors provides the necessary standard of safety.

Today, people have water supplied into their homes by pipes and tanks, where it is safe from ordinary contamination. However, in times past, people had to make sure that they had sufficient water for their drinking and home use. Hence, they stored it in containers, some types of which were made of hide or some other material. It is such containers, and indeed any other type, that the Prophet wanted to make sure were tightened so as to prevent any harmful object or

insect from falling into them. The same applies to any plate, pot or saucepan where food is kept. While today we leave much of our food in fridges, there remains around the house much food that may be left exposed. The important thing in this hadith is not to leave food exposed overnight. Some insect might get into it or dust and harmful particles might drop on it, making it a cause of harm instead of a source of nourishment.

Putting off the light is the next injunction in this hadith, particularly when we talk about oil lamps and similar lights. Such a lamp may be blown over by wind, or by a cat, and it could then cause a fire. This is what the Prophet warns against when he mentions that a mouse could set a house on fire. What attracts a mouse is the wick of a lamp, and it could pull it and cause the lamp to fall over, spilling its oil and causing a fire. Hence, the Prophet repeatedly warned against leaving lamps on at night, or in a position where a mouse could pull at it.

The Seasonal Piety of Ramzan!

Islam is a holistic religion, and Allah's system doesn't work like a calculator. His system is based on *meezan* (measuring scale or yardstick), that weighs the good and bad deeds instead of calculating them.

Ramzan is a blessed month for Muslims world over. Majority of Muslims observe the month of Ramzan with utmost devotion and religious fervour following Islamic injunctions strictly that usher a phase of 'inflated piety'.

In Islam, religious rituals and commandments are not an end in themselves. They are a means to an end that need to be observed to inculcate divine attributes individually. During Ramzan the mosques fill up with mostly seasonal worshippers. Millions of gallons of water are consumed for the ablution purposes by Muslims. The environment of 'piety', 'religiosity' and 'Muslimness' is evident in society and guarded loyally by the seasonally pious Muslims. This overwhelming observance of Islamic rituals is manifested only in mosques and makeshift kiosks that are erected in various public parks, compounds and vacant lands adjacent to mosques.

But the Ramzan spirit, that is the essence of this month, is missing in our individual and collective lives.

Very rarely it happens that Ramzan transforms our souls and leaves an indelible imprint on our characters. The post Ramzan activities of most Muslims are a testimony of this fact. The mosques once again crave for the big congregations, but millions of gallons of water are saved in the process, as the seasonal Muslims wait for next Ramzan to attend mosques for the daily five prayers.

Blurs the Vision

What are the reasons for the drastic decline and disdain towards 'piety' and 'rituals' once the Shawwal moon has been sighted? I can infer a few reasons from my observations. The Muslim masses have been fed on the religious diet of *Sawaab* (Blessings earned due to observance of Islamic rituals). The *Sawaab* paradigm blurs the vision of most Muslims that doesn't help them realize the true spirit and end results that Islam wants to inculcate among Muslims.

What are the reasons for the drastic decline and disdain towards 'piety' and 'rituals' once the Shawwal moon has been sighted? I can infer a few reasons from my observations. The Muslim masses have been fed on the religious diet of Sawaab (Blessings earned due to observance of Islamic rituals).

The *Sawaab* paradigm is invoked voraciously during Ramzan that makes Muslims cling to mosques in order to earn most *Sawaab*. The *Sawaab* is one dimension or reward that is bestowed on Muslims by Allah but to render it as an epicentre of Islamic activism deprives Muslims of the real spirit of Islam.

Ramzan is a month that should inculcate the spirit of Justice, compassion, mercy, brotherhood and equality among Muslims. We can witness a small manifestation of religious observance in mosques while our market places, offices and families remain deprived from the core values that Islam and Ramzan want to inculcate among Muslims.

Another big miscalculation by Muslims is that they think that Allah judges Muslims on basis of good deeds and evil deeds. This system according to their flawed opinion works like a calculator that adds and multiplies their good deeds while deducting their bad deeds. Thus, if they both pray and accept bribes they still can crave for heaven and think that Allah will forgive them.

Measuring Scale or Yardstick

Ramzan being among the most blessed months, that offers the evil souls a unique opportunity to cleanse themselves and then return to their old routine after Ramzan, repeating the vicious circle over decades. Islam is a holistic religion and Allah's system doesn't work like a calculator, but his system is based on *Meezan* (measuring scale or yardstick), that weighs the good and bad deeds instead of calculating them.

Quran exhorts Muslims to enter into the fold of Islam completely. A true Muslim can't have double, split or hypocritical personality. A true Muslim can be either a corrupt official or a practicing Muslim. He can't be both at the same time. He can't please both Allah and Satan; he has to choose one of the two. Those who are thinking that they can please both masters would gain consent of none. The spirit of Ramzan and observing prayers is that, one ends his relationship with Satan, upholds and inculcates the core values of Islam particularly the compassion towards poor, downtrodden and wretched of the

The other reason for the epidemic increase in the observance levels of Islamic piety is due to environment and peer pressure during Ramzan.

It is a month during which most Muslims enquire about the absence of others particularly in the Dawn and Night prayers. This pressure motivates many to join the prayers, but this habit is discontinued by most in the aftermath of Ramzan.

Ramzan is observed by Muslims world over every year but very rarely its real spirit and fruits are bestowed on Muslims due to their own flawed understanding of Islam. An average Muslim observes Ramzan for decades strictly without any real transformation taking place that Ramzan aims for. Ramzan has been made synonymous by Muslims with seasonal piety and prayers whereas Ramzan and Islam aims at making Muslims compassionate. contributing and merciful citizens who bring glad tidings and fill the earth with tolerance, love and peace. But this spirit keeps evading Muslims every Ramzan.

Sharing Discover Yourself

I wanted to share my Eid story, an incredible experience highlighting to me some of the most profound lessons that I have learn from Sadathullah Khan Sir's Discover Yourself workshop.

As Allah commands us not to cut what He has ordered to be joined and Sadath Sir gave us an assignment to forgive and ask forgiveness from our relatives. I've been working on it since last Ramadan along with my mother. Alhamdulillah we've been able to ask forgiveness from almost all the major people we needed to and we are working towards rebuilding our relations. Just a couple of them remain, one of who is my paternal aunt. She lives in another town and we tried to travel multiple times yet failed. We made dua this Ramadan for our family's unity again and with God's grace we got to travel to the town due to death of a relative on Eid day. So this made this Eid day experience one out of ordinary.

Now, I always got hurt, worried or emotionally affected whenever I had any hard conversations with someone close to me. I would pick on their emotions, words and opinions and then had a hard time healing myself. Sadath Sir advised me to be detached with the people and circumstances when dealing with them for I could never be there for others if I myself break.

So now back to my aunt's incident: My mother and I made the intention to go and we decided that whatever be her response, it would be her responsibility. We were going only for the sake of Allah to play the role we were meant to as part of the family, and we were only concerned and responsible for our part. We decided to knock the door of her heart and invite her to unite, irrespective of whether she opened the door or not.

Somehow we managed to search and reached her house. It was a surprise for her! She behaved in a

very hostile way right from the beginning. The first words she uttered were like: "Why have you come here, after all these years of absence?" It went on like: "23 years is too long and you were away. Now what's the use?"....."You should have come when our mother (i.e. my grandma) was alive. It's too late now." And on she went with similar rigidity.

Aunty reacted as if we had come to her because we needed her for something, that we wanted some kind of personal benefit and so we are approaching her softly. She seemed to feel in power over us as if she was doing a great job by keeping her heart closed. Still, we managed to calmly convey our purpose for coming. We let her know about our understanding of Allah's command. And we took leave. Even when we were leaving and my mom held her hand warmly, aunty stood like a stick looking like a stubborn child.

Had I been the earlier me, it would have certainly affected me a lot. I would have been attached to the outcome I expected. So, when things turned out the opposite, I would have had a lot of heaviness, been angry, defensive, hurt, made judgements about what a bad person she was and how rudely she behaved.. I would have said things like, "It's no use talking to her! Now we know again why we had enmity! Better stay away in future..." Blah blah blah!

Now, I did notice all the rude behaviour. She didn't even ask us how we are doing, how we came all the way, and so on. But it did not affect us at all. Instead, we could observe her immature behaviour and notice how she was losing herself and even the opportunity Allah bought in front of her. I felt pity on her. I could see her as a human being, and I had enough kindness to give her. I donned a warm smile and didn't hesitate in making eye contact. My own response amazed me! It happened because we were on a

mission for the sake of Allah alone. We were focused only on our deeds, our ibadah. We were only concerned about our own role as part of our family life. That we just wanted to clean our slate from sins.

So, I learned this powerful lesson of how to be detached. Sometimes, you may feel hurt and it's ok it's part of being human but do not let the hurtful feelings consume vou. Come from the background of doing things for Allah alone. Focus on the *ibadah*, on your deeds, rather than on what people are thinking, doing or saying to you. Never stop doing good deeds just because others are wronging you. Do not blame the injustices in your life and fall in despair. Rather, live in reality and act on what you can do to bring a difference. It will make you more grateful.

If you do your part for Allah, He intervenes and strengthens your heart and protects you from breaking.

There is thin line between striving to achieve something and being attached to the outcome. It's not about desensitizing yourself, denying what comes forth or making yourself hard.

Yes, you desire something, you have goals and dreams, you strive with all your potentials and resources, you make dua, but please don't get stuck on the outcome or have unrealistic expectations: you are burdening others if you do. Leave it to Allah. Surrender to His will. His will is with His wisdom. And when you do, then even if you fail, it won't break you, for it could not have been better than

And remember, if you slip (for you will and I always do) it's ok, don't beat yourself up. We are created imperfect and we are all on a journey towards Allah. Just keep learning, keep moving, and be gentle on yourself.

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Q: What inspired you to write this book on Atheism? What are some of your major arguments?

A: My encounters (disputes and discussions) with atheists on the one hand, and the stunning and fascinating experiences of God's existence and His loving providence, on the other, inspired and motivated me to write the book.

My observations and reflections on how things in this world correspond to one another in a kind of mutual compatibility and "dove-tailing" led me to the necessity of a Mastermind behind it all. This is manifested also in our own body, where each organ is structured in view of something outside of the whole system. For instance, the nose is made in such a way that it has nostrils to allow the passage of air coming from outside. The ears are shaped to receive sound waves from outside. The reproductive system shows that it is envisaged and developed in view of another body. This arrangement in which one organ or item is interlinked with another element or organ outside is not possible of itself. It is possible only if directed by a Conductor in a kind of a universal concert or orchestra and that is God. Mere chance, as many atheists claim, cannot bring it about. That all the bodies

Interview With Fr. Sebastian Athapppilly

On the Bankruptcy of Atheism

Father Sebastian Athappilly, a noted Indian Catholic priest, is the author of a recently published thought-provoking book 'The Delusion of Atheism' (Dharmaram Publications, Bangalore, 2017). He is associated with Dharmaram Vidya Kshetram, Bangalore, one of India's leading centres of Catholic learning. In this interview with Roshan Shah, he reflects on a range of issues, related to atheism and faith.

invariably follow this structure of development simply cannot be by chance

Even atheists have to admit that the elements of this Earth have their predictable properties and are governed by certain fixed laws. To hold that the universe came to exist by mere chance and that it is governed by mere chance and that the laws that govern the universe came about by mere chance one needs stronger faith than the faith of the theist in God the Creator! The "faith" of the atheists is thus stronger, but ridiculous!

Atheists sometimes point to the problem of evil and suffering in the world and use it as an argument for their claim about the non-existence of God. But they have no answer to the existence of so much good and beautiful in this world. Nor do they have any meaningful solution to overcome evil in the world. Denying God's existence is no solution to the problems of the world. It is, above all, faith in God that urges us to help people in their suffering. Atheism has no inner dynamism or intrinsic potential to inspire people for selfless love and service. It only leads people to violence, despair and anxiety.

In addition to this, one must also ask why there is something at all rather than nothing. Nothingness might have been an option. But instead of nothing, we experience something that is, that exists; we have an undeniable reality before us. And being cannot emerge from non-being or nothing. In other words, non-being or nothingness cannot be the ground of being or reality. If at all there is reality really, there should be also the Ground or Source of reality really which is God. On an imaginary or fictive hook you cannot hang a real fan!

Q: Besides your personal reflections and reading, did interactions and discussions with atheists also provide insights for your book? If so, could you please provide some details?

The insights I gained from discussions with atheists were in the form of counter-arguments. For instance, atheists often argue that we cannot prove God's existence. This atheistic "argument" is not at all an argument, for this is not a proof against God's existence. If someone is unable to prove the reality or existence of an entity, it only means that the concerned person is incapable of it, or that the concerned reality is of a different sphere, surpassing the possibilities of proof according to the prevalent tools and methods. Physical realities are objects that can be analysed with the help of

physical and material tools and

experiments. Spiritual realities cannot be treated the same way as physical realities. Each being has its own properties. The special nature of God surpasses and overrides all human means to locate and prove Him as though He were a being among the many beings of this world.

The atheistic statement that we cannot prove God's existence is in itself not a proof against His existence. It is illogical to conclude the non-existence of something just because you are not able to prove its existence. No one has disproved God's existence to date, and no atheist has also proved that God does not exist.

Secondly, many important things in our life do not depend upon proofs. We do many significant things in our life without first proving them. A great part of our life is based on reasonable trust. Is it only after a proof or DNA test that we have accepted our parents as our parents?

Some atheists argue that the believers have created a God for the sake of consolation in face of the bitter experiences in this world, caused by nature as well as society; God is, for the atheists, hence a creation of mere wishful thinking. This argument backfires in the counter direction: atheism can be equally said to be the creation of wishful thinking of atheists in order to avoid any

sanction against, or accountability for, their evil deeds. Faith in God helps us, in fact, to face the crises of this world more peacefully and serenely than otherwise. What is wrong with that? Simply because something helps us in our difficulties does not necessarily mean that it is an illusion or a product of wishful thinking. Food and water really help us, for example, in our hunger and thirst. Are they, therefore, illusions?

Q: Violence, hate, misogyny, discrimination, oppression, superstition etc. have long been sought to be justified in the name of religion. Many people might lose faith in God because of the terrible things that have been (and continue to be) done in the name of God and religion. In this context, do you agree that 'religious' people are to a considerable extent responsible for many people losing faith in God and turning atheist? If so, what do you think needs to be done?

A: Unfortunately, violence, hate, oppression, etc. have happened in the name of religion or God. This occurs because of a distorted idea of God and religion, on the one hand, and for political and economic reasons, on the other. If hate and killing are carried out in resonance with the teachings of a particular religious tradition, it is really bad. Such an understanding of religion has nothing to do with God, for God is life, love, justice, and peace. It can, however, happen that members of an authentic religion practice evil deeds which are condemned by their very religion. In this case, they would be acting against their religion. This has to be condemned by the respective religious authorities, showing the reasons for this condemnation from within their religion.



Morever, I didn't know how much of it could be real fact and how much fiction. So, I preferred going back to the kids' shelf and was delighted to discover Saniyasnain Khan's book titled My FavouriteProphet Muhammad Stories. Published by Goodword Books, this colorful book, splashed the Haram. with beautiful illustrations by Gurmeet, takes you back many, many centuries and is a lovely way for children and adults alike to learn

about the early life of the Prophet. The book is packed with fascinating accounts about people and places. We learn about the Kabah and how the pilgrimage to it was organized. We learn about the role of Mecca in major traderoutes. We learn about many incidents such as the re-digging of the Zam Zam well and The Year of Elephants, as well as the birth of Prophet Muhammad, his childhood in the desert and his early life in Makkah. 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Humanity destroyed 83 percent wild animals: study reveals



Humankind is revealed as simultaneously insignificant and utterly dominant in the grand scheme of life on Earth by a groundbreaking new assessment of all life on the planet. The world's 7.6 billion people represent just 0.01 percent of all living things, according to the study. Yet since the dawn of civilization, humanity has caused the loss of 83 percent of all wild mammals and half of plants, while livestock kept by humans abounds. The new work is the first comprehensive estimate of the weight of every class of living creature and overturns some longheld assumptions. Bacteria are indeed a major life form - 13 percent of everything - but plants overshadow everything, representing 82 percent of all living matter. All other creatures, from insects to fungi, to fish and animals, make up just 5 percent of the world's biomass.

Another surprise is that the

teeming life in the oceans represents just 1 percent of all biomass. The vast majority of life is land-based and a large chunk an eighth – is bacteria buried deep below the surface.

The new work reveals that farmed poultry today makes up 70 percent of all birds on the planet, with just 30 percent being wild. The picture is even more stark for mammals-60 percent of all mammals on Earth are livestock, mostly cattle and pigs, 36 percent are human and just 4 percent are wild animals.

The destruction of wild habitat for farming, logging and development has resulted in the start of what many scientists consider the sixth mass extinction of life to occur in the Earth's four billion year history. About half the Earth's animals are thought to have been lost in the last 50 years.

aving seen suffering first hand and losing his wife to cancer, Syed Zameeruddin Kamali today volunteers at Sri Shankara Cancer Hospital and Research Centre, Bangalore, guiding and helping patients both morally and monetarily.

Syed Zameeruddin Kamali is an epitome of modesty. This humble man is very happy not being written about, and people like him are unsung heroes and a source of inspiration to humanity at large.

Bangalore-based Kamali and his wife Shama were the ideal made-for-each-other couple. Kamali had his own business, while Shama was a home maker and unfortunately a cancer patient. In 1997, clouds of discomfort surrounded their peaceful life when Shama began feeling unwell and had to see doctors, who initially thought her symptoms were just hormonal disorders.

Back then, people hesitated to talk about cancer. Shama was taken to a local hospital, but later as friends suggested, detailed investigations were performed, and that is when the family met Dr. B.S. Srinath. Surgical oncologist and Managing director of Bangalore Institute of Oncology, now the Managing Trustee and Head of the institution of Sri Shankara Cancer Hospital and Research Centre. After investigations, Shama was diagnosed with breast cancer and the treatment began, from Surgery to Chemotherapy and Radiation. The immense moral and medical support from Dr. B.S. Srinath, Dr. Sanjiv Sharma, Dr. Shekar Patil and Dr. Karthik and S. Rishi, helped the family to go through this traumatic phase. As Kamali recalls, this gave him a big lesson that more than medicines, a cancer patient needs moral and emotional support from all quarters.

As Kamali puts forth, Shama did not lose hope but in fact she turned into a counsellor for fellow cancer patients, guiding patients at Kidwai Hospital, St. John's Hospital and Bangalore Institute of Oncology hospital. In 2005, Shama and Kamali joined some other likeminded cancer survivors and founded an NGO, "Cancer Information Centre" (CIC) to help cancer patients and also create awareness about cancer in the society. National Academic Depository

Digital Storehouse of Degrees

he Union Government has come up with a facility whereby students can store their degrees in a website managed by the Ministry for Human Resources. These can be retrieved any time and from anywhere when needed or employers can be referred to see and verify them by using the unique number or code assigned to the recipients. The facility has been developed by the National Academic Depository (NAD).

It is often the case that students or job aspirants face the risk of loss, theft or spoilage of their degree, diploma, certificates or awards while transporting them in the physical form. Even the ones stored at homes or institutions may get destroyed due to termites or humidity or salinity of the air. Besides there is always the risk of their fake replicas or forged ones could be used by others. The NAD

will do away all these.

The Depository has been developed by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in pursuance of a decision by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) in 2016. The facility is likely to benefit nearly five crore students every year. India has 55 boards for evaluation of school education at the 10th standard (SSLC) level. 359 State Universities, 123 deemed universities, 47 Central Universities and 260 private Universities. Besides, there are 107 institutions of excellence such as BITS, Pilani, Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bangalore; MIDS, Chennai; NITs, IISERs, NISERs, IITs, and some centrally-funded institutions. The various school exam boards themselves issue nearly 3.65 crore certificates.

The NAD is a digital storehouse which besides preserving the documents will ensure that process of retrieval is easy, transparent and flawless. Besides, the mechanism will be totally transparent. The paperless depository was conceived on the lines of dematerialization of financial securities. The UGC will be directing all boards, universities and other educational institutions to upload the certificates, diplomas, and degrees onto the website. Each

student will be provided a unique number to access the documents which will be based on Aadhaar numbers. He or she can authorize the employers to access the documents for verification process. The facility will save immense amount of resources being spent on photocopying and sending of these documents by posts, couriers or after by email after due scanning. The freshers from colleges and universities can upload their documents free of cost till be age of 27. The NAD will maintain the integrity and confidentiality of the documents. The creation of the NAD is a huge advance towards easing the pain

On the Bankruptcy of Atheism

Religious leaders should recognize that hate and violence do not belong to authentic religion and that it is against God. They should be bold enough to condemn such activities. This would be possible, however, only if the teachings of the concerned religion plainly and unambiguously condemn hate and violence. But if the original message is clearly in favour of violence, we need a thorough assessment and critical reconsideration.

Q: In some cases, it is immature, fearsome, brutal or otherwise unhelpful and alienating notions of God preached by some religionists that turn people away from God. Also, many people may turn away from God because of the insistence by priests on unverifiable beliefs and dogmas and rituals, which they claim are absolutely necessary for salvation. Do you agree with this? If so, what do you think religious scholars, priests etc. should do?

A: Since we are limited and God is Infinite, our notions about God will definitely be imperfect. This is not surprising. Perfect notions about God can be communicated by God alone. In other words, only God can reveal God perfectly and adequately. In this sense we speak of self-revelation and selfcommunication of God. Even in that case, as long as the recipients are imperfect beings, their notions can also be imperfect. Imperfect and fearful notions about God can also alienate people from God and even make people think there could be no God. In that case, they are only rejecting the wrong notions of

What religious people should do in this regard is to be aware of their own limitations in speaking about God. We can speak about God only analogically.

O: Do you think there could be something positive in the growing phenomenon of atheism across the world? Do you think the atheist critique might help people of faith refine their understandings of God. Religion and Spirituality?

A: Atheistic critiques of religion can help us refine our understandings of God. For instance, Marxist atheism has criticized certain notions of God, religion and spirituality that have tolerated social injustice. This is, in fact, a call and reminder to the believers to return to the original message of the scriptures, where God, through the prophets, always condemns the oppression of the poor and social injustice. Religion is not merely a private affair between myself and my God but has something to do with the society and the world; spirituality is not confined to some prayers and ascetical practices, but is oriented to the socio-political system and ecology/nature.

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
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
