New Delhi: In the wake of an illintentioned survey of madrassas in Uttar Pradesh, Jamiat Ulama-i-Hind (M) constituted a steering committee to investigate the matter. Convening a meeting of madrasa rectors and representatives at its headquarters on September 6, the Jamiat leadership declared that they will defend Islamic seminaries at all costs, and termed the UP government's proposed survey of madrassas as a malicious attempt to disparage the madrasa education system. It also announced the opening of a helpline for madrassas that encounter any issues. According to an estimate, there are more than a lakh madrassas in UP. More than 200 madrasa

representatives, including those from prestigious seminaries like Darul Uloom in Deoband, Darul Uloom Nadwatul Ulama, Lucknow, Mazahir Uloom, Saharanpur, and others, attended the meeting under the banner of "protecting Madrassas". They denounced the Yogi government's

attempt to demonize the madrasa, saying it is the country's greatest asset because it was instrumental in the liberation movement and made immeasurable sacrifices.

The Uttar Pradesh government had announced to conduct a survey of unrecognized madrassas in the state to gather information about the number of teachers, curriculum, and basic facilities available there, among others.

The 12-point survey questionnaire being used by the UP government was discussed at the meeting. A PowerPoint presentation gave a thorough explanation of the purpose and scope of the survey. In the discussion, it was agreed that the madrasa system's laws and regulations needed internal revision.

The meeting also raises concerns about the government's retrograde mindset, which by adopting a combative approach causes confusion and fear among the populace and builds a barrier of mistrust between the communities. This government's behavior is completely unacceptable. Governments ought to stop this sort of conduct. It pointed out that madrassas have played a significant historical role in this

New Delhi: The People's Union for Civil Liberties (PUCL), a well-known rights organization, claimed that the ban on hijab in educational institutions issued by the BJP-led state government and upheld by the Karnataka High Court has prevented thousands of Muslim girls and women in Karnataka from receiving an education.

In its report, PUCL emphasized

testimony from students across the state and that the High Court's ruling infringed several rights.

According to the report, "These rights which have been violated include Right to Education without Discrimination, Right to Equality, Right to Dignity, Right to Privacy, Right to Expression, Right to Non-Discrimination and

Freedom from Arbitrary State Action."

The group stated that the Karnataka government had completely neglected its constitutional obligation because of its "single-minded emphasis on ensuring that the hijab was forbidden in institutions."

Numerous students were

reportedly compelled to drop out of their academic programmes as a result of the instruction.

The rights organization urged Chief Minister Basavaraj Bommai to revoke the notification that forbade the wearing of the hijab at schools and colleges.

Additionally, it requested the judiciary to look into the reasons

behind the government's "sudden, arbitrary, and unlawful" action.

"The human rights commission and minority commission should register suo motu complaints against the principals and CDCs [college development committees] for violating the fundamental rights of the concerned students and initiate actions at the earliest," the report stated.

The report also asserted that students were scared to attend schools and colleges as a result of security measures put in place in educational institutions as a consequence of the court case. It also noted situations in which Hindu boys are said to have used WhatsApp groups to send threatening messages.

"They said that they wanted to punish us and kill us, and other similar threats," the report quoted a student as saying.

Furthermore, students reported to

the PUCL team that some boys had dubbed them "O Hijab" and "O Burkha" and harassed them in public. According to the report, several colleges failed to protect their students against harassment and even encouraged bullying.

"When the principal notices us, he chastises us and asks me why we still attend this school. The report quoted a schoolgirl as stating, "Why we continue to wear the headscarf, and other similar mocking queries.

The meeting gave nod to a three-

point plan following mutual consultation.

- (1) Madrassas' internal systems should have any legal flaws fixed as quickly as possible.
- (2) The Jamiat Ulama-i- Hind should set up a helpline and have a team ready to assist the Madrassas in fixing the paperwork.
- (3) Madrassas ought to begin offering modern education in NIOS or another format.

Religious seminaries are a sore spot for communal forces, according to Maulana Arshad Madani, thus we should be aware of their motivations

Mufti Abul Qasim Nomani stressed the need of improving the internal structure of madrassas, particularly the structure connected to Dar al-Iqama, (hostel), etc.

Maulana Atiq Ahmad Bastavi, representing the Nazeem-e-Ala of Darul Uloom Nadwatul Ulama, Maulana Syed Muhammad Rabi Hasni Nadvi, argued that the survey questionnaire had been included for mischief rather than reform. Therefore, a suitable response should be made to this new evil of communal forces. In this context, he suggested getting in touch with government representatives.

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UP Government's Muslim Outreach Plan gives a Push for Infrastructure Projects

The Uttar Pradesh government has allotted Rs 53.73 crore for the welfare of the Muslim community in the state. The money will be spent on establishing health and education-related projects in several Muslim-dominated districts of Uttar Pradesh. A total of 14 projects have been sanctioned by the Yogi Adityanath government for the benefit of the Muslim community.

A 200-bed girls' hostel and a multipurpose conference room will be built at the Government's Girls Intermediate College in Gazipur. Similarly, the government-run girl's intermediate college in Pattadeva in Deoria will have a 100-bed girls' hostel. A government-run homeopathy dispensary will be built in Swar city in the Rampur district. Similarly, a governmentrun homeopathy clinic will be built in Hapur, a multipurpose hall in Amroaha, a 100-bed working women's hostel in Bulandshar, a 50-bed working women's hostel at Gangoh in Saharanpur, and more classrooms for the industrial institute in Basti. All these places have a high Muslim population.

Danish Azad Ansari, State minister of Minority Affairs in the Adityanath government said, "the center is funding 60 percent of the project cost and the rest is borne by the state government. The first installment of the budget is received and the additional funding would be approved as the projects move forward."

The Minster also said that job

fairs are being organized in 19 Muslim-dominated divisions for employment for the Muslim youth. The timetable of the job fairs will be announced soon, he

The president of UP BJP's Minority Morcha wing, Kunwar Basit Ali said; "Muslim community is getting lion's share from the development and welfare schemes of the BJP-led Central and State governments. The community which comprises nearly 18% of the state's population is getting more than 30 percent share in the welfare schemes like PM Awas Yojana, PM Ujjwala Yojana, Mudra Loans, and free ration scheme. Nearly four crore Muslims out of 13 crore beneficiaries will benefit from these schemes," he said.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi had stressed the need for developing the Pasmanda (backward) Muslim community. The Yogi Adityanath government has appointed Danish Azad Ansari, a Pasmanda Muslim as a State Minister of Minority Affairs and Chaudhary Kafil-Ul-Wara, as the Chairman of Uttar Pradesh Urdu Akademi.

The BJP is making a renewed effort to reach out to the Muslim community after its success in the 2022 Assembly election. The BJP has intensified its Muslim outreach programme after winning the Lok Sabha byelections in Rampur and Azamgarh, both Muslimdominated seats. The BJP's Muslim outreach programme is an effort to get a reasonable share of Muslim votes, which were traditionally pocketed by its rival parties.

Jamiat (M) mulls involving women in its activities

Bhopal: A committee was set up by the Jamiat Ulama-i-Hind (M) to examine a proposal to include women in the organization's activities. The Jamiat's two-day national consultative meeting in Bhopal ended with a commitment to strengthen the organizational framework at the local level. Hitherto, Jamiat was a male preserve, and women's representation was taboo in the organization.

The meeting of presidents and general secretaries of the state and regional units of the organization was held in the city and it was presided over by Maulana Mahmood Madani, national president of the Jamiat.

'After the debacle of the movement of Hazrat Shah Waliullah Sahab, the Jamiat took upon itself all the responsibilities to take care of the Muslim community in India." said Maulana Madani

"Whenever any catastrophe strikes the community, Muslims look to the Jamiat with hope as it stands by them. Hence, when we are not able to work as per their expectations, they criticize us," he admitted

He claimed that 42 percent of youth are exposed to alcoholism. They live in villages and cities, we can reform them only when the representatives of the Jamiat are present everywhere.

A motion to include women in Jamiat activities was made during the meeting, and a committee has been formed to evaluate its feasibility.

Everyone has noticed the impact he has had on the education sector as a result of his passion and unselfish contribution to the cause of education

Hoque thanked the Governor and the people of Meghalaya for accepting the award and for allowing him to help the community by promoting higher and technical education as well as several outreach initiatives. He recalls the assistance provided by the late Dr. Donkupar Roy, former Lok Sabha speaker and Chief Minister P. A. Sangma, former Governor R.S. Mooshahary, and the officers' overall support.

Mahbubul Hoque is also lovingly called Sir Syed of North East for his selfless work in the education sector he was raised in a rural household in the isolated Purabgul village in Assam's Karimganj district. He had a

difficult childhood because he lost both of his parents and his caring older brother. He had to work to pay for his education by giving tuition and selling vegetables he had grown himself at the neighbourhood market. He received numerous employment offers from MNCs and domestic and international IT businesses after earning a Master's in Computer Science from the esteemed Aligarh Muslim University, but he chose to return to his hometown with a vision and began a career in educational entrepreneurship.

With barely 85 rupees in his pocket, he began his humble endeavor in Guwahati with 1 computer and 4 students in a rented room. To raise money to set up a computer lab, he manufactured computers and sold them in the market. At first, his

situation was so difficult that even landlords were reluctant to rent to him because of his financial situation. However, his study center, Central IT College, rose to become the second-best Manipal Group study center in the entire nation. There was no turning around.

He established the Education, Research and Development Foundation (ERDF) in 2005 while serving as its chairman to improve the North Eastern region's educational infrastructure. One AICTE-approved engineering college, two PCI-approved pharmacy colleges, one BCIapproved law school, one AICTEapproved business school, one NCTE-approved B. Ed. college, one women's college, and his largest dream venture University of Science & Technology Meghalaya where more than 5000

students are enrolled are among the pioneering educational institutions that were established under the ERDF umbrella. An exceptional accomplishment, the University received an "A" Grade from NAAC in its first round of assessment in 2021. USTM is now placed among the top 200 universities of India in the NIRF-2022 Ranking.

More than 10,000 students are receiving quality education from the institutions he founded, 35% of whom are from indigenous tribes, 20% are from poor, backward classes, and receive free education, 80% of whom are from rural areas, and 57% are female students. Under his dynamistic direction, more than 1200 teaching, administrative, and nonteaching staff members are working to advance the schools. More than 30 students from communities and tribes throughout the northeastern states attend the institution, which is one of its most significant aspects.

Mahbubul Hoque, who has received the "Shikshacharya Award-2019" from the Asam Sahitya Sabha as well as numerous other honours for his work in higher education, including the most recent Community Excellence Award given to USTM by UNESCO, has started several charitable initiatives like endowment funds, emergency medical assistance, interest-free loans, relief drives,

health camps, etc. He is very concerned about energy conservation and environmental protection, which is evident in his adoption of the Green Campus Initiative, for which USTM has already won numerous accolades by the UN's sustainable development goals.

As part of the USTM Neighbourhood Mission, different USTM departments have adopted nearby communities, and the children of these towns can receive free or reduced-price education at the university. Mahbubul Hoque's creation and implementation of the Pay Back Policy, which reimburses full course fees to students who pass competitive tests, is a noteworthy initiative.

The USTM future roadmap includes research and extension initiatives that are centered on rural education and reaching its Milestones. By drawing students and scholars from all over the world, fostering local youth, and building a global community, he has established milestones to transform USTM into a worldclass university by 2030, assisting the state of Meghalaya in becoming a destination for international education. His present vision for Meghalaya is a medical school and hospital with cutting-edge research capabilities. Another aspirational proposal put out for adoption by the Assam government is the establishment of a women's university in his hometown of Karimganj.

Muslims face discrimination in securing employment and earn less: Oxfam

New Delhi: Historically disadvantaged groups including Dalits, tribals, and religious minorities like Muslims continue to encounter prejudice in India when trying to obtain jobs, livelihoods, and agricultural loans. This was revealed in the latest study on discrimination in India by the international charity organization, Oxfam.

The Oxfam India's Discrimination Report 2022 blames "societal and employers' prejudices" for women's lower wages. The report said Muslims experienced the most increase in unemployment during the early months of the Covid-19 outbreak, with a rate of 17%.

"During the early months of the Covid-19 pandemic, the sharpest increase in unemployment - at 17% - was for Muslims."

The report noted that non-Muslims made 7,000 rupees more per month than Muslims, those from the lowest castes and tribes

made 5,000 rupees less per month than others, and men made 4,000 rupees (\$50; £44) more per month than women.

"The fall-out of discrimination in Indian society is not just social and moral but also economic, leading to adverse consequences to society," Amitabh Behar, Oxfam India's CEO, said.

Behar also underlined that "The inequality for women and other social categories is not just due to poor access to education or work experience but because of discrimination".

By analyzing official data on employment, income, health, and access to agricultural finance for various social groups between 2004 and 2020, researchers from Oxfam used statistical models to quantify prejudice.

The CEO of Oxfam recommended that in order to create an India free from prejudice, the government, political parties, decision-makers, and civil society must work together.

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

It's widely believed, however, and voiced by local media and officials, that Netflix shows featuring homosexual characters, same-sex kissing and children portrayed in a sexual light are the targets of the directive.

The move was taken "in light of the recent observation that the platform was broadcasting visual material and content which violates content controls in GCC countries," readsthe statement by



the Saudi General Commission for Audiovisual Media and the GCC Committee of Electronic Media Officials. The content "violates Islamic and societal values and principles. As such, the platform was contacted to remove this content, including content directed at children, and to ensure adherence to the laws.

The GCC, or Gulf Cooperation Council, is comprised of the largely conservative, Muslimmajority states of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Bahrain, and Oman. Homosexuality is criminalized in these countries and can be punished by fines, prison time or even the death penalty.

'All legal measures will be taken to protect the Kingdom's sovereignty, citizens and residents from any intellectual attack aimed at affecting its societies, values, safety of upbringing their generations and protecting them

from harmful content," EsraAssery, CEO of the Saudi General Commission for Audiovisual Media, told Saudi outlet Arab News.

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Religious Diplomacy, Key in Promoting 'Common Values,' says MWL Chief

Kazakhstan conference praises Makkah Document and its importance in promoting peace, dialogue, and cooperation.



Riyadh: The closing statement of the Kazakhstan Congress of Leaders of World and Traditional Religions, attended by more than 100 delegations of influential international religious leaders, has praised the contents of the historic Makkah Document.

The document was signed by senior muftis, scholars, and thinkers of the Islamic world in Makkah, Saudi Arabia, home of the Grand Mosque, affirming its importance in promoting peace, dialogue, cooperation, and mutual respect for the good of the world.

Dr. Mohammed bin Abdulkarim Al-Issa, secretary-general of the Muslim World League, had assigned Dr. Abdul Rahman Al-Zayd, deputy secretary-general of MWL, to represent the league in the congress.

Al-Issa sent a recorded television speech in the opening session of the congress, at the invitation of Kazakh President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev, along with the UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, in the presence of the Pope and international religious leaders.

In his speech, Al-Issa addressed the importance of "common values," stressing that religious diplomacy is an important and influential tool in the context of promoting these values, as seen at the conference, bearing common humanitarian goals.

He noted the importance of dialogue and civilized and cultural communication, stressing that being far from each other has generated anxiety and fear and created a gap that widens with time due to illusions and doubts. He added that errors in perceptions and judgments have resulted in dangerous negative effects throughout human history. Al-Issa refuted the theses that hold religions responsible for some conflicts and wars, declaring that most of the conflicts and wars throughout human history were the result of ideas blamed on religions, but in reality, they only expressed the thoughts of their owners, and never expressed true religion or any civilized culture.

Many Islamic leaders participating in the conference described, in the final statement considered the Makkah Document as a significant turning point in contemporary Islamic history, due to its religious and intellectual context that embraces all Islamic sects.

Al-Issa refuted the theses that hold religions responsible for some conflicts and wars, declaring that most of the conflicts and wars throughout human history were the result of ideas blamed on religions, but in reality, they only expressed the thoughts of their owners, and never expressed true religion or any civilized culture.

The Makkah Document was celebrated on a number of international platforms for its religious and cultural diversity. It was also adopted by Islamic countries at the meeting of foreign ministers in Niamey, Niger, and it has been adopted in the training of imams in many Islamic countries and countries that include Muslim communities. The sponsor of this document was King Salman, who sponsored the international conference held in Makkah in 2019, organized by the MWL, with the approval of about 1,200 muftis and scholars and more than 4,500 Islamic thinkers.

Archaeologists find Mosque from when Islam arrived in the holy land

The Israel Antiquities Authority estimates that the mosque uncovered ahead of new construction in the Bedouin town of Rahat in the Negev desert, dates to the 7th to 8th centuries.

Archaeologists in Israel have discovered the remains of one of the world's oldest rural mosques, built around the time Islam arrived in the holy land, they said on Thursday.

The Israel Antiquities Authority estimates that the mosque uncovered ahead of new



construction in the Bedouin town of Rahat in the Negev desert, dates back to the 7th to 8th centuries.

There are large mosques known to be from that period in Jerusalem and in Mecca but it is rare to find a house of prayer so ancient whose congregation is likely to have been local farmers, the antiquities authority said. Excavated at the site where the remains of an open-air mosque — a rectangular building, about the size of a single-car garage, with a prayer niche facing south towards Mecca.

"This is one of the earliest mosques known from the beginning of the arrival of Islam in Israel, after the Arab conquest of 636 C.E.," said Gideon Avni of the antiquities authority.

"The discovery of the village and the mosque in its vicinity are a significant contribution to the study of the history of the country during this turbulent period."

New Delhi: A book authored by a Vatican cardinal and published by the New Delhi-based Islamic Studies Association aims to help Christian readers discover and contemplate the spiritual gems found in the Quran, the holy book of Muslims

Emeritus Professor Akhtarul Wasey of the Jamia Millia Islamia on September 3 released the booklet "Journeying with Muslims: Listening, Praying and Working Together" at a program joined organized by the Indialogue Foundation and Indian Social Institute along with the Islamic Studies Association.

The book was written by Cardinal Michael Louis Fitzgerald, one of the foremost Catholic scholars in the field of Christian-Muslim relations. The 85-year-old cardinal served in the Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue as Secretary between 1987 and 2002 and then president for the next six years.

While launching of the book, Wasey thanked Cardinal Fitzgerald for offering the "wonderful" text. He further said that in Journeying with Muslims, the Cardinal proposes Christians could accompany their Muslim brothers through reading and reflecting on the passages of the Qur'an without compromising their identity as Christians.

Since the Qur'an lies at the heart of

Islam, the new booklet helps Christians to enter a heart-to-heart dialogue with Muslims. This idea came from the cardinal's long association with the Muslim world, his deep knowledge of Islam and Muslims, and his deep commitment to his Christian Faith.

"It is a bold idea since the booklet invites Christians to get familiarized with selected texts from the Qur'an by praying with them," Wasey added.

Jesuit Father Denzil Fernandes, the executive director of the Indian Social Institute, urged the gathering to explore the common areas of convergence between the two great faiths to work together for justice and peace in the world. Indialogue Foundation secretary general Behzad Fatmi pointed asserted interfaith dialogue as a must today. "Dialogue is the first step in establishing a healthy society. Dialogue avoiding the polemical arguments gives precedence to common points, which far outnumber polemical ones," he explained.

Jesuit Father Joseph Victor Edwin, the secretary of the

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Islamic Studies Association. pointed out that the Catholic Church affirms that it rejects nothing true and holy in various religions. The Church eagerly learns from the 'true and holy' from other religions.

Further, the Catholic Church urges Christians to familiarize themselves with the national and religious traditions of fellow citizens. Concerning Islam, the Catholic Church situates Islam as the first great non-biblical monotheistic religion.

The Vatican Council document Lumen Gentium (16) affirms that "the plan of salvation also includes those who acknowledge the Creator. In the first place amongst these, there are the Muslims, who, professing to hold the faith of Abraham, along with us adore the one and merciful God, who on the last day will judge mankind."

Noting that Christians and Muslims adore the one, merciful God is a significant statement to make considering the stiff polemical exchanges between them in the past.

Father Edwin further said despite such openness on the part of the Catholic Church towards Muslims, many Christian faithful, including some sections of the clergy and religious, in India are not only ignorant of the Muslim faith but also unfamiliar with the teachings of the Church on the subject.

The many unfounded prejudices against the Qur'an create fear and suspicion in the hearts of many Christians. In this context, Journeying with Muslims will hopefully make a significant contribution to helping Christians develop a better understanding of Islamic beliefs, Father Edwin said.

Report on five members of the Muslim community Meeting With Bhagwat Ji

Ever since the news broke out that five members of the Muslim community met RSS chief Mr. Mohan Bhagwat on 22 Aug 2022,the media has gone to town with its various interpretations.

The five Individuals were former LG of Delhi, Najeeb Jung, journalist Shahid Siddiqui, hotelier Saeed Shervani, Lt Gen Zameer Uddin Shah, and this writer.

I would like to clarify that this was entirely an initiative of five of us, a motley group of friends, with a common concern about the insecurity of the Muslim community and belief in the process of dialogue.

After the news broke, we received innumerable messages of support from members of the Muslim community and even the non-Muslims. echoing our feeling that the process of dialogue is the only way forward.

We have also seen many critical comments. Like who 'authorized' us to represent the community.

Some expressed concern that our so far untarnished individual reputation would be in jeopardy by our "association" with the communal organization like the RSS. Some warned us of being "entrapped". Yet no one questioned that dialogue is the only way forward.

We have been asked a host of questions which I will deal with through this piece, requested by the Indian Express, to set the record straight.

What prompted us to seek this meeting? Well, our pressing concerns about the way things are going. The insecurity is being increasingly felt by the Muslim community in the wake of recurring incidents of lynching of the innocents, calls by Hindutva hotheads for genocide, marginalization of the community in almost every field, etc.

What was the meeting like? First of all, we were surprised to see the simplicity of his modest office. His punctuality when he entered on the dot at 10 am. His patience. He listened to all of us with rapt attention for an hour without once interrupting any of us.

The only other person in attendance was Mr. Krishan Gopal, his close associate.

Of course, we could sense that he was speaking from a position of authority. But it was subtle. No overbearing demeanor. Nothing that would make us uncomfortable.

In his opening remarks, he emphasized three things:

One that Hindutva is an inclusive concept in which all communities have equal room. The country can progress only when all communities are united, he added.

In a very significant statement, he emphasized that the Indian Constitution was sacrosanct and the whole country has to abide by it. He sought to dispel the fear that RSS is seeking to abandon the constitution at the first opportunity. And that Muslims will be disenfranchised.

Then he said the Hindus are extremely sensitive about two things, the first of which was the cow. We responded that the Muslims fully understand this especially since cow slaughter has been banned in most of India. The law already punishes the violators, as it should. His inference seemed to be that even in states where there is no legal ban, Muslims should voluntarily shun beef. Easy enough if ensures security.

The other sensitivity he mentioned was Hindus being called "kafir". We responded that though the original meaning of this Arabic word was nonbeliever, if it is considered offensive and derogatory, Muslims must avoid it completely. Very easy. Very doable. The Quran mentions that 'Allah is rabbulalamin', not rabbul Muslimeen - God of the universe, not of Muslims alone. Quran says 'unto you your religion, unto me mine.

We also pointed out to him an equally offensive term used for every Muslim - jihadi and Pakistani.

He agreed that it must stop immediately.

We suggested the need for a continuing dialogue and whether

The South Indian city of Bidar the northernmost part of Karnataka, 145 km from Hyderabad is barely known beyond the subcontinent. But in recent years, it has built a great reputation in the field of education. It is drawing students from miles around, and the teaching pedagogy at its largest seminary (madrasa) that is delivering amazing outcomes has confounded educationists. The madrasa is not just opening the gateway to modern careers but also strengthening the prospects of eternal salvation.

In a narrow alleyway, opposite the 15th-century edifice of Madras, a of Mahmud Gawan (1472) in the GoleKhana area of Bidar stands Shaheen School, the flagship institution of a vibrant educational revolution whose ripples are touching thousands of lives across the country. Parents seeking a blend of temporal and spiritual education are choosing it over mainstream institutions. It offers a bridge course for madrasa pass outs and enables them to join the mainstream education system.

When Abdul Qadeer, an engineer by profession, began his enterprise in a one-room tenement accommodating 18 students way back in 1989 he never imagined that his effort would becomea harbinger of a unique educational revolution. With a missionto "shape an ideal seat of learning that is accessible to one and allthe movement has mushroomed into a major center of academic excellence and a beacon of modern learning .,touching the lives of more than 11000 students supervised by 400 teachers, all of them engaged in the creation of knowledge wealth. The network comprisesnine schools, 16 preuniversity colleges, and a degree college having its clones in several cities. It has turned more than 900 students into doctors in the last 15 years.

A Madrasa that Promises Both Heaven and Earth

Muslims desperately need such institutions. they comprise 14% of India's population but have the highest illiteracy rate (42.7%), the lowest level of enrolment in higher education (4.4%) the lowest share of public (or any formal) jobs, school and university posts including that of government jobs (4.9 %), earn less than other groups, are more excluded from the financial world, and spent fewer years in school even though. Pitifully Muslims account for 40 percent of India's prison population.

While the debate over the modernization of madrasas continues, there are several madrasas in India initiating change to bring them in tune with modern times. Some recent reform efforts have focused on modernizing the teachings on offer at madrasas. This modernization includes the introduction of computer proficiency and English language classes which strengthen the employment potential for students outside of the religious sector.

Qadeer is one of the many links in the chain of modern liberal Muslim education that was forged by Sir Syed Ahmad who founded the Aligarh Muslim University.Sir Syed found the madrasa syllabus unsuited to the present age and to the spirit of the time. He criticized it for encouraging memorizing rather than real understanding. Secular Muslim educationists also

tend to agree that curriculums at most madrasas have become fossilized and it cannot be reformed by cosmetic changes, like tweaking a few courses or installing a few computers. They have to be provided with physical and intellectual resources and, most important, cultural temperament to equip their students for the complex demands of a highly competitive modern world.

competitive modern world. Madrasas have played an important role in the history of Islamic civilization. They have been powerful nodes in the learning system and have been harbingers of several revolutionary achievements in fields as diverse as jurisprudence, philosophy, astronomy, science, religion, literature, and medicine. It was only when the Golden Age of Islam began to decline that the madrasas lost their academic and intellectual purity, and ceded

prime space to western-oriented education.

Qadeer has spent his active life bridging the divide between traditional and modern education. His schools teach secular subjects like science, medicine, technology, social sciences, and history, in addition to classical Islamic texts. Having a realistic frame of mind, he tried to inspire Muslim society toward modern education. Historically, madrasas were institutions of higher learning until their importance diminished with the onset of Western education. On account of Shaheen's resounding success in medical entrance tests, the college has been attracting students from as far as Canada and the Middle East. Non-Muslim students come in large numbers; Parents value the quality education and appreciate the environment of Shaheen's campus.

Madrasas and mosques are an important feature of the Muslim community and can reinforce community cohesion and integration. People like Qadeer have presented In Shaheen a model worthy of replication. It is true that more than the model, it is

the charisma of inspirational leads like him that infuse institutions with vibrancy. But these madrasas clearly demonstrate that there are silver linings in the educationalhorizon of Muslims. The lesson we must learn is that the community's own shortcomings cannot be easily palmed off on others.

Madrasas elsewhere should take a leaf out of Shaheen's book. Since the curriculum and pedagogy they follow were designed for a society far different from ours, these madrasas have lost their vitality and relevance. Accordingly, madrasas need to introduce subjects that can broadenthe minds of students and equip them to understand modern society with all its complexities. This way madrasas can produce able religious leaders and scholars who can comprehend the modern concerns and complex challenges. Madrasas, like those run by Qadeer, can play a vital role in promoting an intellect that is well equipped to face the challenges of the modern world. Since the students are schooled in classical and modern science as well as secular and religious thought, they are better able to spot scriptural distortions. They also tend to be more connected to their own communities as well as to the mainstream society and their stable sense of identity, religious and otherwise, shields them against radicalism. These madrasas are powerful allies in India's transition to modernity.

Here is what the founders of Jamia Millia Islamia wrote for its students to sing as the official anthem:

"Here conscience alone is the beacon...

It's the Mecca of many faiths, Travelling is the credo here, pausing a sacrilege,...

Cleaving against currents is the

The pleasure of arrival lies in countering crosscurrents.

This is the home of my yearnings, This is the land of my dreams."

Let this noble thought remain a guiding credo for every Muslim.

he would name some of his associates with whom we could take the interaction forward. He named four persons. And volunteered to be available himself if required.

I used this opportunity to present to Shri Bhagwat my book The Population Myth: Islam, Family Planning and Politics in India with the prior consent of my colleagues.

While presenting the book I mentioned four things.

1. Muslim population growth is the highest but the rate is highly exaggerated. The difference between the Hindu and Muslim rates which were1.1thirty years ago has come down to 0.3 since Muslims are adopting family planning much faster than the Hindus.

2. Contrary to general perception, Muslims have the least incidence of polygamy as per the government of India's own report and old Census figures.

3. Polygamy is just not possible in India because of the adverse gender ratio. There are only 940 women against 1000 men which means 60 men don't even have one wife! (He had a hearty laugh at this, clearly indicating that he registered the point).

4. Muslims can never overtake

the Hindus even in one thousand years as clear from a Mathematical model which Professors Dinesh Singh and Ajay Kumar prepared at my request

Reservation? RSS won't change. Maybe. Maybe not.

Criticism: We are "legitimizing" them! Well, they don't need our legitimizing. They are already the largest and most powerful organization in the world. Who are we anyway? A bunch of retired people who have played

There was no trace of social stigma around divorcee women at the beginning of Islam. A divorcee man marrying a divorcee woman (even having kids) was an accepted practice that did not raise any eyebrows. Much later, Muslim society started considering divorce as a stigma for the woman and therefore she preferred to live in toxic, torturous, and extremely abusive marriages, rather than being labelled as a 'divorcee'. Such a negative approach towards divorcee women has no basis in Islam. Muslim women trapped in unhappy and unhealthy marriages face socio-cultural and legal hurdles while trying to secure a divorce. The mother of a suffering daughter, who should be the first person to empathize, sometimes advises her daughter to forget and forgive her husband's follies to keep up the pretense of a happy marriage before relatives and friends. When a girl expresses her intention to walk out of her marriage, elders of the family get together to grapple with the issue. The very first advice given to the girl is to give another chance to her husband even if he is found guilty and to continue living with him, at least for a few months, without giving a thought to the trauma she has to undergo. There will be unsolicited advice from relatives and unless the girl has solid facts to back her decision it is more likely that she will be pushed back to maintain the status quo.

The New Woman

But things have changed a lot now. More and more women are getting educated and they have also taken up jobs and are earning. Sometimes, they earn more than the boy. They are more independent, and they feel it is better to take a drastic step of separation if their marriage is unhappy, rather than suffer the whole of their life. Although Sharia law permits divorce, the Holy Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) declared that the most detestable of lawful things before Allah is divorce. There is no second opinion about the fact that divorce is hateful and must be avoided. But in some situations, divorce becomes a necessary evil. If it becomes impossible for the parties in the marriage to carry on with mutual affection due to incompatibility, in such cases it is better to allow them to get separated, rather than compelling them to continue to live together. The reasons for separation commonly given are abusive husband, husband having an extra-marital affair, emotional torture by in-laws, the husband

Break-up of Marriages

Of late, a disturbing trend noticed is that there is an increase in the breakdown of marriages among Muslims. It is learned that more women are approaching the Sharia courts (Darul Qazas) seeking dissolution of marriage than men. What are the reasons behind this?

being impotent, etc. Many such allegations may not be true and may not be genuine.

Talag, Khula and Darul Oaza

A divorce can be initiated by the husband (Talaq) or it can be initiated by the wife (Khula). It is generally seen that even when a husband agrees to separation, he wants the wife to initiate 'Khula' proceedings. The wife has no choice but to agree since she cannot re-marry until the dissolution of the present marriage, whereas the husband can re-marry without the present marriage getting terminated as he is permitted to have more than one wife. If it was a religious marriage performed by a Khazi, the estranged couple can approach the Sharia court (Darul Khaza) seeking separation. The Darul Qazas (an informal justice delivery system)try to prevent the break-up of the marriage by counselling both parties in order to bring about an amicable settlement. But, if the parties do not agree on reconciliation and still insist on separation even after the counselling, a decision will be taken. Devoid of cumbersome legal procedures and legal jargon, cases are disposed of within a relatively short time in the Darul Khazas, in contrast to months or vears taken by the civil courts. Darul Qaza will perform the role of mediation and arbitration, but its order is not binding on litigants. If they are not satisfied with the decision of the Qazi, the aggrieved party can approach the civil court. Matters like marital disputes between spouses, dissolution of marriage, mehr, dowry issues, custody of the child, maintenance, and issues related to the division of properties among heirs as per Islamic law are entertained by Darul Qaza.

Legal Remedy

If the marriage was performed as a civil marriage before the Sub-Registrar (who is also the Marriage Officer) under the Special Marriages Act, only the civil court (family court) is competent to decide on granting a divorce or otherwise. If the couple getting separated is having a child, the custody of the child will be with the mother till the child reaches the age of seven years. There are many legal intricacies involved and I cannot go further in the matter since I am not an advocate and in all these cases a competent advocate should be consulted. I am dealing only with the social problems and issues arising in such cases of separation. Parting with the custody of a child even after the child attains the



seven-year limit is not easy for the mother. In one case of Zaheda (name changed), her husband is unreasonably seeking the custody of even a four-year-old child, leaving her no alternative except to approach the Family court and consequently getting entangled in prolonged litigation. In another case, the husband of Mubarak (name changed) did not want custody of the child at all but refused to pay any maintenance. She decided not to approach the courts fearing prolonged litigation and she now has the responsibility of bringing up the child on her own

The process of separation is quite often ugly but settling the matter of child custody can be even uglier. It is sad to see the agony that couples undergo, but it is even more painful to see the suffering of the child. Re-marriage of a divorced woman is another major concern, not only for her parents but also for the community.

The Other Side of The Coin

It is not always the case that the wife is innocent and the husband or his family is creating problems. In the case of Munnavar (name changed), his wife harassed and tortured him emotionally for a year. Ultimately, he decided to call off the marriage but had to pay twenty-five lakhs to his wife as demanded by her to give her consent. In the case of Mohsina (name changed), she was misbehaving with her husband and the in-laws, but when confronted, filed a false case of domestic harassment against the husband and his family members. The poor boy, harassed by the police, struggled to avoid getting arrested. Later dragged to the court, he is struggling to attend the court whenever summoned since getting leave from his office is not

In a failed marriage, the boy's side will put all the blame on the girl and the girl's side will put all the blame on the boy. It is difficult to tell what the truth is. Perhaps, the truth lies in-between in most cases. The solution to prevent such domestic conflicts and avoid strained relationships is that the bride and bridegroom should undergo marriage counselling before and after the marriage. Prevention is better than the cure, as the saying goes. The DMS Human Rights Foundation, Bangalore headed by Mr. Hyder Wali has been rendering great service by holding Counselling sessions on marital life for both boys and girlsfor the last ten years. Mr. Syed Tanveer Ahmed (ex-CEO, Brainy Stars International Montessori), Mufti Abdus Sattar Qasmi (Imam, Eidgah Masjid, Jayanagar 4th block), and Moulana Mahmood Ali Mazhari (Former Khateeb and Imam, Masjid-e-Mouzzam, BTM layout)form the team of speakers. Moulana Mahmood Ali Mazhari told me that the Foundation has conducted 110 programs so far. These programs are mostly held in different mosques, but they have also been held in other places. The Foundation has also published a book "The Art of Successful Marriage" which they distribute free of cost. Masajid committees and other organizations should utilize the services of the DMS Human Rights Foundation and help in guiding youngsters to eliminate all the hassles and balance marital issues with trust. understanding, and love in order to lead a happy and successful married life. A Noble Defeat for Islam

To say that Islam is backward would only be telling the truth. Because the essence of Islam, which prioritizes concepts such as compassion and conscience, goes against the production of weapons of mass destruction

When the subject of civilization arises, there is a question that is frequently asked especially in Western literature. "Why did the Islamic world lag behind?" Many different methods are used to try and answer these and similar questions. British biochemist Joseph Needham's answer is quite remarkable. In a book chapter titled "East's Knowledge, West's Science" that was translated into Turkish many years ago, Needham, an expert on the history of science and China, says the Chinese knew what fire was and they also invented gunpowder. But they could not combine both to invent a weapon of mass destruction, a weapon designed to hit anyone, because they had the Taoist worldview in their mindset.

According to Needham, because of this Taoist worldview, the Chinese were unable to invent something so cruel and unscrupulous in design. That is, their way of thinking influenced their actions. Unlike weapons of mass destruction, they combined fire and gunpowder to produce fireworks for their religious holidays. In essence, they created a product for their entertainment and rituals.

With Needham's approach, we can find an answer to the question of "backwardness" in the Islamic world. Indeed, there must be a reason for such a great civilization that has contributed to the common heritage of the world in countless fields, from mathematics to astronomy, from optics to sociology, to "lag behind." Considering the global contributions of the Ottoman Empire, which was the strongest representative of the religion of Islam for many years, for example, this question loses its meaning.

How did polymaths like al-Ghazali, al-Khwarizmi, Euclid, Ibn Sina, Ismail al-Jazari, Omar Khayyam, and many others emerge in Islamic civilization? Well, can we say that the societies of Western civilizations, which we consider "advanced," have "gene superiority?" The answer is a big no when employing basic scientific data.

In the heyday of the Ottoman Empire, individual warfare tools such as bows and arrows, the most advanced tools of the period, were produced. However, this know-how did not evolve into the creation of weapons of mass destruction over time. However, it is widely accepted that Western civilization was ahead in the invention and spread of weapons of mass destruction. From this perspective, we can clearly see a gap forming between the two civilizations in the arms industry. This development, which we can



almost call a breaking moment, is one of the most fundamental reasons for today's question.

From this perspective, to say that Islam is backward would only be telling the truth. Because the essence of Pslam, which prioritizes concepts such as compassion and conscience, goes against the production of weapons of mass destruction. This "backwardness" has become one of the biggest factors in changing the destiny of an entire civilization. Yes, Islam is "backward," but in a positive sense, of course. Islam could not be merciless. Islam could not be without conscience. Islam could not kill the innocent. Islam could not harm nature. Islam could not enslave people.

During my tenure as ambassador in Indonesia, I read and listened to many horrifying historical anecdotes. Indonesian people have been subjected to many tortures in their history. The Netherlands, which came to the Indonesian region to increase spice imports, enslaved and tortured the Indonesian people. We are also all familiar with the slave trade and enslavement activities in Africa. Western countries, which needed cheap labor for mining, exploited the lives of African people, regardless of whether they were children, old or sick. It would not be wrong to say that these and similar exploitation activities, which lasted for many years, contributed to the "advancement" of Western civilization. Yes, this is "progress," in a way. When we think about it on the physical and material plane, it is indeed extraordinary progress. When you think of the skyscrapers in New York or London's subway that has been operating for centuries, it is difficult not to describe the point the West has reached today as "progress."

Such progress could never have been made in the Islamic thought system. For example, Yunus Emre. one of the most prominent names in the Islamic world, says, "First of all, it is important to win hearts." That motto summarizes why this religion is hindering "progress." There is also the belief in Islam that an employed worker must be given what he is owed before the sweat on his forehead dries. That is, an employer must give their worker their wages as soon as their work is finished. Of course, such norms are perceived as irrational by today's capitalist and unconventional structures.

In fact, when looking back at the traditional religious roots of Western civilization, you will once again come across similar values. However, with the Age of Enlightenment, the West manipulated its religious roots and turned secularism into a God. Secular man has postponed divine references and has no value to account for. If we speak in the language of the Quran, the expression "nefsi emmare" can be used to describe the Westerncreated secular man, a phrase used to describe the dark side of a person. This feature that always encourages evil, immorality, and wrongdoing is present in everyone. Sigmund **Freud** describes this aspect of a man very well. Freud, who especially studied the depressions experienced within the Vienna bourgeoisie of the period, almost revealed the psychological structure of the secular man in his works.

Likewise, **Karl Marx** revealed the economic ambitions and actions of this new human typology. Marx's effort to organize the working class against oppression was perfectly just and innocent. However, of course, Marx's continuation of this war by directing it to metaphysics and God caused him to deviate from his main purpose. It can be said that there are basic problems in Marx's philosophy, not his understanding of economics.

An Inevitable End

From a philosophical and theological point of view, therefore, Islam's "backwardness" was inevitable. If we are to call it a defeat, then it is a very noble defeat. Well, in the meantime, have there been any benefits from all the "progress?" Some technical progress has been made for the common good of humanity. However, we need to bring these and similar advances under the control of the human value system. Otherwise, we cannot prevent a monster from being created. Under a value system that does not fight with the sacred and puts the human and aesthetic in the foreground, technical progress benefits all of humanity. Otherwise, life becomes more unlivable by the day in a world without borders populated by a human type with no restrictions. The strong crush the weak and injustice becomes colossal.

Man is a social animal, just like many other social animals, he also lives in the community. But what makes human beings different from others is that they share their emotions and experiences in the communities that they live in. They extend compassion to fellow beings and extend moral and physical support whenever and wherever needed by others. But other animals though they live in groups still do not share intense compassion and empathy with their fellow members. Perhaps that is the difference that puts humans in a totally different spot. The other day a friend of mine forwarded a message on social media. The essence of which was to educate on spending time, effort, and resources on self rather than on others, the aptassertive title was 'live for you'. In times where every person is connected in the virtual world, but still lives disconnected in the real world sometimes even living under the same roof. Every person seems to be in the rat race without any clue about the destination each one is heading towards. Infants struggle for the attention of their parents, adolescents have no time to dine with their families, grandparents are reduced to caretakers, and adults struggle to see either the sunshine hours at home or enjoy the moonlight under the open sky. Everyone seems to be on a constant voyage of searching for реасе a n d happiness. Unfortunately, it is very much available under everybody's feet but everyone struggles to look beneath. In the rush of discovering the sweet spot in time and space, one is getting entangled deeper into the selfdestructive whirlpool of chaos.

Live for Whom?

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Whether in education, relations, or even charity, one is keen to get an up front confirmation on "what is in it for me" (WIIIFM). This self-indulgent and self-centered approach of 'me'-'I'-'myself' has trivialized every act of kindness. Unless one is satisfied by getting an ego massage, one prefers to keep the hands off the circumstances. A comparison between the past and present is rightly said as "nekikarsamundar me daal" (do good and dump into the ocean) in the past, but now it is tweaked to "nekikar social media meindaal" (do good and broadcast on the social media). In simple terms, the bygone generation served others as an obligation seeking no compensation except rewards from God and their inner conscience.

Quran in its profound declaration states that the purpose of the creation of humans is: "And I (Allâh) created not the jinn and mankind except that they should worship (serve) Me". (Surah51-V-56). In its all-encompassing explanation, worshipis not restricted to the five important principles, but all those acts that please Almighty Allah. In another ayah of the holy Quran, it is said: "By no means shall you attain Al-Birr (piety, righteousness), unless you spend (in Allâh's Cause) of that which you love; and whatever of good you spend, Allâh knows it well". (Surah3-V-92).

The self-indulging mindset has an immense impact on how one looks at self and the others around. We have started looking at everybody around us as a threat to ourselves

and as a competitor to the available limited resources Every person tries to be selfsufficient, but most go overboard. Amassing resources unethically that goes against the saying 'there is enough for everyone's need but definitely not for everyone's greed'. The past two years of a pandemic have broken all the myths of denial. Everything has come into the common parlance of discussion as to how some have turned a blind eye even when the closest of the family members were in dire need.

When wrong priorities become the norm and the same is passed on to the next generations, the results can be nothing but horrifying and disastrous. The most advanced nation on the planet has approximately 36 million men and women now living alone, representing a record high of 28 percent of all U.S. households (www.thehill.com). The exact picture in India is not available as we do not have official data substantiating the situation. In one study, 3.4% of those above the age of 45 years live alone, and about 5.7 percent of the country's senior citizens (age 60 and above) live on their own without the support of family or friends as per a report published Januarv 2021.(www.downtoearth.org).Ab out 58% of the families in India are nuclear, it is not very long ago when joint families and community living were a widespread practice. The generation that lived in joint families still exists and continues missing their nostalgic past.

Today we have 'Gated

Communities', but hardly represent the community concepts of the past. Residents are unaware of the members living next door or on next floor. During Medieval times, Christian theologians accepted the Ptolemaic earth centered Greek view of the universe as an absolute universal truth. According to a February 2015 study "Religious Understandings of Science", among members of non-Christian religions; 42 percent of Jews, and 52 percent of Muslims, Buddhists and Hindus (taken as a group) are twice as interested in new scientific discoveries compared to only 22 percent of Protestant evangelicals. I do not know why they believe that the rarity of life in our universe proves that God must have created life only on this planet. Perhaps they believed that if intelligent life were found to exist on other planets; it would diminish the miracle of God's creation of Human Beings. For me the opposite is true.

The Qur'an and the Hebrew Bible however teach that the Living God created the whole universe to be conducive to the universal evolution of life. The Qur'an says, "We have not sent you but as a blessing for all the worlds." (Al-Anbiya 107) Many commentators say this refers to the 18.000 worlds created by Allah. Our world is one of them. (Mir'at-e-Kainat, vol.1, p.77).

The Hebrew Bible says in the Zabur of Prophet David, King of Israel; "Your kingdom is a kingdom of all the worlds; and Your dominion is for all generations." (Psalms 145:13) And the Zohar, the central book of Jewish mysticism, says there are

In 2013, astronomers estimated that there could be at least 17 billion Earth-sized exoplanets in just our galaxy; the Milky Way. They also said that one in six stars could host an Earth-sized planet in a close

Recent scientific studies support a Muslim and Jewish view of God as the creator and ruler of all living beings, on all the inhabitable worlds. The number of observed exoplanets - worlds circling distant stars - has passed 5,000. Of these, dozens could be habitable - orbiting at a distance where it is neither "too hot" nor "too cold" for water to be liquid on the surface.

One study in the journal, Nature found organic compounds of unexpected complexity exist throughout the Universe. Thus. complex organic compounds are not the sole domain of life. They can be made naturally by stars. This means that life is not a random fluke; the universe itself is formed to create life.

Organic substances commonly found throughout the Universe contain a mixture of ring-like and chain-like components. The compounds are so complex that their chemical structures resemble those of coal and petroleum. This discovery suggests that complex organic compounds can be synthesized in space even when no life forms have yet evolved on any

By analyzing spectra of star dust formed in exploding stars, the astrophysicists showed that stars are in fact, making complex organic compounds, and doing so in extremely short time scales of weeks. Most interestingly, this organic star dust is similar in structure to complex organic compounds found in meteorites. Since meteorites are remnants of our early Solar System, the findings raise the possibility that stars enriched our early Solar System with organic compounds. The early Earth was subjected to severe bombardments by comets and asteroids, which would have carried organic star dust to planet earth; that then helped create life on

Another study published in Astrophysical Journal found that methanol formation is the major chemical pathway to complex organic molecules in interstellar space and much more complex organic molecules are required to create life. The range in methanol concentration varies from negligible amounts in some regions of interstellar space to approximately 30% of the ices around a handful of newly formed

stars. They also discovered methanol for the first time in low concentrations (1 to 2 percent) in the cold clouds that will eventually give birth to new stars.

As a Rabbi who believes in the verses of the Our'an and the Hebrew Bible cited at the beginning of this article, I say that random luck has nothing to do with it. More and more evidence is accumulating that the laws of nature have been formed specifically to create life.

But planet Earth is essentially a 'dry' planet, with only 0.02% of its mass as surface water, so oceans must have come long after it had formed. Scientists think that happened when water-rich asteroids or comets in the solar system crashed into our planet. But there was no evidence to support this theory.

Now scientists announced that for the first time both water and a rocky surface, two "key ingredients" for inhabitable planets, have been found together beyond our solar system. The star GD 61 is located about 150 light years away. It has a fragmented asteroid (so it can more easily be analyzed) which is composed of 26% water mass, very similar to Ceres, the largest asteroid in the main belt of our solar system. Both have a vastly higher percentage of water than planet Earth.

This new discovery shows that the same water 'delivery system' that delivered water to planet Earth, could have occurred in this distant star's solar system

For those who believe in the One God of all the inhabitable worlds, none of these new scientific studies are shocking. For unlike the Italian inquisition's condemnation of Galileo, no Muslim or Jewish astronomer was ever condemned by a Muslim or Jewish inquisition, because Jews and Muslims never had an institution like the inquisition.

Also, because both Muslims and Jews had many philosophers who were critics of Aristotle's and Ptolemy's science, most medieval Jewish and Muslim religious leaders did not feel they had to prevent new science from disagreeing with Greek science. Thus, even as new discoveries always change the scientific understanding of God's universe; the religious belief that the whole universe exalts God and reveals God's glory remains the same.

As it is written in the Zabur of Prophet David, King of Israel; "The heavens declare the glory of God. The universe proclaims God's handiwork." (Psalms 19:2)

And as the Qur'an proclaims over and over again, "All that is in the heavens and all that is on the earth exalts Allah" (Our'an 57:1, 61:1, and 64:1)

Grief can be defined as the intense emotional and physical reaction that an individual experiences following the death of a loved one. Grief is not only characterized by deep sadness, but also by an intense yearning to be with that person again.

Bereavement is considered to be a normal human experience with the majority of individuals adapting over time to their loss, and grief, however, it remains a very painful period.

No two people will experience loss in the same way. How individuals express their pain depends upon several factors including their personality, circumstances surrounding the

death, and the way they view the world.

One of the roles of a psychologist is to help bereaved individuals through their grieving process by trying to increase their sense of control and facilitate their adaptation.

Loss, change, and control are the three major psychological components of grief. Helping individuals identify as to what they have lost is an important step in the grieving process.

Change is an inevitable consequence of loss and how much change the person has to navigate tends to correlate with how much their lives overlapped

with the deceased.

Learning to adapt to changes requires a lot of time and effort. Control plays a central role in the cognitive interpretation of grief. When someone dies, the bereaved do not have any control over the surrounding circumstances of the death. Due to this lack of control, they can feel overwhelmed.

Five stages of grief

- Denial
- Anger
- Bargaining
- Depression Acceptance
- How does grief affect the brain?

Grieving can lead to distraction in hormone production that results in specific symptoms such as disturbed sleep, loss of appetite, fatigue, and anxiety. Healthy ways to cope with grief and loss-

- · Seek support, find good listeners in your circle with whom you can share your thoughts too, seek professional help, and join support groups.
- Be patient. Take time to heal, do not rush.
- Stay present. Take each morning as it comes.
- Express yourself. You can choose to talk about how you are feeling either to a counselor

- individually or talk in support group sessions. Maintain a journal in which you can pen down, how you are feeling and what you are thinking.
- · Allow yourself to have fun. Indulge in activities that help you relax or distract yourself.
- Have a routine. Building some structure can give you a sense of normalcy and hope.
- Take care of yourself. Eat well, stay hydrated, exercise regularly and avoid alcohol, drugs, and smoking.
- · Remember and celebrate the life of the deceased. Anniversaries or birthdays of the deceased can be a difficult time for friends and families, but they can also be a time for remembering and honouring them.

also includes non-touch such as encouraging gestures like the thumbs up and a smile and a look in the eye. Allah's Messenger (Pbuh) showed his affection for the children in many ways. He hugged them and patted them on the back. He touched their heads, combed their hair with his fingers, etc.

"...Allah's Messenger took Ibrahim (his son) and kissed him and smelthim..." [Bukhari]

The following hadith shows how kissing your children has been related to the amount of mercy and kindness you have in your heart.

'A'isha (Allah be pleased with her) reported that there came a few desert Arabs to Allah's Messenger and said: Do you kiss your children? He said: Yes. Thereupon they said: By Allah but we do not kiss our children. Thereupon Allah's Messenger said: Then what can I do if Allah has deprived you of mercy? ... [Muslim]

Through Respect

Respect is a two-way street and when you choose to model mutual respect, you'll be well on your way to raising respectful children.

A'isha, the Umm al-Mu'minin, said, "I did not see anyone who more resembled the Messenger of Allah, may Allah bless him and grant him peace, in the manner of speaking than Fatima. When she came to him, he stood up for her, made her welcome, and had her sit in his place. When the Prophet came to her, she stood up for him, took his hand, made him welcome, and made him sit in her place. She

came to him during his final illness and he greeted her and kissed her." [Al-Adab Al-Mufrad 971]

It's a perfect example of how kids treat parents based on how they are treated because we, as parents, are their first school of love. These days when we lack common courtesies, how can we teach our kids to be respectful? Are both respectful to us and other kids and adults? The answer is that we have to model the respect we hope to see from our kids. When children feel valued and capable, they are less likely to engage in power struggles.

Through Gifts

As parents, we are always buying things for our children. Giving gifts is not about the material accumulation of toys and clothing or about satisfying our child's whims and fancies for the latest things. Instead, it should be about giving with love whatever you give! Especially giving of our love.

If you give your child a toy, then make sure you spend time to play that toy with her. If you give your child a book, then make sure you sit and read that book to or with him. It's more about the love that you can both share with that gift. Children often crave your attention more than the gift itself. Quality Time

When you spend quality time with your child, it tells him or her that you love being with him or her. Being able to spend time with your loved ones is crucial to any

relationship. I will reiterate here that children crave their parent's attention whether negative or positive attention. Most of the time parents give their children negative attention by focusing on what their children shouldn't do. This will only reinforce the negative action. This made me think, a creation of Allah and so few of us! How should the Muslims approach this subject matter? Do we not acknowledge that everything around us is an ayah from Allah? Are we not the *khalifa* sent on this earth? Should we not be the people safeguarding the natural



resources given to us by Him? Today, I won't talk much about the facts about rocks, because you all have covered it in your science or social studies. You all know what igneous rocks, sedimentary rocks or metamorphic rocks are. What I want to do today is to integrate your scientific knowledge about rocks into the knowledge every Muslim should hold.

One might think, how can a rock be of any significance to Muslims? Isn't rock such an indistinct creation lying around anywhere? Is that so? The first lesson we will take today is to consider each creation as a miracle of Allah. This lifeless creation is found everywhere. No matter where we are, we are bound to be around rocks. It is the most used creation since the beginning of time. Sadly, rocks have also been used as idols of self-imagined gods and have been worshipped by numerous generations. These people went against the prophets and spread mischief.

Allah swt draws our attention in chapter *Al Hijr* named The Rock verse 80, to the Dwellers of the Rock, whose fate is mentioned as a warning to those who contemplated the slaying of the Prophet.

Rocks have played an important role even for Muslims, but we never gave them the position of worship. *Hajar ul Aswad* is a revered stone and all of us try our utmost to go near it and kiss it. But never has it been more than a stone.

As a Muslim parent or teacher, one must make use of this humble rock to educate the children in so many different ways. This is what *Taleem* is. *Taleem* is not imparted only through books. We should use the *ayaat* around us to connect our children with their creator.

Create opportunities for children to learn more about the purpose of rocks, their uses of them, rocks mentioned in the Quran, and rocks used as a metaphor for the human heart.

Let them explore more about the Dome of the rock, the rock which has the footprints of Ibrahim AS, and the Black stone.

Let the children see the beauty and purpose in every creation of Allah swt. Let their research make them fall in love with their Rabb and constantly be in His praise.

Prof Sheik Ali authored 32 books which include. 'A Leader Reassessed: Life and Work of Sir Syed Ahmed Khan, a book exploring what all propelled Sir Syed to focus on modern education, and 'Dr. Zakir Hussain Life and Times, A Comprehensive Biography', a scintillating array of multifaceted accomplishments of the celebrated educationist.

He also translated Maulana Abul Kalam Azad's 'Tarjuman-ul-Ouran' and 'Javed Nama' by poet Sir Muhammad Iqbal.

Prof Sheik Ali was also an authority on Mysuru rulers Hyder Ali and Tipu Sultan and had carried out extensive research on the Mysuru Kingdom in the British era.

He attained PhDs from the

Aligarh Muslim University in 1954 and the University of London in 1960 and presided over the 47th session of the Indian History Congress in 1986. Prof Sheik Ali was the founder and president of the Karnataka History Conference.

He was the recipient of the Golden Jubilee Award of the Mysore University for research in Humanities and Social Sciences, Rajyotsava Award for Distinguished Educationist. Mythic Society of India Award for Distinguished Historian, and Maulana Jauhar Award in 2003. After retirement, Prof Sheik Ali founded the Sultan Shaheed Educational Trust, Mysuru, which established many educational institutions in Mysuru.

Prof Sheik Ali is survived by his wife, son, and daughter.



Influential Muslim religious leader Yusuf al-Qaradawi dies at 96

Qatar-based Egyptian scholar Qaradawi, who was in his nineties, was well-known across the Muslim world.

Sheikh Yusuf al-Oaradawi, one of the Sunni Muslim world's most influential religious scholars, has died.

Al-Qaradawi, an Egyptian who was based in Qatar, was the chairman of the International Union of Muslim Scholars, and also a spiritual leader for the Muslim Brotherhood. He was 96 years old.

His death on Monday, 26 September 2022 was announced on his official Twitter account.

Al-Qaradawi, who formerly made regular appearances on Al Jazeera Arabic to discuss religious matters, hosted a popular TV program, "Shariah and Life," in which he took calls from across the Muslim world, dispensing theological rulings and offering



advice on everything from global politics to mundane aspects of daily life.

His death sparked strong reactions across the Muslim world, as people took to social media to mourn his death.

He wrote more than 120 books and received several international awards for his contributions to Islamic studies.





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
